The National Center for Policy Analysis (NCPA) is a nonprofit, nonpartisan public policy research organization, established in 1983. Their goal is to develop and promote private, free-market alternatives to government regulation and control, solving problems by relying on the strength of the competitive, entrepreneurial private sector

They bring together the best and brightest minds to tackle the country's most difficult public policy problems, in health care, taxes, retirement, small business, and the environment. In doing so, we propose reforms that liberate consumers, workers, entrepreneurs and the power of the marketplace.

Sterling Burnett, Ph.D. is one of the country's leading authorities on energy and environmental issues. He is the lead analyst of the National Center for Policy Analysis' E-Team -- one of the largest collections of energy and environmental policy experts and scientists who believe that sound science, economic prosperity and protecting the environment can go hand in hand.

Burnett routinely discusses energy and environmental policy on national television and radio networks, including CNN Headline News, Fox News, and CNBC. His commentaries and articles have appeared in publications such as USA Today, The Washington Times, Washington Post, The Dallas Morning News, Houston Chronicle, Rocky Mountain News, and the Miami Herald.

A recognized scholar, Burnett has written

on numerous topics that affect every American, including government environmental policy, offshore drilling, global warming, endangered species, and public lands.

Burnett received his Ph.D. in 2001 from Bowling Green State University. He also received degrees from Southern Methodist University.

the door was the Getaway Table. He then asked those seated at another table to introduce themselves and tell when they joined the club; most had been members for over twenty





Charles Glover of Teach for America · Dallas Ft. Worth. The Founder and CEO of Teach for America

is a Highland Park ISD graduate. He believes that education really shapes the life trajectory. Teach for America is a non-profit organiza-

tion which places top college graduates in the lowest performing schools for a two-year commitment. The experience demonstrates that every one of the children can achieve. Statistics today show a very clear gap between those who have less and those who have more economically. About 45% of eighth graders in the Dallas area meet national standards in reading proficiency. Only 14% are prepared for college when they graduate from high school. Dallas ISD has one of the highest dropout rates in the state. About 94% of the students in Dallas ISD are "people of color." The majority is Latino-Hispanic. About 33% of the students are learning English and about 90% qualify for free or reduced lunch. In Highland Park H.S. 99% of the students are proficient in academics and continue at the same rate as they progress through their education. He said his own teaching experience was in North Carolina with students who had never achieved well. Students who live in poverty have issues of healthcare, hunger, and homelessness to contend with, but they can still learn. As a teacher, he held his students

to high expectations and they closed the
