Social Meeting at Campisi's Relax and Enjoy Some Pizza and Conversation

The mysterious history of the Campisi family in America begins back in 1904, when my great-grandparents, Carlo "Papa" and Antonia Campisi, immigrated from Sicily to New Orleans. They settled in Dallas thanks to a telegram from a cousin who wrote of a grocery store for sale for \$800. Soon after, Papa was in the grocery business at the corner of Hall Street and Central Expressway (formerly the Central tracks). In an apartment above the store, my great-grandparents had six kids (four girls and two boys), who helped by working and translating in the store.

In 1946, with the end of World War II, Papa purchased a bar with a small kitchen in the back at the corner of Knox and McKinney called the Idle Hour. A cousin visiting from New York suggested they serve "Pizza Pies" which were so popular in New York. So, Papa gathered his family in the kitchen to create Dallas' first pizza, as well as Texas' first pizzeria. My grandfather Joe and my great uncle Sam were always on hand promoting their pizza pies to all their patrons.

We moved to our Mockingbird Lane location in 1950 to take over the previous "Egyptian Lounge." At the time, there was not enough money to buy a whole new neon sign, so the original Egyptian sign was changed by removing the word "Lounge" and adding the word "Restaurant." After Papa and Uncle Sam passed away, and the girls were busy raising their families, my grandfather Joe continued the entrepreneurial spirit of his father by continuing to grow the family business.

In 1971, Campisi's was granted one of the first liquor licenses in the state of Texas since prohibition. Joe continued to serve his friends, politicians, and sports figures, and even be-came a local celebrity himself. My uncle Corky ran the Mockingbird Lane location through the next four decades and trained the next generation. In 1993, I opened the first satellite store at Coit and Campbell. Since then, I have expanded Campisi's to multi-ple locations throughout the Dallas metroplex.

The "American Dream" that brought the Campisi family to America has become a reality. Thanks to you, our loyal patrons, numerous local and national awards have been bestowed upon us over the years. The awards include Best Pizza, Best Italian, and Bon Appetit magazine's One of the Best Pizzerias in America. We feel honored to be the oldest Italian restaurant in Texas. And, with the third and fourth generation of Campisi children now carrying on the traditions, we are proud to enter our eighth decade of service to the metroplex.

My grandfather Joe, who raised me as his son, taught me a lesson in business. He said, "Baby, Campisi's was built on handshakes and hellos." And that's what we're still doing today. Grazie, David Campisi and Family

Program: Challenge Air: Building Confidence in Children and Youth with Special Needs

thirty years of helping kids. Challenge Air was founded by Rick Amber, He had become a quadriplegic when his jet crashed during a landing attempt on a naval aircraft carrier. After competing in and winning the U.S. Open National Wheelchair Tennis Championship, he wanted to use his accomplishments to encourage children to overcome their own disabilities. That's when Amber decided to get back to his true passion - flying. The idea of Challenge Air took off after Amber invited a group of physically challenged children on a flight over the Addison skyline. He realized that overcoming his disability helped the kids change their perception about disability.

Challenge Air builds self-esteem and confidence through flight. The pilots on their flydavs are volun-teers. Ten to fifteen pilots on each day give flights to as many as one hundred kids. The next flyday will be in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida. They have flydays all over the country. On each day volunteers help to set up for the events in the hangars. Once they are greeted, the children and parents are helped into the plane. Some of them are nervous before the flight, but they are high-fiving after they return. Their smiles tell it all. The program is open to all children with disabilities, except for those with those who have such low functioning that they would not understand what was happening. Children who might misbehave sit in the back seat, and a parent sits in front with the pilot. Otherwise, the child sits in front with the pilot. The families are not charged for the flights. Challenge Air is based in Dallas, but they fly out of twelve to fifteen cities. Each event costs about \$20,000 to \$25,000. The volunteer pilots are usually from the local area, but some pilots might fly in. They either have their own plane or rent one. The planes must have four seats. Challenge Air also works with flight schools, but pilots must have at least 350 hours of flight experience. Each flight lasts thirty minutes and the pilot tries to fly over things familiar to the child.


<u>HE WHO L</u>AUGHS, LASTS
