Montgomery, Jr., a native of Millington, TN, received his Bachelor of Science degree from University of Central Oklahoma in Edmond, and earned his Master's degree in Public Health, Hospital Administration, from the University of California at Berkeley. He completed his Administrative Residency at Baylor University Medical Center and worked for five years on the staff at Parkland Hospital.

He joined the staff of Texas Scottish Rite Hospital for Children in 1974 and was named President in 1989. J. C. is a fellow of the American College of Healthcare Executives and serves on numerous professional, civic and Masonic organizations. He holds the distinction of Grand Cross. Scottish Rite Mason. His wife is Lark Montgomery.

Texas Scottish Rite Hospital for Children is a world leader in the treatment of pediatric orthopedic conditions. They strive to improve the care of children worldwide through innovative research and teaching programs, training physicians from around the world.

TSRHC treats Texas children with orthopedic conditions, such as scoliosis. clubfoot, hand disorders, hip disorders and limb length differences, as well as certain related neurological disorders and learning disorders, such as dyslexia.

The hospital was established in 1921 when a group of Texas Masons approach ed Dallas's first orthopedic surgeon Dr. W. B. Carrell about caring for children with polio regardless of the family's ability to pay. With the introduction of the Salk and Sabin vaccines in the mid-1950s, which virtually eradicated polio in the Western Hemisphere, TSRHC broadened its focus to other orthopedic conditions.

As a leading pediatric orthopedic center, the hospital has treated more than 200,000 children since its inception, with more than 40,000 clinic visits each year. The hospital takes a multidisciplinary approach to care, tailoring treatment to the individual needs of each child and family.

Admission is open to Texas children from birth up to 18 years of age. TSRHC, the only Scottish Rite hospital in the world, is not affiliated with the Shriners Hospitals for Children.

and guests, including incoming DG Sandy Forster and several members of the Hillcrest H.S. Interact Club and their spon-



sors. Paul Pirok introduced The

Hub and the web advertisers Fred Brown introduced three new Frank Monroe Fellows, Tracy Gomes, Scott Sar-

gent, and Elizabeth Hart. Fred then awarded the latest grant, \$2500 to St. Simons for their after school program. They pay teachers to provide after school activities for at-risk children in Kindergarten through third grades. Currently,



they are providing this program for over six hundred children. Greg Pape recognized Charlie Bond for his substantial support for the Rotary Foundation. Every year he recognizes an RCPC member with the Jere Elliott award, named for his father-in-law who was



also a member of RCPC and who founded Elliott's Harfdware. The recipient who was named a Paul Harris Fellow this

vear was Tom Stutz.

Lt. Patrick Jones also welcomed RCPC to the Salvation Army. Our speaker today was Major Ron Raymer, the assistant director of the Salvation Army's more than three hundred



centers of operations in Texas. Major Raymer began by saying that nobody's is perfect, but that the relationship between the Salvation Army and the Rotary Club is getting it right. He noted that some RCPC members are in the Salvation Army Board. He also noted the work that the members of Interact have done to prepare for Angel Tree and that young people in the Salvation Army's band program have marched in the RCPC 4th of July Parade. He said that in the last twelve years they have received about \$250,000 for their red kettle campaign, which has gone to feed the hungry, to shelters and permanent housing for the homeless, to pay for rent, utilities and medicines for senior citizens, to programs that provide a safe place for children after school, and for other Salvation Army ministries. He also noted that some of the people who are helped are able to give back. He told of a boy who raised several thousand dollars for Angel Tree because several years before his family had been helped by the program. He concluded by saying that no man is an island and that that is also true of the Salvation Army.




