party system because it dreates competition, both in business and in politics. he believes the best things are created through the competition of ideas, but when one side always wins, then he believes th quality of the ideas starts to

decrease. The legislature will face one of the biggest challenges a legislature can face. It is not a shortfall; those just require across the board cuts. We have a generally conservative outlook on spending which has served us well. However, we have a surplus, which is more difficult because it requires that you spend money responsibly. If you create something new, there may not be money to pay for it in future vears. This year our surplus is \$27 billion. The state's biennial budget is \$250 billion, so why do we have this surplus? The Texas economy came roaring back after COVID; also prices are up due to inflation which brings in more sales tax revenue and high rate for oil and gas are generating more revenue. It is a difficult, daunting task to spend the surplu respnsibly. There is a constitutional limit on how much can go to the Rainy Day Fund. Some of the surplus coulc be spent on infrastructure: spending on it has fallen off in the last few years. Some of the governmental services have been underfunded, also. The governments computers are very outdated. He said that if the state does not invest in infrastructure, it will not be as successful in the future, There are so many things that Texas has going for it. He is glad that some groups are using "empieical politics" which gathers data to make recommendations. One critical issue is water, but there must be a long term plan. He believes that some of the surplus should be spent on education, which whill also take some of the pressure off of taxes. He is optimistic that there will be bi-partisan cooperation on public education. Another important issue before the legislature is health, including mental health. Mental health has been underfunded in the past. School safety is also an issue, and may be given additional funds. He thinks that good laws will be passed.

Rotary and WHO's World Polio Day 2022 and Beyond Event in Geneva Brought Health Experts Together to Share Updates, Exchange Ideas

Global health leaders expressed confidence that polio will be eradicated worldwide and praised the frontline workers who are striving to achieve that goal during an event at the World Health Organization headquarters in Geneva, October, 21-22,

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL

Sponsored by Rotary International and WHO, World Polio Day 2022 and Beyond updated participants and viewers on the status of polio eradication. It also discussed possible community-based solutions that go beyond immunizations to improve the health of mothers and children.

Dr. Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, directorgeneral of WHO, speaking at the opening session, said that polio eradication is within reach. He cited the fact that the work of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) has reduced cases by 99.9%, from 350,000 in 1988 to only six cases last year.

However, he acknowledged that the global effort has lost ground this year, with 20 cases in Pakistan and two in Afghanistan. Those are the only two countries where the transmission of the wild poliovirus has never been stopped. But the diagnosis of a polio case in the U.S., and the detection of poliovirus in sewage in the United Kingdom "show that polio will remain a global threat until it is eradicated everywhere." Polio cases have also been found in Malawi and Mozambique last year and this year.

Polio immunization programs for children have faced historic disruption, largely because of the COVID-19 pandemic, which has added to the challenges. "Without concerted action, we could lose the gains we have made," Dr. Tedros added. - excerpted from an article on the RI website
