Daron Babcock, Bonton Farms Leadership Challenges In For-Profit and Nonprofit Organizations

excerpted from a D Magazine article "Bonton Farms is set on a 1.25-acre plot of ground bordered by Bexar Street to the east, the Trinity River floodway to the south, and the Buckeye Commons public housing complex to the west and north. ...

"The premise of the farm is relatively simple. Daron gives people work; they in turn build résumés and get other jobs. Some start their own small businesses.

"The work is on a farm because Bonton is a food desert, meaning the nearest grocery store is more than a mile away. Daron sells or barters the food to

people in the community so they can eat better and get healthier, so they can get and keep jobs. There's a larger farm extension to the southeast, where more food is grown which Daron sells to restaurants like Meddlesome Moth, Cafe Momentum, Flora Street Cafe, and the Dallas Cowboys training facility in Frisco to help subsidize the farm.

"He plans to open a market in the spring so he can provide even more food to the community and offer cooking classes, healthcare, yoga-even bring in his own chiropractor. ..."

Since 1993 Rotarians in Chile and the United States Have Teamed Up To Provide Life-altering Reconstructive Surgeries - excerpted from Rotary Weekly

This project got its start in 1993 when San Francisco Rotarians sponsored a medical mission that performed reconstructive surgeries in Chile. That was the beginning of Rotaplast, a program that evolved into a nonprofit organization that has since sent team of U.S. surgeons, teams to 26 countries.

In 2004, Rotarians in Chile assumed leadership of the program in their country. Over the years, Chilean doctors became more involved and the program expanded to include breast reconstruction for cancer patients.

Rotary that you've got people ... working together to get things accomplished," says James Lehman, a plastic surgeon who joined the Rotary Club of Fairlawn, OH, after working in Chile.

In February Lehman and a anesthesiologists and nurses visited Iquique, a Pacific port city about 80 miles south of Chile's northern border. With financial help from nearby Collahuasi copper mine local Rotarians coordinate and pay for the medical team's food, lodging, and in-country

a middle class family in Warsaw, Poland, the war started for him at the age of ten and continued for five years before he was liberated at 15. Germany with Russia invaded and occupied Warsaw with no



declaration of war and immediately made Krakow the capital of Poland instead of Warsaw. Laws were passed to make holocaust legal and defined who was considered Jewish. Jews had to register and were denied citizenship, could not own property, could not practice a profession or be a student. Mt Glauben shared stories of how the population adapted, moving in the night instead of day. The area was bombed so there were no stores; there was looting daily, and with no money a barter system developed. Of the parts of buildings remaining there were 6-8 people in a room, not always with their families. There was no water so they survived on water collected in barrels. There was no food. Food that was distributed to them amounted to 360 calories a day for a family of 8. With these conditions, typhoid became epidemic. In 1942 Germany reached an agreement with Poland and with Russia in East Poland. The ghetto population dwindled due to disease and lack of food. At the same time the ahetto walls were reinforced from the inside to protect them from the Germans getting inside. After days of fighting the Germans did breach the walls and piled all the remaining occupants into boxcars and took them to camps. His family left together but eventually his mother, sister and little brother were separated from him and his father. He never saw them again. They worked as slave labor in airplane factories. Over the years he was moved to six different camps. He was orphaned at 13 when his father was taken away. Finally, In April 1945, he was one of 90 people liberated from camp Flossenburg by the tanks of the 3rd US Army. After the war ended he was sent (Cont. on pa. 3)

More than 250 potential patients lined up early on a Saturday morning outside Ernesto Torres Galdames Hospital to try to get a spot on the team's schedule. They had come from all over Chile including a family who had traveled 1,400 miles. About 600 children are born each year in Chile with cleft lips and palates. and though the government established eight centers to treat the conditions, the long wait list means corrective surgery can be years in the future.
