TODAY'S PROGRAM



Admiral Patrick M. Walsh Commander, U.S. Pacific Fleet

Admiral Patrick M. Walsh graduated with honors from Jesuit College Preparatory in Dallas and received both the Distinguished Graduate and Distinguished Alumnus awards. He graduated from the United States Naval Academy in 1977 with a Bachelor of Science degree.

Walsh began operational flying with the "Golden Dragons" of Attack Squadron 192. He then reported to Air Test and Evaluation Squadron 5 as an Operational Test director until selection to the Navy Flight Demonstration Squadron, "Blue Angels." When he returned to the fleet, Walsh joined the "Golden Warriors" of Strike-Fighter Squadron 87 as the Operations Officer.

Walsh commanded the "Gunslingers" of Strike-Fighter Squadron 105. He commanded Carrier Air Wing 1 aboard USS John F. Kennedy (CV 67), and Carrier

Group 7/USS John C. Stennis Strike Group. He also commanded U.S. Naval Forces Central Command and U.S. 5th Fleet, while commanding the Combined Maritime Forces conducting Operations Enduring Freedom, Iraqi Freedom and maritime security operations. Prior to his assignment to U.S. Pacific Fleet, he served as the 35th Vice Chief of Naval Operations. Walsh has been a special assistant to the Director of the Office of Management and Budget as a White House Fellow. He chaired the Department of Leadership, Ethics and Law at the U.S. Naval Academy, served as the executive assistant to the Chief of Naval Personnel, and reported to the Joint Staff for his first flag assignment as the deputy director for Strategy and Policy, (J-5). He also served concurrently as the director, Navy Quadrennial Defense Review and Director, Navy Pro-

gramming Division. He attended graduate studies in the International Relations curriculum at the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, Tufts University, as part of the Admiral Arthur S. Moreau Scholarship Program. Walsh graduated first in his class and received a Master of Arts in Law and Diplomacy, entered the Doctorate Program with distinction and subsequently received a Ph.D.

His awards and decorations include the Distinguished Service Medal (2), Defense Superior Service Medal, Legion of Merit (4), Meritorious Service Medal (2), Air Medal w/ Combat V, Strike/Flight Medal (5), Navy Commendation Medal (3) w/ Combat V, Navy Achievement Medal, Presidential Service Badge, and various other awards.

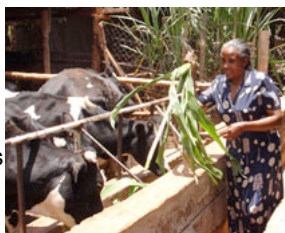
Rotary and Oikocredit launch strategic partnership

develop effective approaches, and structure training programs to improve entrepreneurs' business skills.

President **Rick Amsberry** called the meeting to order. **Charlie Bond** gave the invocation; and said that there were no members ill or in the



hospital. **Kirby Warnock** led the Pledge of Allegiance and "The Star Spangled Banner," followed by "Texas, Our Texas." **Charlie Bond** returned to introduce our visitors and guests, which included former RCPC member **Helmut**

Delius and a long-distance visiting Rotarian from Evanston, IN. **Dax Seale** recognized The Hub and web advertisers of the week. **Greg Pape**



remarked on all that Rotarians do to make a difference. He quoted Stephen Covey on the characteristics of great achievers, then recognized some of the great achievers in RCPC, Drs. **Michael Rainwater, Moody Alexander, and Roy Washburn**, for their dental care to the community, and **Charlie Bond** who is one of Dallas's most substantial contributors to the Rotary Foundation. He

then recognized **Alan Winn** as a Major Donor to the Rotary Foundation.



Howard Fitch introduced our speaker today, Dr. Bob McClelland who is the last living surgeon who

attended President Kennedy in the Emergency Room of Parkland Hospital. He said he was in his second year at Parkland in 1963. When he got the notice that President Kennedy had been shot and was being brought to Parkland, he went to the ER. One of the first things he saw was Mrs. Kennedy sitting on a folding chair in her bloody clothing. When he actually walked into the trauma room he saw the President lying on his back, and two other staff surgeons already exploring a small neck wound. Dr. McClelland said he moved to the head of the gurney, and then he saw the massive wound at the back of the President's head. He said he could look down into the President's skull and see that the back half of his brain had been blown out. Then as he watched, the right half of the President's cerebellum fell out. He went on to say that the nature of the wound and his own research, has led him to believe that President Kennedy was first shot from the back as the motorcade turned on to Elm Street, then he was shot again from the front as if by a high-powered rifle from the picket fence on the grassy knoll. He said that there is accumulating evidence that it was a shot from the grassy knoll that caused the fatal head wound. Later, he also attended Lee Harvey Oswald. By the time he arrived, Oswald was being resuscitated, but he believes the nature of the wound kept him from being saved. Rather than the bullet going straight through, Oswald had turned just as the shot was fired so the bullet traveled across his abdomen, injuring the two main blood vessels.

Dr. McClelland brought the blood-stained shirt that he had worn as he worked on President Kennedy in the ER.

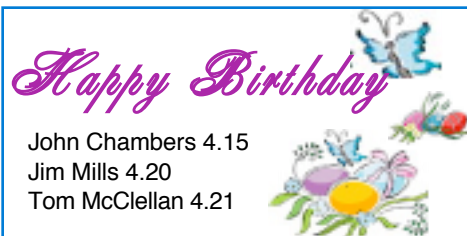
