Sam W. Haynes Unsettled Lands

Sam W. Haynes is a professor of history at the University of Texas at Arlington, where he also serves as the director of the Center for Greater Southwestern Studies. In 2019 he received a year-long fellowship from SMU's Clements Center to complete his new book, "Unsettled Land: From Revolution to Republic, the Struggle for Texas," which was published by Basic Books in 2022. Unsettled Land has won several awar including prizes from the Texas Institute of Letters and the Texas State Historical Association, and was listed as one of Foreign Affairs' "Best Books of 2022."

Don't trust anyone who tells you that they know all the answers to Texas history. Especially not about the era before, during and after the Texas Revolution of the 1830s. After all the reverential mythmaking and sensationalistic myth-busting, Texas in the early 19th century still comes off as a scene of absolute anarchy. Hundreds of significant players changed sides among dozens of different causes. Most had no idea what others were thinking or doing because the distances were so wide and land routes

so rough

One book that captures this rough tumult with all its cacophony is Sam W. Haynes' "Unsettled Land: From Revolution to Republic; The Struggle for Texas," due out from Basic Books on May 3.

The reader comes away with the sense that there was no single proximate cause for the Texas Revolution. Yet the conflict had a profound effect on an informally multiracial society that became increasingly dominated by the Anglo classes.

Martin, introduced Sol Villasana who gave us an excellent history of "Little Mexico", a barrio on Harry Hines



where the North Texas tollway ends in Uptown. Sol is a civil trial lawyer as well as a speaker and writer. His book is based on research, pictures

and his own growing up in this area of Dallas.

Mexicanos had lived in Dallas since mid-19 century. The social displacement created by the Mexican Revolution of 1910, however, caused the emergence of a distinct and vibrant neighborhood on the edge of downtown Dallas. The neighborhood consisted of modest homes, small businesses, churches and schools Further immigration from Mexico in the 1920's caused the "Little Mexico" to boom By 1930, the population was over 15,000 people. The railroad depot was situated in this area and actually throughout Dallas, barrios sprang up around these hubs of transportation and commerce. Sol showed us pictures of the streets and railway cars filled with people, in front of schools and churches.

One interesting picture was of the Jewish

synagogue that became The First Mexican Baptist church. This area had been a Polish Jewish community starting in the 1880s and it was known as "Little Jerusalem" before transitioning into "Little Mexico" beginning in 1919. The Cathedral of Guadalupe was originally in this area before moving downtown. The community center was called Pike Park (about a 5 acre area). The city of Dallas recreated the first park in this area known as Summit Play but renamed Pike Park with tennis courts, wading pools, and a baseball field. A two story field house was created in the Mission Revival style. The area became the central spot for celebrations for July 4 and other holidays for the residents of " Little Mexico". The top floor was removed in 1950 and in 1956 the City Council began urban renewal but that meant the destruction of homes and business and people began moving out to the suburbs. In 1969 to preserve the area, councilwoman Anita Martinez fought and succeeded renovating the Mission style building to its present form but it still has not been open for use. It is only an outdoor park surrounded by high rise buildings in Uptown.

Many city leaders and their families have contributed to Dallas and to our nation. Sol's own father along with many Mexican soldiers fought in World War II before becoming citizens

By the 1960s many residents were moving out of "Little Mexico" and a few landmarks were saved like the park with the Old Recreation Center Building. St. Anne's school and Old Dallas High School. By the end of the 20th century, it had all but disappeared, giving way to the upscale high-rise residences, hotels and office buildings. Many residents and their children from the "Little Mexico" area have continued in leadership roles. Many were elected to the Dallas school board, the zoning commission and City Council in this ever changing and vibrant city we call Dallas.

For the Endowment Fund and our future, we are targeting \$60 million in outright giving and \$80 million in commitments, totaling \$140 million. And we want to collect \$60 million in other contributions, such as direct giving, cash for global grants, and Disaster Response Fund donations
