PP Eric Heitkamp introduced our speaker today, Dr. Michael Rugg, Director of the Center for Vital Lon-



gevity at the University of Texas-Dallas. He studies changes in the brains we grow older and the difference between people who will age successfully from those who don't.

This is an important problem and also a socioeconomic problem. Alzheimers disease is a key factor. Congress has mandated funding to the National institute for Health for Alzheimers research. The population pyramid shows the percentage of Americans by age, with the most either young or Baby Boomers in their sixties. By 2035 the number of people who are sixty or older will double. Alzheimers is largely a disease of old age; it is a demographic time bomb. Sixty to eighty percent of all dementia is due to Alzheimers. It is progressive, with no way to modify the course of the disease. The first noticeable symptom is memory loss, but the disease starts much earlier. The disease also involves impaired memory and attention, mental control, and language, with personality changes. There are a number of risk factors, but no identifiable cause, only probability. The risk of Alzheimers doubles every five years after age seventy-five. There are also genetic factors that are risk factors. The best defense against Alzheimers is to stay healthy and to be physically fit. He said Azheimers is not an inevitable part of growing old.
