Program Chair of the Day: Cub Amos



Colonel Ronald Forest, US Army, Ret. Veterans Day

Colonel Forest, a native of South Carolina, moved to Coppell, with his wife Redon and family from Washington, D. C. upon his completion of 30 years of military service in 1993.

He holds a BS from Clemson U. and MA from Webster U. His military education includes the Army Command & General Staff College, Ft Leavenworth, and the Army War College, Carlisle, PA.

During his 30-year military career, Col. Forest served in command and staff positions in Korea, Vietnam, Germany, and various stateside posts prior to his assignment to Washington, D.C. While in our Nation's Capitol, he worked in the Pentagon for the Joint Chiefs of Staff (JCS), followed by a tour of duty at the On-Site Inspection Agency (OSIA), Office, Secretary of Defense (OSD). His assignments in DC involved matters of National Security concerning Nuclear, Chemical, and Conventional Arms Control Treaties and Agreements.

During the period 1985-1987, Col. Forest was the JCS Representative to the NATO Special Consultative Commission that met

on a regular basis in Brussels, Belgium, to implement modernization of Allied Nuclear Forces during the 1980s Cold War. He also served as a JCS Military Advisor to the Intermediate-Range Nuclear Forces (INF) Treaty Negotiations in Geneva. Those talks led to the historic INF Treaty to eliminate an entire class of nuclear missiles. The Treaty was signed by President Reagan and Soviet General Secretary Gorbachev in Dec. 1987. He was honored, along with other members of the US Delegation, by President Reagan in the White House in January 1988, for the work that culminated in the accomplishment of this important national security objective.

From 1988 to 1993, Col. Forest worked at OSIA as Director of Operations and as Chief of Staff, where he planned, coordinated, and led diplomatic missions into the former Soviet Union and Warsaw Pact Nations. His responsibilities involved inspections, as well as escort duties of military facilities in the US, and abroad in accordance with United States obligations under international treaties and agreements.

Herb Ziev introduced our Marketplace Advertiser of the Week, **Raymond Goodson**, a consulting engineer. PP **Greg Pape** remarked on our banner that was awarded to the club for having 100% of our membership Paul Harris Fellows. He then called up PP **Phillip Bankhead** and recognized him as a sixth level Paul Harris Fellow. He also recognized **Elaine Allen** who was wearing a "Girls Just Want To Have Funds" sweater to remind everyone that they needed to make their EREY contributions for the year, if they have not already done so. **Patsy Watson** introduced our newest member **Nathalie Baier**. She was a member previously, but had to discontinue because of her work. President **Paul** and PP **Phillip Bankhead** introduced our new Honorary Member, **Karl Kuby**. **Karl** said he had just returned from Germany, and his home town has four Rotary Clubs in it; his cousin is the President of one of them.



Valerie Pelan introduced our speaker today, **Brad Mall**, a co-founder of Oak Highlands Brewery. She said that he had started a brewery after spending eighteen years



as an attorney with a law firm. He began by explaining that his family was from Germany. He said that historically, the first laws and rituals included beer, and one of the first known writings was a recipe for beer. Beer was important because it purified water and also provided vitamin and minerals as a part of the diet. He started brewing beer while he was in college, but his first attempts were not very good. However, he kept improving and began entering contests, then began winning them. Recently his Oktoberfest Beer was awarded third best in the US. There are forty-six craft breweries in Texas, with a \$4.5 million in economic impact. He said beer laws in Texas are different than the laws for any other liquor. You cannot go to a brewery and buy beer to go, even though it would benefit the economy. The laws were written after Prohibition was repealed. The consolidation of the big breweries gave them a bigger market share. However, recently the overall market share for beer has decreased 2%, while the market share for craft beer has increased 5%. However, there is a cap on production; if you make more than 40,000 barrels, then the brewery must have a contract with a distributor who gets 30% off the top. Also, beer and ale are treated differently. Any beer with more than 5% alcohol is considered ale; ale can only be sold in the county where it is made. He has distributors in Ft. Worth and San Antonio, but would like to open a brewery in Houston. He sells to over 750 restaurants and groceries in the DFW area. He employs thirteen people full time. He said he believes it is a privilege to do what he does. If the shackles, which favor the large brewers, were taken off of the craft breweries, they would double their economic impact. His brewery is kid friendly; his tap room is open several evenings a week and is a place where families can come. They have games for kids and a large TV, so people can sit and enjoy the beer.

As a 1LT, Forest deployed to Vietnam with the 1st Cavalry Division and served as an artillery forward air observer during the division's fierce combat in the Ia Drang Valley in Nov. 1965. The movie "We Were Soldiers", was based on that battle. Col. Forest continues to be an active member of the 1st Cavalry, 7th Cavalry, and 21st Artillery Associations. His decorations and awards include the DSSM, Legion of Merit, Bronze Star, Air Medals, Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Army Meritorious Service Medal, Army Commendation Medal, Army, JSC, and OSD Staff Badges, and various Campaign Ribbons, Certificates and Foreign Decorations.

Col. Forest is a member of several national military and patriotic organizations. He is Past Commander of Dallas American Legion Post #581, Past Commander of Dallas Chapter of the Military Order of The World Wars, Life member of the VFW, and is a member of the Military Offi-
