President Brian then called on Karla Garrett Harshaw to introduce our speaker Dr. Susan Edwards as the 8th President of Wright State University. Three goals moving forward one team success is built on relationships which lead to recruitment and retention. There are a large number of institutions in Ohio and Wright State has a 96% in state enrollment. 84 % of their graduating students stay in the area. Dr Edwards stated that it is her mission to connect back to the Dayton Community and to be good stewards of Ohio's money. She is working on developing strong relationships with businesses in the community to find out what area employers need and how they can provide graduates to fill those needs. Dr Edwards has been talking to area CEOs and Rotary groups as a foundation to provide opportunities for their students.

She hopes to recruit a more diverse student population to include more international students. Dr Edwards found on her arrival that the University had not been marketed correctly and that at that time there was only an \$800 budget for Marketing. This Happened Last Monday Continued

Then COVID hit and everything changed. They have increased their marketing to transfer students. They have been working with other area education institutions to make transfers easier and more seamless for students. They have found that it is harder to retain students so they are working on retention efforts. The number #1 reason students leave is financial the #2 reason is cultural where they feel like they don't fit and the #3 reason is personal or things at home keeping them from class. They now have a life coach for those students to help them navigate through some of these issues. If a student stops going to class they follow up to see if there is something that can be helped so that the student doesn't have to drop out due to personal financial situations.

Dr. Edwards then spoke to us about the impact of COVID. They recently passed a budget with a 33 million dollar deficit however in the end it is now a 22 million dollar deficit based on the funding they were told they would be receiving from the state however it turned out they may receive more than expected but it is contingent so could be more of a 4.8 million dollars loss. They have a plan for a 3-year sustainability protocol in place and they should be in a fiscally sustainable position by the 3rd year. The administrative team is the leanest it has been in some time.

During this pandemic they provided computers and mobile hot spots for any students who needed the help. And they had a team of 200 employees called 9000 students to touch base and see what problems and issues they were facing. The students received pass/fail on their classes this last semester. Moving forward they will be continuing some remote learning but labs will be face to face. They will be moving 1500 students into the dorms and the rooms will be singles.

Dr. Edwards answered several questions during Q&A including one from Jim Gallagher on UD vs Wright State in basketball. Dr Edwards indicated she is working on a relationship with them. She was also asked about the Air Force and Army ROTC programs.

Dr Edwards finished with the statement that the students are first and foremost with everything that she does.

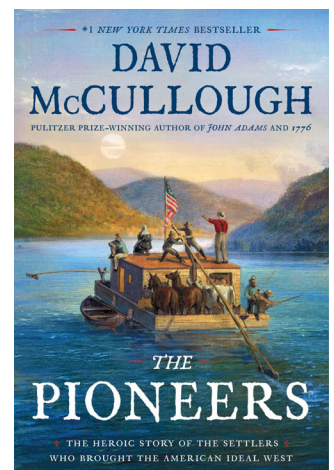
President Brian thanked Dr Edwards for her talk and adjourned the meeting.

We looked at the feedback from the survey and comments made by fellow members that the books we were reading were too severe and painful reads, and we decided to read something lighter and significant. After much discussion and deliberation, we decided on **The Pioneers by David McCullough**. Perhaps better understanding Ohio's past would be educational, entertaining, and a great read by an excellent author, for the summer.

Our next Zoom meeting is **Tuesday, September 8, 2020**. To support people who want to have dinner with their partners, or get home from work, we moved the meeting to 6:30 - 8:00. I am happy to send out the Zoom link closer to the meeting date.

Enjoy reading this book, and we look forward to another great discussion in September.
