Curt Hazelbaker, President and CEO YMCA of Metropolitan Dallas

Curt Hazelbaker serves as the President and CEO of the YMCA of Metropolitan Dallas. Curt began his YMCA career in 1983 as a Day Camp Counselor at the YMCA of Metropolitan Dallas. He served in a variety of positions in Dallas, rising to Vice President of Operations before leaving to join the YMCA of Northwest North Carolina in March 2003 as Senior Vice President and Chief Operating Officer. Curt was named interim President and Chief Executive Officer of the YMCA of Northwest North Carolina in July 2007 and after a nationwide search, he accepted the position in January 2008. He spent 14 years with the YMCA of Northwest North Carolina before coming back to where he started his career in Dallas to accept the position of President and CEO, a role in which he's served since January 2017.

Curt is active on the state, regional and national levels with the Y, serving on the Executive Committee of the Texas State Alliance of YMCAs and currently serves at the Chair for

YNAN (YMCA North American Network that encompasses the largest Ys in North America). He served on the North American YMCA Development Organization or NAYDO from 2008-2018 chairing the group from 2012-2015. Curt also served as a member of the YMCA of the USA Board of Directors from 2013-2017.

Curt holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Texas at Dallas and a certificate in nonprofit management from Duke University. He is married to Melody and they have two daughters, Maddie and Caroline. Curt spends his free time with his family, is active in his church, and enjoys honing his woodworking skills and exercising.

The YMCA of Metropolitan Dallas is a nonprofit organization, serving almost 200,000 people annually via programs, outreach, and events throughout Collin, Dallas, Denton, Ellis, Palo Pinto, and Rockwall counties.

Ukrainian Rotaractor Describes Leaving Kiev, Creating Online Platform to Help from Rotary International By Iryna Bushmina, District 2232 (Ukraine) Rotaract Representative

I left Kiev in the first hours of the war. My sister, her husband, her 3-month-old baby and a cat were in the car. When we reached the border, men were already not allowed to leave the country, so I went on with my sister and a little nephew. We were five days in the car, six days until we got to Vienna. We stayed for the night in different countries three times. These were not hotels but homes of Rotary and Rotaract fami-lies. I used to just say that Rotary In-ternational is a big family, now I really believe it. And I am convinced that this is a family that will stand by you. These are no longer beautiful words to me, this is reality.

I was still in the car when I got the idea to mobilize Rotaract Europe. I realized that I was not the only one who needed help and support. My sister was driving, and I had my hands free. I started writing to all chats I knew where there were Rotaractors about the situation in Ukraine. A lot of Rotaractors instantly responded. People immediately created groups with different directions and helped me to lead them. These were not perfectly thought out projects, but they were projects that started working from the first day.

Rotaract responded very quickly, and I realized that we needed to start very rapidly with the small projects to help Rotarians and Rotaractors of Ukraine find accommodations in other countries. Now, the project has grown, and we are helping many Ukrainians find a new home for the first time. We have lined up more than 2,000 host families to take in refugees. The requests we are processing vary from assistance with relocating, to finding accommodations,

to providing other humanitarian support. Right now, there is a big request for help for the defense forces for helmets thermal imagers, body armor, and the like.



Some cities ask for simple things – food and water. And that's what hurts the most. Especially when we all realize that the Russian army is blocking us from bringing humanitarian aid to civilians and they are dying from hunger and dehydration.

There are more than 100 people in my international team alone and around 50 people in the Ukrainian team. I don't know exactly how many Rotaract members are involved in helping Ukraine. Each country has its own projects. Some clubs also organize assistance separately. Some are more involved, some less, (cont on pg.3)

President Happy Franklin called the meeting to order back at Maggiano's this week. Mary Bishop gave the invocation, noting that Sue Von Bieberstein was recovering from a lumpectomy. She also gave the time for the memorial service for Larry Farris, PP Karen's husband. Please continue to keep this family in your prayers. President Happy introduced our visitors and quests, which included PDG John Moser and a visiting Rotarian from York, England. Kyle Marmillion introduced our Marketplace Advertiser of the Week, Scott McLaughlin and Vista Bank. PDG

John Moser gave a report on the Rotary International Foundation. He began by saying that when he joined Rotary in 2008, RI had five causes in the Foundation: fighting disease, providing clean water, education, saving mothers and children and growing local economies. Then promoting peace and protecting the environment were added. The Foundation has run into problems with the Global Grant program. In 2012 they started global grants, which were very popular, which spent money out of the World Fund. In the last year there have been 2,066 global grants worth \$160 million. In addition there have been fifty-five disaster grants worth \$3.1 million. All of that money comes from the World Fund. When you make your annual donation, half of it goes to the World Fund. It is important to continue to contribute to the RI Foundation. The other half of the money comes back to the district for district grants. Last year there were 467 district grants to clubs across the district. Last year they received \$100,000. When clubs match that it makes an impact in the District. He went on to say that last year was remarkable for the way that clubs found ways to do service projects. The District also gained one new club, even though they lost individual members.

Holly Hollenbeck gave her Membership Minute speaking about engagement. She asked that we think of ways to engage not only new members, but also members who don't come verv often. She also reminded us that we are each others friends and are here for each other.

PP Richard Stanford introduced our speaker today, David McCloskey, author of Damascus Station. He began by saying that after working for secretive organizations, it was interesting to be able to talk about things. The book is set in the early phases of the Syrian civil war in 2010-11. The book is about espionage, love and being humanin an un-human conflict. He said he began working at the CIA when he was nineteen and did two summer internships. When he joined full time, Syria was no big deal. Soon Syria started its civil war. Hw lived in Damascus and it was hard to see a country tear itself apart. What most people know about espionage comes from Hollywood, and is hopelessly wrong. He said the CIA is a uniquely bipolar organization. It is as mundane as any other company. The managers send emails back and forth. However, the day to day job often carries some high stakes stuff. The point of what they do is to get information, and to discover "truth." As an analyst, he was taught to speak truth to power. It was sometimes fun to tell directors they were wrong. He saw real drone footage where you could see clearly small details. There is a lot about the CIA's failures in the press, but when you think about security, our advantage is our information capability over other countries. The technological breakthroughs complicate getting infor-mation because there is so much data. The amount of data doubles every two years. There is a lot of useful data from cell phones.
