Travis Brown, Phil Cobb & Vic Cervantes

30 Years of the McKinney Trolley - Reflecting on the Past, Present and Future of a Dallas Icon



Travis Brown is a Principal in the DFW Office of the Texas construction law firm, Cokinos I Young. His practice focuses primarily on insur-

ance coverage litigation for contractors, owners and developers in the construction industry.

He first became interested in the McKinney Avenue Trolley in 1989 when his parents took him to the Trolley's Grand Opening celebration. That initial childhood wonder turned into a lifelong interest in transit and urban development, and he joined the MATA Board of Directors in 2016. He is now the Chairman of Finance & Development for MATA. He works alongside the rest of MATA Board and staff to identify the changing needs of the Trolley's users and secure funding to improve the service and ridership experience aboard the Trolley.

Outside of work and MATA, Travis lives in Lake Highlands with his wife. Andrea, and his two kids, Halle (7) and T.J. (5). He is a lifelong Longhorn fan with undergrad degrees in Finance and Plan II from the University of Texas and a J.D. from the University of Texas School of Law. He is also involved in the Exchange Club of Lake Highlands, a local civic group in his neighborhood.



For most of his adult life. Phil Cobb has been an entrepreneur. He built a highly successful restaurant chain and then launched a nonprofit historic streetcar system.

After graduation from Ohio State U., Cobb moved to Dallas to utilize his marketing degree by pursuing a career in sales. In 1971, the opportunity to return to the restaurant industry presented itself when he went into business with Gene Street, a successful Dallas entrepreneur.

The business partners opened their first bar, J. Alfred's, and launched a handful of other bars in Dallas. Then in 1975, they opened what Cobb calls their first real restaurant - the Black-eved Pea. Ultimately, they chose the Black-eyed Pea and continued to refine the chain until 1986, when they sold the 45-unit franchise

In the early 1980s, while Cobb was in the midst of building his successful restaurant operation, he cofounded the Vineyard Neighborhood Association as that section of Dallas was undergoing an urban revitalization. Today, the neighborhood is known as Uptown.

But Cobb's true spark of inspiration came from Ed Landrum with whom he would later establish the nonprofit McKinney Avenue Transit Authority (MATA). In 1983, Cobb became chairman of the board of MATA, and the partners began planning and raising the more than \$3 million in city bonds, federal funds and private investment for the project

On July 22, 1989, the first MATA streetcars became operational, returning trolleys to the city of Dallas. What started out as an idea to promote tourism nearly three decades ago, has become a viable transit system that has undergone numerous expansions. In 2017, total ridership reached 614,000, making it the third-largest historic streetcar system in the nation.



Vic Cervantes is the President of the McKinney Avenue Transit Authority Mr. Cervan-

tes is an Electronics Engineer with an extensive background in Engineering, Operations and International Business Management. Before joining The McKinney Avenue Transit Authority, he had started a couple of small businesses in Dallas and San Antonio, TX. He managed Latin American operations for a large US/Canadian telecommunications equipment company and led the deployment of a national wireless system as Vice President of Engineering.

His interests are technology, music and all mechanical things that move. Thus his passion for the McKinney Avenue M-Line Trolleys!

He was born in E. Chicago, IN, worked in Canada, Mexico and Latin America but has called Texas home for more than 35 years.

Program: Decrypting the World of Crypto: Demystifying Bitcoin, Ethereum, and Blockchain



he was borrowing from PDG Bill Slicker, the phrase "it's a great day to be a Rotarian."

Mark Kashar introduced our Marketplace Advertiser of the week, Scott McLaughlin with Vista Bank. He also said that all of the spots for advertising had been taken.

Sarah Oliai reported on the Fourth of July Parade, that on the day of the parade sixty-two Rotarians contributed 268 service hours and thirty-seven volunteers from

munity development. Last XA year club members contributed over \$29,000. He then recognized President Richard

as a fifth level Paul Harris Fellow. President Richard asked us to fill out our committee choice sheets, and mentioned that dues were overdue.

Howard Parker introduced our speaker today, his grandson, Harrison Pollan, who spoke on Decrypting the World of Crypto: Bitcoin,



Ethereum and Blockchain. Harrison began by saying that his goals for the presentation were to enable us to be able to ask at least one good question and to be

able to tell if we were being ripped off. He said it was so difficult to understand because of the technology involved. It is a person to person transaction, allowing one to make a payment without the use of a bank or credit card. Most of the people who use these transactions are engineers, mathematicians, or financiers. Bitcoin is a "trustless" system, which means that you do not have to trust people in the system because it discourages bad actors It is very difficult to break into the blockchain system or to enter a bad transaction. Bitcoin was the first crypto-currency. It is a coin; you can buy one or part of one. No one controls bitcoin except people on the network, but traditional retail networks are managed. Ethereum is different and more complex. It is a network of smart contracts. From that businesses can be built without human management. Ethereum uses tokens, not coins. If Person A sends to Person B, the transaction is a block; a block can be added to the chain which becomes an indelible, transparent transaction. Blockchain's smart contracts can be used to digitize contracts, for wages and escrow, for use in microfinance and in developing countries where banks are not reliable
