Program Chair of the Day: Richard Stanford



Robyn Flatt, Executive Director – DCT Dallas Children's Theater

Robyn Flatt co-founded DCT in 1984 with start-up funds of \$500. Under her artistic leadership, the theater's creative and operational stature has grown over the past 35 years to reflect its current annual budget of more than \$4 million.

Her theatrical career has brought her acclaim as a professional director, actor and lighting designer. During her tenure as a member of the Dallas Theater Center Resident Company, she served as Assistant Artistic Director and Director of Theater-inthe-Parks. She holds a MA degree from Baylor University and studied under Paul Baker, Juana Laban, and Hanya Holm.

Ms. Flatt's many acting credits include two roles she created for award-winning world premiere productions: Dewey Dell in Journey to Jefferson and Martha Ann Sickenger in Preston Jones' The Oldest Living Graduate. Her directing credits at DCT include several world premiere adaptations by Linda Daugherty of Steven Kellogg's stories which have also toured nationally. Other critic-

ally acclaimed productions include: Adventures of Huckleberry Finn; The Miracle Worker, And Then They Came For Me, To Kill a Mockingbird, Mufaro's Beautiful Daughters, Treasure Island Reimagined! and Yana Wana's Legend of the Bluebonnet.

She has served on the boards of AATE, ASSITEJ/USA, and CTFA. She is a recipient of The 500, Inc.'s prestigious Ken Bryant Visionary Award, Dallas Historical Society's 1999 Excellence in Community Service for Creative Arts, the 2002 Leon Rabin Standing Ovation Award, and the Excellence in Nonprofit Management Award. Ms. Flatt is a member of the College of Fellows of American Theatre and served five years as Treasurer of the Children's Theatre Foundation of America.

She was nominated by The Dallas Morning News arts staff for the Texan of the Year Award in both 2010 and 2015 and was honored in 2016 with the Orlin Corey Award for Artistic Excellence from the American Alliance for Theater and Education.

Program: Update from our new DA



President Richard Stanford called the meeting to order. Barbara Marcum gave the invocation. Cindy Cummings led the Pledge of Allegiance and "The Star Spangled Banner." Herb Ziev in-

troduced our market place advertiser for today, **Nolan Duck**. His company DBG is an advisor and business broker for both the Buyer and Seller of large companies. Happy Franklin spoke about RCP Connect and invited everyone to join the "Beer Tasting" event on Wednesday, August 21 from 5 to 7 at Total Wine, 9350 N. Central, cost \$15 per person which includes snacks and beer. Also August 27, members are asked to attend Restaurant week at Del Frisco. Note: \$8 of your meal will be donated to North Texas Food Bank.

Howard Parker introduced our speaker today, John Creuzot, Dallas County DA who gave us an update con-



cerning issues facing the Criminal Justice system. Mr. Creuzot is a reony District Court Judge. His background includes seven years as a

Dallas County Assistant District attorney and Chief Felony Prosecutor. Creuzot has earned a national reputation for his innovative work on drug courts, criminal justice reform and "evidence-based sentencing."

The county DA office has over 500 employees and 280 lawyers and a \$50 million dollar budget. The sections are Criminal (by far the largest), Fraud, Appellate (supervision of the conviction), and Conviction Integrity. Many of the criminal cases involve people with a problem with substance abuse, mental illness and opioids. Mr. Creuzot has presented research

with many thanks to Mary Bishop for the Notes! about the cost benefit of several new approaches to the Texas Legislature, He has implemented many successful options other than putting those addicted to alcohol, drugs, or suffering from mental illness into the prison system where they can't get the help they need. Typically it is a revolving door with these folks being put into prison for 12 to 18 months only to fall afoul of the law and going back through the criminal justice system. The cost, time and money could be better spent.

How you might ask? Mr. Creuzot has proven that "Evidence Based Sentencing" has reduced sentencing and resentencing (in and out of prison and need patient care) by 68%. High risk offenders (substance abuse, mental illness and opioids users) can be identified before ending back in the prison system. By helping these individual (not prison) but more patient care facilities for the mentally ill and rehab program, we can save the tax payer's dollars. He mentioned that in 1991, we had 50,000 prison beds, in 2005 they increased to 105,000. More beds is not the solution. The solution is more emphasis and money on intervention and rehab. This a public health issue not a criminal justice issue.

He feels there this perience including 21 years as a Fel- is not a criminal matter but should be a misdemeanor. It costs the prosecutors too much time, taking them and police officers away from the true criminals. We must be smart on crime. More attorneys are need to handle child abuse cases and other issues besides spending all their time on revolving cases. At this time, we have 8,000 cases backlogged. Marijuana cases are creating a log jam.

> Help is needed: The Salvation Army is building a new facility with 150 beds for free rehab. Homeward Bound is redoing a nursing home with dedicating beds for rehab of substance abuse, alcohol, and hopefully mental illness. The community must recognize this is not a criminal justice issue.
