Elizabeth Kellogg, CEO Equest

Elizabeth "Lili" Kellogg, is the CEO of Equest, a Therapeutic Horsemanship program in Dallas, and has been involved in the therapeutic riding industry since 1987. Before taking the helm at Equest she served as the Executive Director of SIRE in Houston, the Director of ManeGait Therapeutic Horsemanship in McKinney, TX, and the Program Director at Equest. Prior to moving to Texas in 1984, she served on the faculty in the Equine Management Department of the University of Minnesota Technical College, Waseca.

Lili, who received her BS in Animal Science from Colorado State University, is a PATH Intl. (Professional Association of Therapeutic Horsemanship International) Master certified instructor, Path Intl Accreditation Site Visitor, a PATH Intl. Equine Specialist, and PATH Intl. Certification Faculty/evaluator. She has coached equestrian teams at national and international levels including on Team USA at the 1996 Paralympics. Lili has served on numerous boards, committees and task forces and was the 2002 Recipient of the James Brady Professional Achievement Award, the highest honor in the Therapeutic Riding industry.

Equest's Mission: To enhance the quality of life for children and adults with diverse needs using horses to bring hope and healing through equine assisted activities and therapies. Our organization is not a United Way Agency. We are dependent upon charitable gifts and grants to support our programs.

Therapeutic Horsemanship: Our therapeutic riding instructors teach Equestrian skills to participants with special physical, cognitive, Sensory, Learning, social, or emotional needs.

Our instructors work with the riders to participate in a recognized sport, which helps develop independent skills that carry over to their everyday lives. Once they are mounted, many of our riders experience a freedom of motion and ability they simply don't or can't enjoy in other aspects of their lives.

Hippotherapy: Treatment with the help of a horse.

Equest's therapy services provide physical, occupational, and speech therapy using the movement of the horse to accomplish therapy treatment goals. In Hippotherapy the client receives treatment while mounted on the horse. Equine-assisted therapy may also affect psychological, cognitive, behavioral, and communication outcomes. All therapies are conducted by licensed professionals.

Ending Polio

Rotary, along with our partners, has reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent worldwide since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979. We are close to eradicating polio. Rotarians have helped immunize 2.5 Billion children against polio in 122 countries. For as little as \$0.60, a child can be protected against this crippling disease for life.

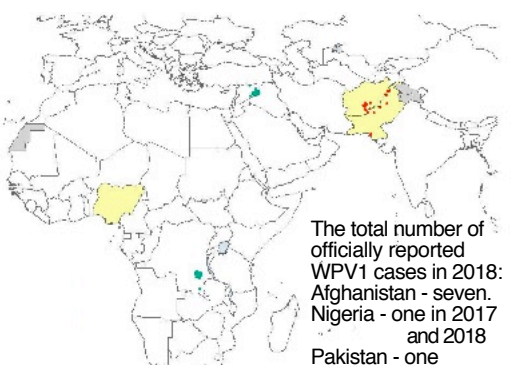
Today the fight to end polio is led by the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI), which includes Rotary International, UNICEF, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the World Health Organization (WHO), the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, and the

governments of the world, with the support of many others.

To end polio, the transmission of wild polio virus in the three remaining polio-endemic countries: Afghanistan, Nigeria and Pakistan. Other countries must be kept polio free until certification is achieved and polio is officially eradicated. Until then, up to sixty high-risk countries continue to operate large-scale immunization campaigns to protect children against polio.

As ending polio gets closer, disease detection must be increased to ensure the virus is truly gone. Given that only one in two hundred cases results in paralysis, the program's extensive

laboratory network must be relied on to detect where polio does, or does not, exist.

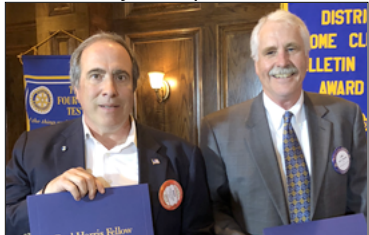
