R. Gerald Turner, President **Southern Methodist University**

As president of SMU since 1995, R. Gerald Turner is leading an era of unprecedented progress, including a \$1 billion major gifts campaign that surpassed its goal by raising \$1.15 billion from 2008 to 2015. SMU is now among 34 private universities nationally to raise a campaign amount of \$1 billion or more. The campaign is providing support for 689 new endowed student scholarships: 54 new endowed faculty positions, for a total of 116; 68 academic programs and initiatives; and 24 capital projects, among them new academic, student life and athletics facilities. This success has occurred at the same time that SMU is celebrating the centennial of its opening in 1915.

SMU's progress in the last 20 years includes a near tripling of applications, more than a 165-point increase in student SAT average scores, an increase in minority enrollment to 26 percent and a more than doubling of the University endowment, currently at \$1.5 billion. SMU consistently ranks in the top one-fourth of the best national universities as listed in U.S. News & World Report. Working with the SMU Board of Trustees, President

Turner led efforts to attract the George W. Bush Presidential Center, which opened on the SMU campus in May 2013.

Beyond the campus, President Turner has served on the boards of the American Council on Education and the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities, and he co-chaired the Knight Commission on Intercollegiate Athletics for nearly 10 years. In Texas he serves on the boards of the Methodist Hospital Foundation, the Salvation Army of Dallas and two publicly traded companies.

Before joining SMU, President Turner was the chancellor of the University of Mississippi and served in administrative and teaching positions at the University of Oklahoma and Pepperdine University. A native of New Boston. Texas, he earned an Associate of Arts degree from Lubbock Christian University, a B.S. degree in psychology from Abilene Christian University and M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in psychology from The University of Texas at Austin. He and his wife, Gail, have two married daughters and five grandchildren.

AVID is an in-school academic support program that prepares students for college eligibility. AVID

students are often the first in their families to attend college and therefore need extra support in preparing for college. All students in the mentoring program are also in AVID.

What is the process to become a volunteer?

Complete an application with Big Brothers Big Sisters, which will be an interview. Complete a background check application online with the Dallas Schools


Program: SMU Basketball

ciation for Rotary. He grew up in Kansas and played basketball at Kansas State. He hoped to be in the NBA, but he applied to law school as a backup plan. He hoped to attend SMU Law School



and was accepted. He said he had always loved Dallas and is proud to be able to coach at SMU. Instead of going to law school, he took a job in finances in Beverly Hills. He made a lot of money, but hated the job. He had thought he did not want to coach, but watching the Final Four, decided he wanted to be in basketball again. He said he has worked for great coaches; many are in the Hall of Fame. He has been a head coach for twelve and a half seasons out of the thirty seasons he has been coaching. He said last year was magical. Because it was after the probation, it was the most important season he's ever been in. He started the season with nine players on the team, but in December two players quit. He played six players all season; it was an amazing group of guys. The four who graduated are all playing professionally. He believes a coach is only as good as his players. This is the year that SMU will be hardest hit by probation. There are three starting players returning this

year. This will be a young team, and the schedule is too hard for this team. However over the next few years it will be a fun ride. He asked that we all come to the games, especially if you enjoy watching a team grow. He was asked how he managed with only seven players. He said he had some walk-ons and red shirts.
