Chad Houser, Founder, CEO, Exec. Chef Café Momentum

Always one to add a little levity to the conversation, Chad often describes Café Momentum as "taking kids out of jail and teaching them to play with knives and fire." But levity aside, it's this charisma and passion to teach life, social and employment skills to Dallas' most at-risk youth that makes Houser a hit with everyone from philanthropists and dinner-goers to the young people participating in the program. After 17 years as a chef Chad sold his partnership of Parigi Restaurant to devote his full attention to the role of Executive Director of Café Momentum in 2012.

In the community, Chad has previously served as President of the board of directors for Dallas Farmers Market Friends and as Vice Chair of the El Centro Exes Association (Houser received his culinary training at El Centro) where is also a member of the El Centro College Food and Hospitality Institute "Hall of Fame."

Just last month, Chad received national recognition as a CNN Hero for his work to with Cafe Momentum. At the end of last year Chad and Café Momentum were featured in the Starbucks

production of Upstanders Season 2, a series created to shine a light on stories of everyday Americans who are doing extraordinarily courageous things. He has also appeared on The Rachael Ray Show, The Chew, The Hero Effect and Pickler & Ben.

Chad has received multiple nominations from D Magazine for "Best Up-And-Coming Chef" (2010) and "Best Chef" (2011 and 2012). In 2011, he received the Edible Dallas/Fort Worth "Local Hero – Chef" award. In 2017 and again for 2018 Chad has been named in the Best 500 Business Leaders in Dallas.

Chad was also selected as Dallas Business Journal's "40 Under 40," and as one of the United States Junior Chamber's (Jaycee) 2015 Ten Outstanding Young Americans. He has been named to the "Top 50 Under 40" by the Social Enterprise Alliance, an "Urban Innovator to Watch" by the New Cities Foundation, as one of "30 Most Interesting People in the Metro Area" by the Dallas Observer, and one of Good Magazine's "Good 100," individuals at the cutting edge of creative impact across the globe.

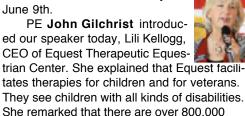

tates therapies for children and for veterans. They see children with all kinds of disabilities. She remarked that there are over 800,000 people with disabilities in the Metroplex. One in six children has some developmental disability, and one in sixty-two has autism. She also noted that twenty veterans in the U.S. commits suicide every day. One in every four children with intellectual disabilities has no significant interaction with their peers. She explained why therapy with horses works. Horses walk in as similar way as humans, so riding a horse mimics the same walking pattern; the body is constantly shifting, making little adjustments to stay with the horse. It strengthens the muscles, but is not weightbearing; there is no stress to the joints, but they are constantly opening and closing, which increases the circulation. Additional benefits include gaining self-confidence from riding. For veterans it helps to make their transition smoother and more positive and leads to wellness. It works because the horse mirrors what we feel; if the veteran is angry, the horse is agitated, but if the rider is calm, the horse is calm. They also coach para-equestrian teams. They teach horsemanship, teaching people to ride. Hippotherapy includes occupational, physical and speech therapies. announced Horses for Heroes has severed four hundred veterans and their families. Equest has also partnered with Dallas ISD for children in special education and for vocational training. They have an industry education project with four hundred volunteers. She remarked that good therapy horses are very hard to find; they must be well-trained, and also tolerant.

History of the Rotary Club of Park Cities

By 1948 Highland Park, University Park and North Dallas had become a sizable and important segment od Greater Dallas. The Rotary Club of Dallas determined that the time had come to establish the Rotary Club of Park Cities (RCPC). An extension committee of eight prominent members of the Dallas Club was formed to sponsor and guide the organization of a new club. The Charter Banquet was held on June 11, 1948, with the induction of sixty charter members. Jim Maxfield was elected its first president.

The club began meeting on Fridays at noon in the ballroom of the Melrose Hotel in the then suburban area of Oak Lawn. The Club continued to meet there until 1975 when the facility could no longer adequately accommodate its 230 members. Over the next several years the Club met at a number of sites before moving to Maggiano's Little Italy Restaurant in NorthPark Center in 2000.

In the early years Rotary was more formal than it is today. The membership was exclusively male professionals - doctors, attorneys, educators, clergy, corporate executives, managers and many business owners. The classification system was rigid, and if there were no openings, perspective members were turned away until the time when there was an opening. Business suits and ties were the dress code of the time. The Annual Banquet for the Installation of Officers and the Board of Directors was a gala black tie affair held at the Dallas Country Club until 1985.

In 1987, Rotary eliminated the gender restriction for membership. Karen Farris and Honor Franklin were the first Rotarians to

become members under the new rule later that year. Lynn Garison Shoop was our first woman president in 1998-1999.

In 2002 Bob Heard was selected by the Park Cities Exchange Club to become the Grand Marshall of the Park Cities Fourth of July Parade. Heard asked Roy Washburn if the Club would like to begin sponsoring the Park Cities Fourth of July Parade. Through Roy Washburn's leadership, the Club agreed to take over the Parade and has sponsored it since July 2003.

In the 2004-2005 Rotary year, Rotary International celebrated its 100th birthday. To recognize this historic milestone, RCPC committed to build ChildsPlay at Bachman Lake. This barrier free playground is now open to all children, but is specifically designed to accommodate those children with disabilities. At a cost of over \$500,000, the playground was completed in the summer of 2005. For this accomplishment, the Club was recognized by Rotary District 5810 with the 2005-2006 Spirit of Cooperation Award and the Advocate Award by the Texas Recreation and Parks Society. In 2015 under the leadership of Club President Karen Farris, the Club raised over \$250,000 to purchase a refrigerated food pantry truck for the purpose of distributing free, fresh produce to the social and economic needy areas of Dallas.

The Rotary Club of Park Cities and its individual members have received numerous awards from District 5810, Rotary International and the community for its service to mankind.
