#### The Editor's Column:

I appreciate your comments about the bulletin. They will keep me on my toes on slow news weeks, or weeks without concerts or dramatic battles, civil or domestic; on weeks when it's tempting to do the President's Message in a 20 point font and the meeting news in 18 point and call it "a wrap". I need to be kept on my toes. I need to keep looking.

My brother and sister-in-law flew in from Ohio for a day's stopover on their way to a week in the mountains and rivers of northern California. I sacrificed and gave them the "master suite" for a night. At least I thought I was sacrificing as I unrolled my sleeping bag on the deck. Then I saw the sky. It was as beautiful as it gets with stars and something so bright it

could only be a planet. Being there on the deck, face to face with it, I had no choice but to get my telescope for a closer look. It's got to be Jupiter and I could even see its moons. I have been watching every night since. The moons are in a different position every night. If that is not drama I guess I need to go back to that optometrist.

Then I settled down with one of Vicki's books about the history of the French colony of San Domingo, later to be Haiti. "This was the San Domingo of 1789, the most profitable colony the world had ever known; to the casual eye the most flourishing and prosperous possession on the face of the globe; to the analyst a society torn by inner and outer contradictions which in four years would split that structure into so many pieces that they could never be put together again."

The rustle of the sleeping bag created the stimulus which once again proved Pavlov's theory. I had to have some s'mores! Fortunately everything I needed was stashed in the kitchen, left over from the last camping trip. The microwave was a suitable substitute for a campfire. At least it was for my immediate purposes if not for providing atmosphere. (Have you ever nuked a marshmallow? Have you ever done a whole bag of marshmallows?)

Then it was back to the book. Jupiter intruded again and by then the shooting stars has commenced and all I could think about was the cosmic snowballs that were settling into our upper, upper atmosphere. It was enough to make Haiti seem very far away. I wondered if I should awake the wayfarers and let them partake of this Sonoma sky, unencumbered by the Ohio humidity they were accustomed to. No. They were tired and there wasn't much chocolate left.

I also went to the fair this week. And I saw the guy with the trained cats that everyone is talking about. It was a hoot. It was all fun and enjoyable until today when I saw the quote in the Sunday paper. "*I was one of the greatest jugglers in the world, practicing seven hours a day. I win three international festivals. But people like more cats. That's show business.*" Gregory Popovich, whose trained house cats have been a hit at this year's Sonoma County Fair"

That left me sad about the whole affair. It's impossible to know, because of his fractured English, whether Mr. Popovich means people would like to see more cats, or whether he thinks the people like the cats more than they do him. It seems sad either way. It made me think of a recent speaker who told us how we reward celebrity and not genius. I wonder if Gregory Popovich ever thought of that when he worked so hard at mastering his juggling. And how much easier is it to teach a schnauzer to walk on his hind legs, all the while with a cat sitting on his shoulders? I guess at the end of the day, the same sky is over all of us and the same moons spin for genius and celebrity alike. The stars shoot the same for presidents and fools; for jugglers and lovers; for the weak and the strong. What we see depends on how clear our sky is and whether we look.

I didn't even use the two wool blankets I had laid out that night. The stars prevailed over the usual, nose-dripping, night fog. I used only as much of the sky as I could before getting hazy myself but I did finish the chocolate.

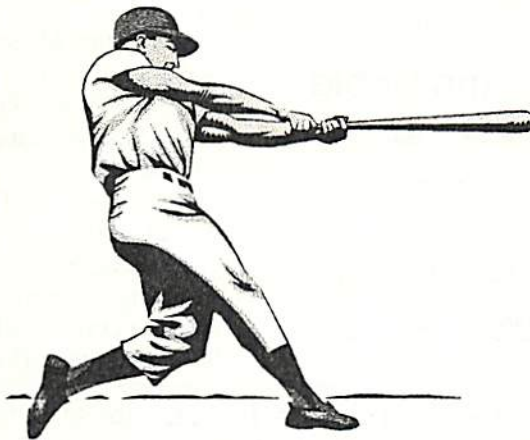

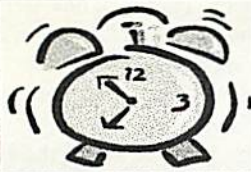

## EDITOR'S COLUMN

### Thoughts From Montana

We were fishing what is known by the *cognoscenti* as a "wading stream". One might think this is a stream which is easily wadeable. In fact that is so, but what one learns when actually fishing a "wading stream" is that the *only* way it can be fished is by wading, usually right up the middle of the stream.

This is the Big Sky Country, open rolling sagebrush flats, the Purple Sage of Zane Grey literary fame which comes from the profusion of lupines flowering amongst the sage. There is timber on the hills surrounding the meadow, but the streams can always be traced by the green river of willows which line their banks. Once you find a path into the stream it is just much easier to fish upstream by wading rather than by bush-whacking through the thickets.

This particular stream is typical of the many small drainages in the area. Crystal clear, ice cold with a very distinctive ochre hue to the rocks and gravel which form the bottom. We typically "leap frog" up the stream taking successive turns in the little riffles, pockets and glides. The fish aren't large (an eleven inch fish is a nice one and a fourteen incher a trophy). But they are abundant and come eagerly to our flies. There is the added attraction of being able to catch an Arctic Grayling. They are close relatives of the trout and char and are distinguished by a very large dorsal fin which is tinged with a beautiful violet color. The drainage we are fishing is home to the last breeding population of Grayling in the Continental United States.

We speak little as we fish and follow a rhythm that comes from years of fishing together and anticipating one another's abilities and desires. We each take many fish and laugh at each others foibles and frustrations. It is an easy and relaxed day with deft casts between the willows and underneath low overhangs. Yet if someone were to watch from afar we would be more like a pair of serious predators stalking their unsuspecting prey. Your partner truly becomes an extension of yourself. I derive as much pleasure from watching him spot a feeding fish, get into the best position and deliver that perfect cast which drifts down the feeding lane as I do when it is my turn to fish. There is true joy in his success and mutual respect for our years of experience and the results we produce. I think it's not unlike the Rotary experience; working together to produce results which bring joy to others and solidify our own Club's spirit.

Then it was Nancy's Aita's turn. First it was Bob's birthday - a milestone apparently - and Nancy wrote it big, in red letters, with \$100 to

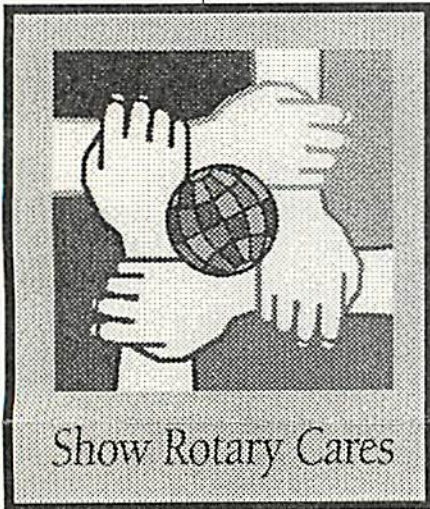
