Kirby Warnock Tales of the Big Bend: The People, Places and Things West of the Pecos

k irby Warnock is a 1974 graduate of Baylor Univeristy with a degree in history. For twenty years he published *Big Bend Quarterly*, a guide to the folklore, history and tourist attractions of the Big Bend. His family reads like a Who's Who of the Big Bend, with uncle Barton Warnock the revered botanist of the region with a cactus and two buildings named in his honor, grandfather Roland a pioneer road builder with a park and road named after him and father Dr. Frank Warnock a recognized paleontologist with a display of mammoth tusks in Fort Stockton's Annie Riggs Museum.

He'll present a program on the people, places and things that make the Big Bend of Texas unique, and what many call "the last frontier." Big Bend is part of the vast Chihuahuan Desert that extends from Central Mexico into Southern New Mexico. In the Big Bend, three basic life zones are found: Desert, River, and Mountain. The Chisos Mountains have been compared to a green island in a desert sea, hiding a remnant Alpine forest that developed in wetter cooler times tens of thousands of years ago.

The low desert appears barren, but it is home to a many species of small mammals, reptiles and birds. The Rio

Grande is a ribbon oasis, harboring a menagerie of riparian and aquatic species, as well as providing an important stop over for migratory fowl every spring and fall. Big Bend is a complete geology textbook. Remains of the second largest flying creature known to have existed were discovered in Big Bend.

Human history began with some of the earliest human activity recorded on the continent, 9000 years ago. Since then there is a long and fascinating human history associated with the region. Though the region is remote from the rest of humanity, local events and circumstances have played important roles on the world stage of history.



He introduced Nicole Small, the CEO of the museum. She is an advocate for math and science education through the museum. They

partner with local school districts and also do teacher training. The building itself is a great exhibition of technology. It is 180.000 square feet, and will have exhibits interesting to those who are "pre-K to gray." The building is very accessible and is filled with light. Eighty percent of the building is accessible to the public. There is also a nature park in front of the building. The halls include Life Then and Now, Birds, The Universe, our dynamic Earth, Energy, Gem and Mineral, biodiversity of Life, Being Human, Engineering and Innovation, the Children's Museum for ages 1 to 5, and a Sports Hall focusing on math and science. Currently, Dallas is not able to stage traveling exhibits, but they will be able to once the new museum opens. Forrest continued that the Houston Museum of Natural Science was the third most visited museum in the U.S. The Dallas Museum will be equally world-class. No city or state funding has been used to build the museum. They are building an endowment into their fundraising. There will be an admission fee to the museum, but they are planning to have a lot of scholarships available for children who would not be able to afford the fee.






