The Rotary Chorus Service Through Song

or over half a century. the Greater Dallas Rotary Chorus has helped to create a fund of goodwill for the city of Dallas, both at home and abroad. It has participated in many civic and patriotic events and has raised thousands of dollars in charitable services.

Rotary clubs in many parts of Texas have sponsored programs featuring the chorus, enabling them to support projects such as community parks, public swimming pools, educational scholarships, and international youth exchanges.

Throughout its history, the chorus has pleased small and large audiences appearing about twenty times each season. The sound of the chorus has filled the Dallas

Fair Park Music Hall, New York's Madison Square Garden, San Francisco's Cow Palace, Salt Lake City's Mormon Tabernacle, Denver's Red Rock Amphitheater, the Royal Garden of Japan, and Gloucester Cathedral in England, as well as churches, hospitals, prisons, and schools, and at banquets and barbecues closer to home.

They have performed at many Rotary Conventions around the world, acting as Texas ambassadors of song. To harmonize with such diverse audiences, the chorus has sung everything from Grand Opera to Hard Rock.

The group never specifies a fee for their service, rather depending on the gracious response of the audience and their financial capability. The primary emphasis of the group is to serve through song.

The Chorus was formed in 1945. There are currently twenty-eight members, whose average age is around 70. Its current leader is Larry McClain. The oldest member, Ned Startzel, has been in the chorus since 1965.

Allison Griffin introduced our speaker today, Kirby Warnock, who spoke on the Big Bend. He began by explaining that the Big




Bend is named after the northward turn of the Rio Grande. Over ninety percent of the area is private ranchland. His father and uncle were raised on a ranch near

Fort Stockton: his grandfather had settled the ranch in 1919. His grandfather worked for the TX Highway Department and built all the paved roads, so he knew all the ranchers. Kirby's uncle was a Botanist at Sul Ross University, and he was sent by the federal government to catalog all the plants in the Big Bend National Park. His father was a paleontologist. Between them they knew all the ranchers and all the stories of the area. Kirby said he first saw the Marfa lights when he was eleven years old. He said there are reports of the lights for over a hundred years. but no one has ever (continued on next page)
