# An Introduction to The Hub at the Arcade

In April 2019 a new joint venture created by the University of Dayton and Dayton's Entrepre-

neurs Center signed a 10-year lease to occupy

100,000 square feet of space in the iconic Dayton Arcade. The JV, Arcade Innovation Hub, or The Hub will be one of the largest university anchored innovation spaces in the country housing academic programs in entrepreneurship, art and design and social innovation. The space will also include co-working and co-share space for startups, small businesses and others that wish to be connected to the startup ecosystem in the region. Th Hub powered by PNC Bank will truly be the nucleus of entrepreneurial activity in the Dayton region.

Next on the agenda was a farewell presentation from Augusto on his country Brazil and the time he spent here in the USA. Brazil is divided into 5 Region States and his comes from the city Coronel Fabriciano. He is part of an interact

club in his city where his friends have helped shape him into who he is today. He thanked the club for hosting him for this life changing experience.

Next up was Cory Paul, former Dayton Rotarian giving a one-year anniversary report on Tornado Recovery and what the Red Cross did in the days of recovery to update the group on how the funds we raised were spent to help the community. Cory is now in the Columbus Area and he introduced everyone to Lynn Gump who is the Dayton Area Chapter Executive. Cory recounted that May 27th of 2019 our area was struck with multiple tornadoes. Red Cross had over 600 volunteers and employees working alongside many local groups to deliver relief to survivors. They distributed 1000s of bottle of water. He shared with us a chart of numbers and statistics of all that the Red Cross did to help the community which included overnight shelter stays, feeding sites, meals and snacks served, comfort kits, clean up kits among many other services.

President Jean Maychack then called on our speaker of the day, Marti Taylor, President & CEO of OneFifteen is a notfor-profit healthcare ecosystem dedicated to the full and sustained recovery of people suffering from addiction. The organization got its name because in 2017 115 lives were lost each day from unintended overdose in the US each day. It is now around 130 per day, 13 a day in Ohio and with the pandemic numbers are going up. Drug overdoses right now are up due to people feeling alone and isolated they are also seeing people relapse with all the anxiety right now with the virus and uncertainty. They have had to pivot their care during this crisis and balance how to take care of patients while also keeping their employees safe. They have instituted Telefirst Care as most services are now handled online or by telephone. They have a 24/7 nurse line and have treatment groups being held online and expanded access to addiction medication. They are looking at how to get back into groups being able to meet in person as they can.

OneFifteen's mission is to heal people experiencing substance use disorder through learning, science and partnership. The opposite of addiction isn't sobriety it's connection. They opened an Outpatient Clinic in October and have served over 950 people and a Crisis Stabilization unit on the first floor of the former Kindred Hospital in February (think of like an urgent care for addiction) and have plans for inpatient residential on the 3rd floor of the building with 32 beds hopefully opening this fall. They are also under construction with a Residential Treatment Campus for Sober Living being constructed behind the Job Center. That will serve 58 clients at a time 2 per room in door like facilities with male and female units separated. The top floor will be sleeping quarters and the middle floor will be living spaces and kitchen facilities and the first floor will feature reflection spaces.

Marti reviewed their partners Verily (sister company to google) and Founding and Funding partners Kettering Health Network, Premier Health, Verily, Alexandria, Montgomery County, Montgomery County Alcohol Drug Addiction and Mental Health Services and their operating partner, Samaritan Behavioral Health who provides the clinical care. Community Partners include: CityWide, City of Dayton, Dayton Development Coalition, Greater Dayton Area Hospital Association, Carillon Civic Council, and Greater Edgemont Community Coalition. OneFifteen's vision is to lead a movement that gives people hope for today and offers communities a better tomorrow. They goes beyond the clinic to promote addressing the holistic needs of individuals, families and the community through programming.
