"We shall consider at this convention the great problems which are confronting the world today, and we shall discuss frankly and candidly and in the best of spirit the methods which we shall follow in carving out the program of our organization. One item uppermost in our minds is the business trend. Years ago Rotary International launched upon a program to bring about a better condition in business. We were certain then, and are confident now, that where where there are good men in business, lying and cheating should be more difficult, truth and candor and fair dealing should be easier and more popular. Where there are good men in society, grossness of thought and speech ought to stand rebuked, high ideals and chivalrous actions and all that makes a man ought to seem at once more desirable and more attainable to every one who comes on contact with them. There is a loftier ambition than merely to stand high in the world. It is to stoop down and k=lift other men a little higher.

('Mobility' cont. from pg. 1) important For polio survivors in Burkina Faso, the opportunity to be independently mobile in their own communities can be life changing.

For children living in poor communities

whose limbs are paralyzed by polio, there is often very little support available to make them independently mobile. Giving a child a wheelchair puts previously inaccessible opportunities within reach so that children can reach their potential; going to school, playing outside with friends and

learning new skills.

Rotary International, along with their local partners to provide services and facilities for children, teenagers, young mothers and people with disabilities often caused by polio.

> The tricycles are very sturdy and custom-made by people with disabilities. They are hand-cranked by the individuals to navigate the difficult roads of Burkina Faso. A wider version is available for adults riding with children.
