It is my pleasure to report as Shed Convenor and to thank all of our wonderful volunteers, Rotarians and Partners for the work done at the shed over the last month, including on Tuesday mornings. I offer a special mention to Bill and Renata Allan for the many hours they contribute – thank you both.

The total raised during the month, including the Shed sale, BBQ and coffee well done by PP Vince Belperio and Maria Figg with Angela Russo and David Munro on the Coffee machine with expert advice from our regular volunteer Alan, and after a further sale by David Richards since Saturday's sale is \$6909.60.

I again thank Past President Babu for his diligence in keeping the accurate accounting records – there have again been many transactions during the month, mainly from our internet sales and then upselling when customers came to pick up their goods, that amounted to \$2,676. Please let me know if you are able to help so that I can put together a roster – ideally, we need seven or eight people to prepare the donut mix, cook in the shallow fryer, cost with cinnamon sugar and bag, and manage the orders and take cash or EFTPOS payments. 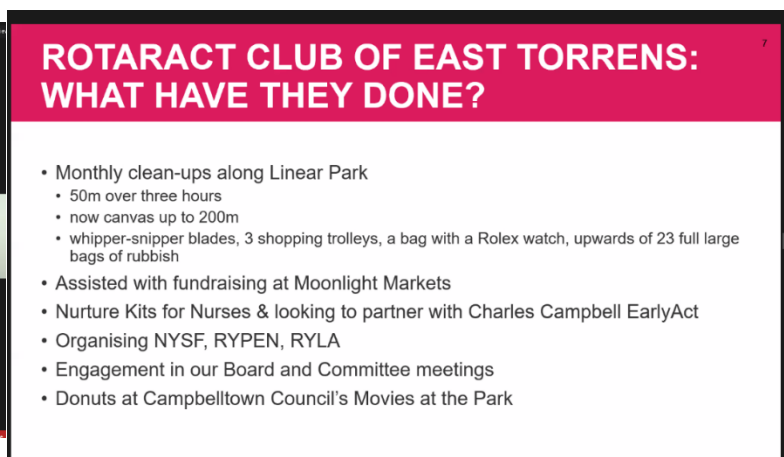
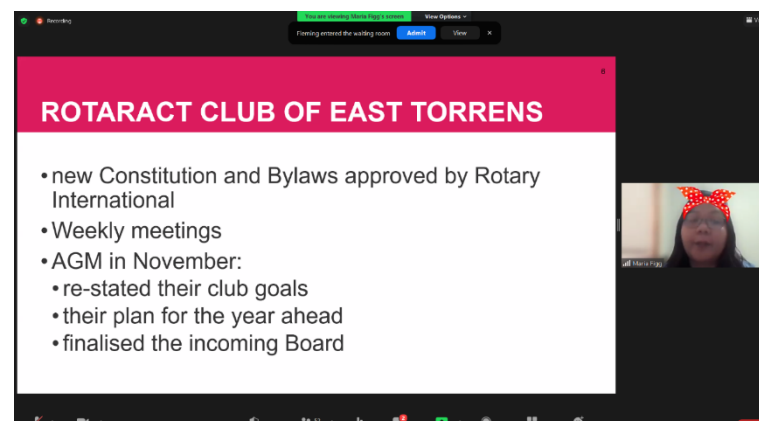
• **Gail Casey gave a report on behalf of the recent Community Committee's activities**

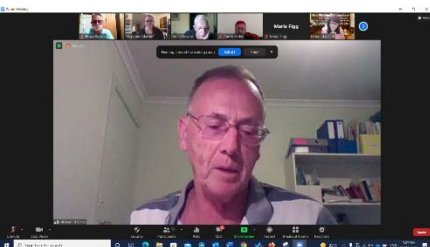

Guest Speaker Professor Helen Marshall -Vaccinology, Public Health & covid 19



Chair Michael McCabe introduced our guest speaker.

Professor Helen Marshall is one of Australia's most celebrated and recognised vaccination researchers. Specialising in vaccinology, public health and infectious diseases at the University of Adelaide's Robinson Research Institute, Helen has been involved in game-changing studies that have had a global impact. A key focus has been the fight to stop meningococcal B.

During the pandemic, Helen has provided advice about meningococcal B and COVID-19 to the South Australian Minister for Health and the Chief Public Health Officer.

Professor Marshall has received a number of awards. For example, she was awarded the South Australia Science Award for Excellence in Research Collaboration in 2019. In 2020 she was the recipient of the Australia Day Council, Inspiring South Australian Women Award in 2020.

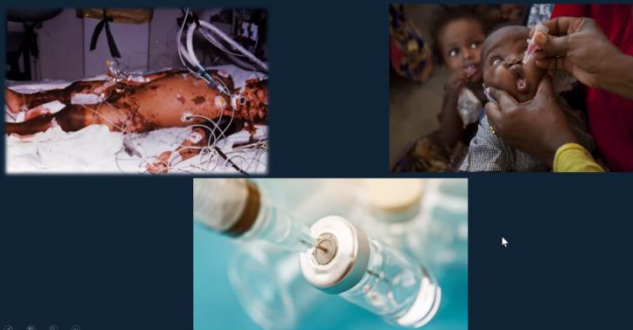


Professor Helen Marshall then spoke & gave an insightful presentation on her past & her journey from a young medical student to her position now during the pandemic, where she provides advice about meningococcal B and COVID-19 to the South Australian Minister for Health and the Chief Public Health Officer.

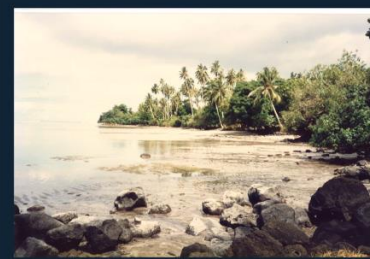
During her early medical student days, she developed an interest in pediatrics and went to western Samoa on a work/study tour to gain experience and firsthand knowledge in her chosen field. She dealt with some very sick children in a low resource country. With her practical knowledge & the

passion gained she returned to Adelaide Uni & applied to be a Pediatrician. While doing some research in vaccines she had a light bulb moment & realised that she could combine her passion with pediatrics & achieve better outcomes through Public Health. She then enrolled in a Master of Public Health at Adelaide Uni & achieved her goal & hasn't looked back. Her current position at Adelaide Uni is Medical Director VIRTU & A-Prof Vaccinology / Affiliate Lecturer. Meningococcal disease is life-threatening

Cause of meningitis and septicaemia
 5-10% case fatality rate
 40% survivors disabled
 Highest rates in infants and adolescents
 SA had the highest rates of meningococcal disease in Australia
 Most cases of meningococcal disease are due to the B strain (A, B, C, W, Y strains)
 10-20% of adolescents carry the meningococcus in their throat
 MenACWY vaccine is funded and successful in significantly reducing meningococcal ACWY disease. MenC vaccine has a herd immunity impact
 MenB vaccine is available for private purchase but not included in the funded national immunisation program – questions remained about direct protection in adolescents and herd immunity

Adelaide teenager Jack Klemich dies of meningococcal disease

JACK Klemich was popular, talented and fortunate – he had it all.
 But three days after developing meningococcal disease, the vibrant, athletic son of real estate agent Glen Klemich was gone.
 The teenage son of the disease has stunned mates who saw Jack. He plays football for his school's College team on Sunday, trains three hours a day, for his fighting for his life and early help to quickly rebound away.
 Despite emergency treatment with antibiotics and surgery on his support, the 18-year-old died last week.

Professor Helen Marshall was investigating the effectiveness of meningococcal B vaccines in adolescents when her daughter, Imogen, called to say that their family friend, 18-year-old Jack Klemich, was in intensive care with the disease.
 Jack was a vivacious and talented cricketer and footballer. This photograph shows him just 48 hours before his sudden death, playing football for St Peters College.
 This highly inspired Helen to translate the results of her groundbreaking research into policy, ensuring that every child has the opportunity to be protected against this life-threatening disease.

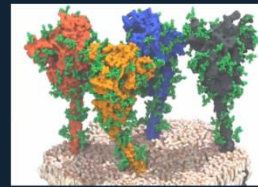
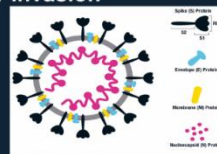


COVID-19 vaccination



Coronaviruses: SARS-CoV-2 mechanisms for invasion

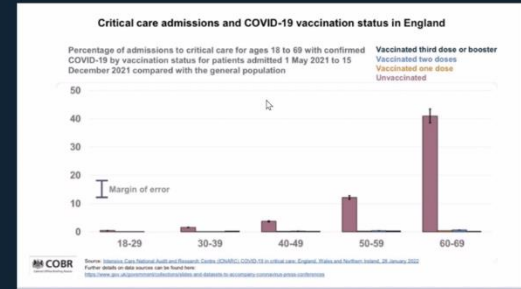
- Spike proteins latch onto airway cells
- Each spike protein snaps together with 2 others forming a flexible tulip like structure
- By sweeping around, the spike increases its odds of encountering and latching on to a surface protein
- This increases the risk to antibody exposure so they use a shield of sugars to swirl around the proteins to hide them from antibodies

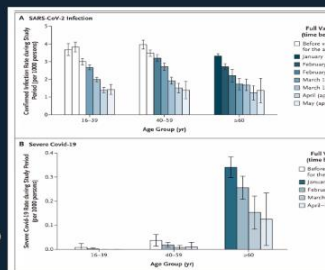

COVID-19 vaccines reduce risk of severe disease and death from SARS-CoV-2 infection



Importance of COVID-19 booster doses

- Antibodies wane, particularly after 6 months^{1 2 3}
 - Following a booster dose, reduction in rate of infection, severe disease, and deaths > 60 years
- Safety
- Side effects are similar to primary vaccine doses
 - Risk of myocarditis, a rare mRNA side effect in young adults (males) is not increased, compared to second dose risk

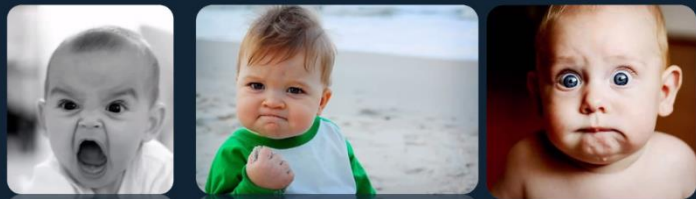


Increase in infection and severe disease after

Dr Trudy Lin was named the 2022 SA Young Australian of the Year as the youngest of only 20 practicing specialists in Australia's Special Needs Dentistry sector, providing oral healthcare to people with disability, psychiatric illness and complex medical issues such as cancer.

In May 2021, Trudy received Australia's Career Achievement Award and is also the 2021 South Australian Young Achiever of the Year for her contributions to the community outside her profession. During COVID-19, Trudy self-funded and established a Supported Independent Living Facility which provides specialised accommodation for people with disability to live independently in the community.
