World Rotary Day - Happy 120th Birthday! How Rotary Began

World Rotary Day is celebrated on **February 23rd** to commemorate the founding of the first Rotary Club in 1905.

On the evening of February 23, 1905, Paul Harris invited three friends to a meeting. Silvester Schiele, a coal dealer, Hiram Shorey, a merchant tailor, and Gustavus Loehr, a mining engineer, gathered with Harris in Loehr's business office in downtown Chicago on Dearborn Avenue.

They discussed Harris' idea that business leaders should meet periodically to enjoy camaraderie and to enlarge their circle of business and professional acquaintances. The club met weekly. Membership was limited to one representative from each business and profession. Though the men didn't use the term Rotary that night, that gathering is commonly regarded as the first Rotary club meeting.

As they continued to convene, members began rotating their meetings among their places of business, hence the name Rotary. After enlisting a fifth member, printer Harry Ruggles, the group was formally organized as the Rotary Club of Chicago. The original club emblem, a wagon wheel design, was the precursor of the familiar cogwheel emblem now used

by Rotarians worldwide.

By the end of 1905, the club's roster showed a membership of 30 with Schiele as president and Ruggles as treasurer. Paul Harris declined office in the new club and didn't become its president until two years later. Club membership grew, making it difficult to gather in offices, so the members shifted their meetings to hotels and restaurants, where many Rotary club meetings are held today.

These early "Rotarians" realized that fellowship and mutual self-interest were not enough to keep a club of busy professionals meeting each week. Reaching out to improve the lives of the less fortunate proved to be an even more powerful motivation. The Rotary commitment to service began in 1907 when the Rotary Club of Chicago constructed that city's first public lavatory. With this inaugural project, Rotary became the world's first service Club organization.

Three years after Paul Harris' inspired idea, a San Francisco business person happened to have a conversation with a friend from Chicago who told him about their "club." Woods grasped the concept and organized the Rotary Club of San Francisco in 1908. Read more in the Newsletter of the Rotary Global History Fellowship, Issue 254, February, 2025.

today, Dani Bethune and Darren Woodson to speak on C5 Texas. Darren Woodson began by saying how important it is to say the Pledge of Allegiance and "The Star Spang-

led Banner." He said he sees a lot of kids who don't understand the freedoms that we have.



Dani said that she has been with C5 for almost six years. They believe in giving kids a hand up, not a hand out. She said the mission of C5 is to change the odds for high potential

youth inspiring them to pursue personal success and preparing them for leadership roles. She said she tells kids that this is a mutually beneficial relationship, that they are there to support them but they must do the work. They should get as much from the program as they can but they must take the information and use it. These are high potential kids but they do not have the support and skills to succeed. They work with eighth through twelfth graders. They recruit in seventh grade. They recruit B-C students. They don't recruit A students because they think they will be alright. Darren said he sees himself in the kids, that he was a B-C student and if he had had C5 it would have helped him academically. He said his job is to give the kids hope and structure in their lives. C5 does this through leadership development, college and career exploration, community action, social awareness and personal development. When students apply for the program, they have to submit an application, a report card and a recommendation. They also interview them to see what kind of kids they are and who they want to be. They have to see if the kids have the ability to develop themselves. They select kids from low-income single parent or multi-generational families. They select about forty kids to start this journey. It is a commitment from the student and the parent. C5 stands for Character building, learning how to use their skills, Community building, learning how to reach others, Challenging, learning how to expand your own horizons, Career based, learning how to plan your future and Commit to a better future. They teach a lot through a summer program.+ pathways + a summit.


