Sean O'Regan, who runs Woodland Cemetery, is celebrating a birthday. Sean is apparently star struck, having somehow managed to meet many celebrities over the years despite living in Dayton and not Hollywood.

On to Day-10s. Fran Rickenbach gave a Day-100 in celebration of her birthday. Suren Singhvi gave a Day-35 in honor of his 35 years of service. Bill Nance gave a Day-21 in honor of the 21st anniversary of the 100-mile bike ride to benefit the Dayton Gospel Mission. Heath MacAlpine gave a Day-25 in honor of his wife and neighbor and all those protesting the death of George Floyd. Penny Wolf gave a Day-100 in honor of her Aunt Dottie who is celebrating her 100th birthday. Brian Martin gave a Day-100 to benefit special projects in honor of his wedding and his son's graduation from Northwestern.

President-Elect Martin advised that the District conference will be hosted in Dayton and we need volunteers to serve on a committee for that event. Contact Laura Erbaugh if you wish to help plan for that conference. Brian thanked Sue Taylor for hosting the virtual wine tasting last week. He also announced that the board received two district grants related to COVID-19. We have raised funds for the Dayton Public Schools to support their printing costs, meals, and masks for the kids and staff. Feel free to make a contribution to this very worthwhile, local cause. As Ohio continues to re-open, the board will be sending out a survey to members relating to the new normal for events.

Secretary Kim welcomed and thanked Rotarians who were online for the first time in a while. She introduced the guest speaker, Rajeev Bhansali, who she met in January in India. Rajeev joined his club in 2005 in Delhi, and he is a board member and director of his club's scholarship committee, among other service. He is President of Indlak Group, global strategic consultants and investors. They have offices in India and the U.S. Rajeev received his undergraduate degree from Miami University in Ohio and spends 3-4 months a year in Chicago. Rajeev explained that India is a completely different world. It is a country of contradictions – the very wealthy and tremendous poverty. The challenge is how to help those on the weaker side and raise their standard of living. A dollar goes a long way in India. For example, he donates \$100 a month for a student to attend an excellent school in Delhi. 85% of the population relies on agriculture. The projects for his Rotary are designed around improving the lives of the poor and encouraging them to think outside the box. His club – Delhi Midtown – is one of the oldest, dating back to 1975. Some of the projects they support are:

Clubfoot Disability Clinic- 50,000 children suffer from this a year. It costs \$1500 to treat.

Dakshinpuri Health Clinic – in practice since 1994, treats 15,000 patients a year with free services and medicine including x-rays, orthopedic, physiotherapy, and dental.

Mobile Dental Clinic – free services and treats 5,000+ patients per year

Education on Wheels – program to spread literacy

RCDM Diagnostic Center – implemented with \$190,000. All diagnostic services are available

Polio Corrective Surgery – a collaboration with St. Stephens Hospital. They support a full ward and state of the art equipment.

Other programs they support are distinguished service awards, scholarships to underprivileged children, scholarships for persons with disabilities, and special programs for the poor affected by COVID-19.

Rajeev introduced his club secretary, Yatin Wadhwana.

There are 1.3 billion people in India. This was an inspiring presentation on the impact an international club is having in the world.
