Charles Campbell College- Rotary Youth Programs – EarlyAct and Interact

Principal of Charles Campbell College & fellow Rotarian Kevin O'Neil, introduced Christine Falco, the school's Student Wellbeing Leader & Earlyact mentor, together with Ebony Merkk founding President of the Earlyact Club and Miel Ancheta founding President of the Interact Club.



Ebony Merkk (Year 6)- President of the Earlyact Club of Charles Campbell College.

Hello, my name is Ebony Merkk, and I am the President of the Earlyact Club of Charles Campbell College.

Being in Earlyact we have challenged ourselves with the question: How can we make a difference in the world?

In 2021, Earlyact took on a major project to create 20 backpacks for people experiencing homelessness. We learned a lot about community work and how to manage a project. Along the way we raised over \$3,500 for our project, through activities held during House Weeks, Harmony Week and Wellbeing Week. We received support from the Rotary Club of Campbelltown and other clubs and organisations. We worked closely with Baptist Care to work out what to include in the backpacks and how we might get them to people in need. We raised awareness of homelessness in our community and received donations from families, friends and other people within our community.

We received some heart-warming thanks from Baptist Care and clients who were grateful for the backpacks and for our thoughtfulness.

This year, we are working in teams to explore, investigate and lead five different projects grouped into three categories:

School based projects:

These are projects that benefit our school.

- We wish to re-paint and re-tile our school toilets and add motivational quotes to the walls and doors hoping to make the toilets more welcoming.
- We would also like to paint play areas in our yard to promote interaction and social skills amongst our students.

Community projects:

These are projects that help our local areas.

- The Women's and Children's Hospital Christmas Run is a project where we are wanting to raise \$1000 to purchase gifts to donate to children who are undergoing treatment during Christmas, but if we cannot donate these gifts due to COVID, we will donate the money to the Hospital.
- Animal Welfare – in this project, we are seeking donations of blankets, worming treatment, cat litter, toys and treats. We will donate these items to the RSPCA, who will use them for animals who have been neglected or who are undernourished and abandoned.

International project:

This project is called Save The Children: Sponsorship of a child – it consists of us collecting 10c refundable plastic bottles and using the money to sponsor a child in need.

I would like to thank the Rotary Club of Campbelltown for giving us the opportunity to learn about community service and helping us to make a difference in the world.

Miel Ancheta (Year 12)– President of the Interact Club of Charles Campbell College

Good afternoon distinguished members of the Rotary Club of Campbelltown, I am Miel Ancheta, Interact President for 2022 and I am honoured to be speaking to you tonight on behalf of my Interact Board.

The Interact Board of Charles Campbell College has gone through an extensive brainstorming stage which has included the contribution of the 7-12 student body.

We made a stall and approached students for ideas for projects that they would like to see implemented. In addition, we released an online survey to get more suggestions from students who were unable to put their ideas down.

From that survey, the Interact Board garnered a multitude of ideas which have since progressed into project drafts in development.

Those projects encapsulate different topics:

1. Ukrainian Refugees in Australia, our global/international project

For this project, we will sell drinks at the cost of \$4.00. Initially, with the cups they buy, students will decorate it, and after the drinks are consumed, the cups will be cleaned and then made into a chain to create a Guinness World Record.

However, recently, we received word from the Guinness Book of Records stating that to make this a contender for a world record, we must reach 10,000m for the cup chain. We deemed this as a very unrealistic aim for one school.

A compromise is to be made. We plan to change the aim to raise a monetary value and to expand this project to make it an inter-school Interact project competition – a suggestion made by one of our Charles Campbell College Head Prefects, Jessie Wagas.

The money raised will be given to the Red Cross Australia and will be used to support the wellbeing and basic needs for Ukrainian refugees.

In conjunction, we are considering making a donation box for children's clothes (second-hand or new) which will be given to the organisation Treasure Box, who are collaboration with SLAVA Ukrainian Cultural Centre, Association of Ukrainians in SA and AMES to assist new arrivals from Ukraine.

2. Youth Mental Health is our school-based project

Art of Expression and “7 billion people, 7 billion stories” – an event where people can share their stories anonymously in the form of a poem, story writing, painting, drawing, etc and will then be turned into a book to showcase that everyone has their own story to tell that they long to express as well as displays within the school library.

3. We are running a project, which is a combination of a community and school-based project, called the Kindness Project.

The Interact Secretary, Rachel Lang, is leading this project – which has two parts:

1. A kindness box – a box of kindness cards. On these cards will be an act of kindness that the person commits to undertaking. This will be an event or social experiment to show how just a simple act of kindness can make someone's day better.

2. Kindness Rocks – Students from both campuses will paint rocks with encouraging messages or bright pictures for us to hide in public places in our community.

Both will not have or include a fundraiser because kindness should not be bought or performed for any monetary value.

4. Animal Welfare and Environment (Tuesday 4th October – World Animal Day 2022)

For the cause of Animal Welfare, we want to help protect some of the most vulnerable species from extinction.

Deforestation has a prevalent influence on the welfare of many animal species and environmental ecosystems as it results in a decrease of habitats, food, as well as a source of clean air. Every dollar

donated plants one tree with the organisation One Tree Planted; there is also the possibility of Interact participating in planting trees.

Our global/international project will not only make a difference to the lives of young Ukrainian refugees in Australia but will create a strong and unified inter- and intra-school spirit.

Projects such as the Kindness Project and the Youth Mental Health Project will be continued by next year's preceding Charles Campbell College Interact members.

The 2022 Interact aims to fulfil these projects with grit and perseverance. And, as you all would agree, it is an honour to serve for the greater good in order to make a change.

Following the meeting the Club held the Club Assembly

President Stephany Martin

Welcome all members to this Club Assembly.

Club Assemblies are one of the keys to the success of our club. They provide an opportunity for our club members to question the Board and provides the ability to discuss the long-term plans for our club.

I have a great respect on the importance of committees within our club. As President, I have not sought to influence discussion at committee level, as you may recall, in my first speech to the club as President, I articulated that committees are where club members are able to engage most. As President, my role is to respect these decisions, and chair the discussion at Board level. I have limited my role deliberately this year, potentially when compared to previous years, as I have seen my role as the Chair of a Board, not a President which is directive. It might be a different approach to leadership to that which sometimes we have experienced in the club, but one which I think we should respect.

I will rely on the Committee Chairs to outline their achievements over this year, and will only provide a couple of highlights.

This year we have continued to be impacted by Covid. However. I think far too many Rotary activities have been curtailed and impacted by Covid than has reasonably been considered by the threat. Significantly, there have been multiple areas of International and Community Service which have been limited so as to make it challenging to facilitate projects. Prominently this year, the Community Connections has continued. My Thankyou to Elizabeth Gagliardi for her continued dedication in running this program.

And one of my favourite Rotary experiences, CROE, run by Mal and Val who delivered a fantastic program for the 10th and last time.

In the area of Youth Service, we have sent our young people to programs where they have run, for example, the National Youth Science Forum, and the Sailing Challenge, however, very few activities have occurred in

this space. We did host the Youth Leadership Awards successfully this year, and I thank Damian Leach and Margaret Northcote for their coordination of this.

The Club this year made a change in the makeup of the Board, with Public Image now on the Board, supporting committees and coordinating this aspect of our club. Public Image has been very well known this year for their significant changes to the website which involved a lot of hard work that our club will benefit from for many years into the future.

In Membership, since our last Assembly, we have greeted Tony Déttorre and tonight, Karyn Alford. In that time, we have had two members indicate their resignation, one transfer, and one transition to Honorary Membership. Overall this year, our club has grown by 3 members, and we have greeted eight new members, and there are three prospective members approved for interview, which is scheduled to occur in the remaining time this year. Our fellowship has been limited by Covid also, however it hasn't stopped us from participating in the club's annual events (even if they are deferred), and some pub nights.

Fundraising has once again tackled the challenging job of continuing to provide the monies for us to impact our community; and those club members who have participated in our fundraising projects, whether it is the shed sale, and its preparations; the art show, or porchetta night. Thankyou for contributing to this part of club life.

International has been somewhat curtailed this year, most obviously through participation in hands-on projects. However we have consistently provided financial relief and donations to various international initiatives which you will hear about in the report from International.

Vocational has also been somewhat limited also, particularly, through not being able to do vocational visits. I anticipate that this will be resolved this coming year and I thank those members who did Behind the Badge presentations.

Of course, our club life would be substantially impacted without some key roles, such as our Attendance Officer, Welfare Officer, Sound and Technology, Newsletter and Program and Rotary Information. I'd like to thank David, Peter, Bruce and Hiep, Frank, Bruce (again) and Damian for their significant contribution to club life.

I thank you all for your dedication this year to further our combined goals in Rotary and I look forward to what the next year will bring.

THE EXPERIENCES OF WOMEN

Margaret Northcote



Rotary Club of Campbelltown

Rotary for me is about having fun. There is no point in doing something that you don't enjoy. I get a buzz out of working with youth and I love my Rotary family.

Margaret joined the Rotary Club of Campbelltown in 1996 as its third female member. She is the Club's longest serving female and first female president. She is a Paul Harris Fellow being a major donor. She says she became a Rotarian because of its youth programs.

Joining Rotary

Margaret was introduced to Rotary through her husband's interest. He joined the Glen Osmond Club and she attended functions as a partner. She was not so interested in the traditional expectation that women cater and bake cakes to support club functions and fundraisers. Her interest was captured when she attended a RYLA presentation. **"I was so impressed with the Rotary youth programs. To see young people of 18 to 25 saying that a Rotary program had changed their lives was inspiring"**. At that time, she could not take a leadership role because women were not eligible for membership.


Margaret supported her husband as District Governor in 2006-2007. She eventually joined Campbelltown in 1996 as their 3rd female member. She was followed by her husband. They were the first couple to join Campbelltown and were careful to operate independently as members of separate committees. She soon became involved in

Experience in Rotary

Liz was President of her Adelaide University Rotaract Club and she highlights organising the Australian Rotaract Conference in Adelaide in 2019 as a great experience. She also recalls running a large free soup kitchen during exam time to ensure that those who needed it were well nourished. Donations were also given to a city homeless program in recognition of the homelessness issues faced by students.

The partnership between Rotary and Rotaract Clubs has helped Liz become more comfortable with working across generations. She is keen to ensure traditions and experiences that are of importance to older Rotarians are respected. She says there is a danger of losing these members and their knowledge, if the change process is not respectful. On the other hand, she believes that Rotaractors and younger members of Rotary are in the best position to advise on issues of importance to their generation and therefore to shape Rotary programs with a youth focus. She highlights issues such as mental health and employment.

Liz leads the RYPEN program in District 9510. **"I have a passion for creating a Rotary youth program which will engage with all youth, openly reaching out to all, including those of colour and from the LGBTQI community"**. She thinks that a successful connection with youth will require a rebranding of the Rotary image and assertive outreach. Her RYPEN objective- **"I want to develop a sustainable program which teaches young people how to think and not what to think. This program will ensure that young people know their values and know that we believe in them from the start."**

Joining Rotaract

Liz's attendance at RYLA introduced her to Rotaract and Rotary and Liz chose to join Adelaide University Rotaract. Her experience of a community giving support to her family when her father was ill and the positive impact of RYLA motivated Liz to give back to Rotary and the community.

Liz is also committed to the prevention of domestic violence and the provision of support to those affected.

Women in Rotary

Liz believes that women make good leaders because of their approach to conflict resolution which she sees as a community leadership approach. She states a preferred model is one of leading by example rather than through the exercise of power. On gender, Liz comments that Rotary's apparent focus on the traditional binary male/female construct may no longer be appropriate, particularly as Rotary wants to create a more

What is Positive Peace?

—

NEGATIVE PEACE

... is the absence of violence or fear of violence.

+

POSITIVE PEACE

... is the attitudes, institutions & structures that create and sustain peaceful societies.

Positive Peace is defined as the *attitudes, institutions and structures* that create and sustain peaceful societies. These same factors also lead to many other positive outcomes which society feels are important. Positive Peace has been empirically derived by IEP through analysing thousands of cross-country measures of economic and social progress to determine which have statistically significant relationships with actual peace as measured by the Global Peace Index (GPI).

IMPLEMENTING POSITIVE PEACE

IEP has collaborated with a number of organisations to develop and implement workshops designed to build Positive Peace in their respective countries and communities. IEP's Positive Peace Workshops educate and train participants on how to implement Positive Peace programs.
