tab on Sinclair and when they plan to open but there is no date yet. President Jean then introduced our speaker for the day, Vince Lewis representing The Hub powered by PNC Bank at the Arcade. The Dayton Arcade space was completed



in 1904 and was designed by Eugene Barney and Michael Gibbons as a business model innovation to be a city within a city. It included farmers , shops, offices, and apartments. It was remodeled in the 1970's after being impacted by suburbanization. The 70's remodel turned it into a downtown shopping mall. The Arcade building was closed in 1992. In the 1990's the building was maintained by Danis. It sold in 2004 on eBay to Gunther Berger who had intended to tear it down until he saw the building in person and then wanted to restore it to its former glory unfortunately their funding fell through. Mayor Whaley formed a Task Force in 2014 to determine whether redevelopment was possible. It seemed to be on the path of demolition however an estimated 15 million dollar demolition project wasn't feasible. They started looking at adaptive reuse leveraging public and private funding. UD and the Dayton Region venture Creation of an Ecosystem. UD and the Entrepreneur Center are leveraging cooperating and leveraging the resources of UD and the strength of The Entrepreneur

Center for start up companies.

The expected impact is more than 700 new jobs, more than 400 co-share members 200-300 university students engag-

ing in the space, activating Dayton's urban core, utilize downtown's 6,000,000 SQ FT of office space, programming targeted at Dayton neighborhoods and robotics and coding camp for Dayton schools.

The Arcade Use Program consists of 416,000 square feet of space, 100+ artists/creative's housing, 100,000 square feet of innovation space, 40,000 square feet of arts and gallery space, 30,000 square feet of mixed use retail/restaurant, and businesses interested in engagement.

The overall project funding consists of: federal housing tax credits, federal new market tax credits, federal historics, state historics, a grant from OFCC, Jobs Ohio, City of Dayton, Montgomery County and Developer's equity and debt.

The HUB will consist of 100,000 square feet: 47,000 dedicated to co-sharing, 30,000 sublease space, 20,000 academic space, UD's





Crotty Center, Offices for The Entrepreneur Center leadership, studios for art and design, and transdisciplinary learning spaces.

The timeline: April 2017 Letter on Intent—18 month later negotiations on lease—May 2019 demo started—build out started Fall of 2019—expected occupancy date is late 2020 or early 2021.

During Q&A it was suggested that we hold an onsite meeting or tour in the future at the Arcade and it was requested that Vince work with our programming chair to schedule.
