Breaking Down Barriers: Rotary Projects Empower Girls and Women Across the World excerpted from Rotary Voices, by Claudia Urbano, Rotary Service and Engagement staff

International Women's Day on 8 March celebrates the achievements and potential of women around the world. Despite significant progress in advancing the rights, agency, and autonomy of women, many girls and women still face barriers to reaching their full potential

Rotary works on projects that empower girls and women by breaking down these barriers. Here are a few examples:

Hygiene education and access to toilets for girls attending school in Uganda. Imagine missing school days because you lack access to sanitary products and an adequate toilet. The shame and discomfort associated with inadequate sanitation facilities not only disrupt education but also reinforce harmful gender inequalities. Efforts by the Ugandan government, Rotary clubs, and USAID are improving the situation through infrastructure development, educational workshops, and advocacy.

Mark Kashar introduced our speaker today, Mark Melton, the founthe Dallas Eviction Advocacy Center.



He said he provides legal services for \$1 Billion in multi-family real estate. He also doesn't want to let anybody be evicted illegally. In 2020 people were told to stay home, but the

rent was still due. He said that there is virtue bias; that succesful people are good people, hard-working and intelligent, but that poor people are lazy or stupid. When something bad happens, people say they must have done something to deserve it. At the time the county passed a rent moratorium. People started calling him, wanting to know what

was going to happen. He said he started researching eviction law. He set up a website dealing with eviction in 2020. He put out a call on social media and fifty lawyers volunteered, and 120 families were saved from eviction. In 2021 he changed the name to what it is now and hired two lawyers. They had 120 cases and won 97% of them because the landlords do it wrong 97% of the time. The landlords should let the tenants stay one month. Texas is not friendly to renters. Renters can be evicted in ten days. They don't have time to get another pay check or borrow the money or find another place to live. It contributes to the increasing homeless population. Most evictions are single moms with kids. He asked why is there 97% noncompliance rate among land-. lords. A social economist said that people will act rationally whether or not it is legal. In making a decision, one asks what are the chances you get caught. What are the consequences. Before COVID 1% of renters had lawyers. The landlords would go to court and the judge would rubber stamp the eviction. The problem is not with eviction; the problem is with unlawful eviction. Both sides should follow the law, Last year there were 3700 evictions in Dallas County. He wanted to represent all of them. Every eviction must go through JP court. There are ten JP courts. He wanted to be there and represent every renter who walked through the doorl. He wanted to reach saturation, so that everyone would have to follow the law. If you are in court you can offer services to the renters. The burden of proof is on the landlord. If the tenant had a lawyer, they lost only 7% of the time. If the tenant did nor have a lawyer, they lost 74% of the time. You have rights in this country if you can defend them. In reality the rule of law is not for everybody. They have not reached saturation yet. They have sixteen lawyers, but need fifteen to twenty to cover all the dockets. They want to create accountability. If the culture of noncom-pliance is formed they should lose every time.

Maasai Women Make Cleanliness Their Business in Kenva: Working in conjunction with the Rotary Club of Evanston, the Maii Masafi Initiative has been managing and implementing the Soap for Water Program within the Maasai community in Kenya. The Maasai women played a key role in identifying the problems and solutions, and they now manage the water re-sources and a soapmaking business. The project has improved the health and livelihoods of the Maasai women and their families. 
