Program Chair of the Day: Happy Franklin



**Paige McDaniel**, President and CEO, Community Partners of Dallas Leadership in Tough Times

Paige McDaniel is the president and CEO of Community Partners of Dallas, a non-profit agency dedicated to serving the abused and neglected children of Dallas County through the caseworkers of Child Protective Services. Community Partners of Dallas was founded in 1989 and has since been replicated in over 155 cities throughout Texas. As CEO, Paige is responsible for the administration of the agency's 4 programs, including the Rainbow Room, an emergency resource center providing essential items to children in transition to foster or relative care. More than 15,000 children are served by Community Partners of Dallas each year.

Prior to joining Community Partners of Dallas, Paige served as executive director of Wipe Out Kids' Cancer, a Dallas fundraising organization that supports pediatric cancer research at Children's Medical Center of Dallas. Before moving to Wipe Out Kids' Cancer, she worked in development for the Dallas Symphony Orchestra. Paige also served as a political appointee in Washington, D.C. for the Honorable William J. Bennett in both the Reagan and Bush administrations at the Department of Education and the Office of National Drug Control Policy.

Paige graduated from Southwestern University in Georgetown, Texas, with a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in theatre. Paige has a long history of voluntarism in the Dallas community. She is a founding member of the Contemporaries of the Dallas Symphony Orchestra, a past sustaining president of the Junior League of Dallas, a graduate of Leadership Dallas, and is a member of The Dallas Assembly and the Association of Fundraising Professionals, among others.

She was recognized as a Texan with Character by CBS– 11 and is a long-time member and volunteer at Highland Park United Methodist Church.

#### Last Friday's Update from Sarah Oliai

Sarah reported that as of Wed, May 18, the total was 885,090 meals During May every dollar donated is doubled, so each dollar provides six meals.

At the May 20 meeting Oncore contributed \$7,500, yielding 45,000 meals. Jackson Harkey contributed \$300, for 1800 meals. Members donated over \$200, for 1200 meals.

Total so far = over 948,290 meals! Donate in May and double your impact!

who Dallas was named after Most people believe it was named after the Vice President, but at the time there are others named Dallas, as well. On3 of the most interesting stories is about the Reunion Colony. The book Sabotaged by Jim Pratt is about it. It was a kind of Utopian colony made up of French, Belgian and German setlers. The location was in West Dallas and many of them are buried in a cemetery near Pinkston HS. The problem was that they were very artistic people but they didn't know how to farm. That part of Dallas is not verv fertile, so they lasted a while but then broke up. They gave Dallas a different flavotr than any other frontier town. They made Dallas their home and gave Dallas a cultural edge. Downtown Dallas burned in the 1860s but the names of the old families are still familiar. Alexander Cockrell was the Dallas Coun-
