

Ryan Botzong was called on to give his New Member Speech. Ryan said he was born in Shreveport, but was a Cowboys fan and always waned to come to Dallas. He graduated from Old Miss with a degree in finance. He currently works for 49 Financial. He said he enjoys Rotary, and after he had joined, he found out that his grandfather had been a Rotarian.

Then Patti Schaub was called on to give her New Member Speech. She said she had been in Dallas since 2008, but didn't know about Ro-

tary until Sarah Oliai told her about organizing the Fourth of July Parade. Patti said she has a husband, three children and four grandchildren. Her youngest has Down Syndrome and an Autism Spectrum disorder. She is on the Special Education Board in the HPISD, and is Chair of the Developmental Committee She is concerned with providing an enriching program for adults with disabilities. She attended the U. of Maryland and lived in Maryland. The family moved to Austin in 1995 and to Dallas in 2008.

PP Rod Pirtle, an over thirtythree year Rotarian, accompanied by his wife Beth was awarded an Honorary Membership, recognizing his many contributions to the club.

Life." She said at first she was skeptical, but she saw benefits in her own family. Both of her children had mental health issues in childhood. Her

daughter was struggling with depression. A handwriting analyst told her that her daughter was suicidal. She found out that it was true The whole family went through the handwriting therapy. The therapist was one of only nine people in the world who can train others to do this type of therapy. A complete profile takes eight hours to complete. It shows three hundred and fifty traits, which are divid-ed into major and minor traits. She said the subconscious likes to hang on; that is why habits are so hard to break. Handwriting therapy does not require that you talk or share secrets. She said when she went through the therapy, her life changed; she lost weight, she got more confident and she became a better parent. The therapy works well with anxiety, depression, bipolar, and PTSD. The only downside is that you have to write ten minutes a day with your non-dominant hand. The non-dominant brain makes you stronger, smarter and taps into the subconscious. It gets results. It is a great team builder; she does an analysis of the members and then they have to guess who it is. It can also tell the leader who has weaknesses. It is a science, but it also intuition. It tells about personality, character and interests. It cannot tell about a person's age, sex, color or creed, She never reads what a person wrote. She also looks at the size of the letters, the size of the margins, and letters are compared to others on a chart.. For her family and many of her clients it is life changing; Many get off of some or all of their medicines. Both of her children have a good quality of life now. She was asked about the psychological community. The American Psychological Association has not commented on this, but it is big in Europe. Currenty, there are only about thirty therapists in the U.S. She said she had clients in Europe; because she does not read the words; she just looks at the letters. The cost of a profile is \$1000 and therapy is \$5,000. She can be called at 972-494-3232




Where: Office building conference center near Medical City Hospital
