From the By-Laws of Santa Rosa Sunrise Rotary Club

ARTICLE IV - Meetings

SECTION 1 - $\underline{\textit{ANNUAL MEETING}}$. The annual meeting of this club shall be held on the first regular meeting in December in each year, at which time the election of officers and directors to serve for the ensuing year shall take place.

ARTICLE L - Election of Directors and Officers

SECTION 1 - At least one month prior to the annual meeting, the presiding officer shall appoint a nomination committee to be made up of the five (5) immediate Past Presidents of the club who still retain membership in the club other than honorary. The chairperson of the nominating committee shall be the member of that committee with the longest tenure as Past-President and the vicechairperson shall be the member with the next longest tenure as Past-President. This committee shall place before the club one nomination for each of the following: President, President-Elect, President-Nominee, Secretary, Treasurer, and three (3) Directors. Additional nominations may be presented by the club members from the floor. If there are no further nominations, the election may be held at this meeting. If there are further nominations, all nominations duly made shall be placed on a ballot in alphabetical order under each office and shall be voted for at the next regular meeting. The candidates for President, President-Elect, President-Nominee, Secretary, Treasurer, and the three Directors receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected to their respective offices. Term of office for President, President-Elect and President-Nominee shall be one year. Term of office for Secretary and Treasurer shall be two years, with each term beginning on alternate years. Term of office for Directors shall be two years.

SECTION 2 - The officers and directors, so elected, together with the immediate Past President, shall constitute the Board of Directors



Jeff lead a group of four wine industry professionals from La Follette, Trinchero, Trione and BX of Napa. He described the 4 week adventure as "A Four Week Epicurean Odyssey", in reality a Food Exchange. Even better, Jeff did not gain weight! A miracle from the benefits of an all natural ingredient diet and despite 400 bottles of wine (100/week, just shy of 15 per day). Divided by 5, that is, well, abundant tastings!

Rotary in the Burgundy-Champagne District has different demographics: only 12% of members are women; membership is smaller, 50 clubs, 1,000 members. Clubs meet 3 times a month for regular business and once socially when spouses are invited.

For Jeff and the four young and attractive professionals, their work was daunting: Learn and share the nuances of fine viticulture and wine making in a country which has 27,000 wineries, one per every 2,000 inhabitants. Contrast that to California, another wine making kingdom that boasts 3,300 wineries, only one winery per 11,000 inhabitants.

Many of the chateau's now surrounded by vineyards date to the 13th century. French counterparts were amazed that our GSE Team was both so young and possessed multiple career paths before entering the wine business. In France vineyards are commonly held in the same family for 15 generations. Rows of grapes may belong to one family member and adjacent vines another. Somehow the traditions of very fine winemaking persist with tremendous rewards: A case of Grand Cru (top tier) vintage from one winery netted \$250K at a Christies auction in London. That is \$20,833/bottle or \$3,472 per glass.

In France, due to high import taxes, only some of California's bulk wines are retailed. This economic wrinkle has kept many French tasters from experiencing the excellent wines such as our GSE Team produce. Most of France's 323 million annual bottle yield stays at home.

Enlightened agriculture accents the French countryside's: Bright yellow Rapeseed rows provide grain for a domestic biofuel industry. Interestingly 85% of Frances electric power is generated from nuclear power reactors.

Poignantly, many vineyards and chateau's groom the rolling hills in areas with 101 Appellation designations. Many of these areas were the battle grounds in WW I and II. Memorials to those lost in war are visible frequently. French people are proud to honor the fallen and tribute their sacrifices in the now peaceful, productive pursuit of perfect reds, whites and bubbly.

Mercy's Village provides an education to orphans of war, AIDS in Uganda

Jeami Duncan first heard about the atrocities in Uganda from a friend who had served on a mission there.

"The stories were unbelievable," says Duncan, who was working in human resources at an information technology firm at the time, in the mid-2000s. Her friend recounted the plight of tens of thousands of children conscripted and brainwashed by a maniacal rebel leader who forced them to carry out heinous acts, including orders to murder their siblings and drink blood from their victims' crushed skulls.

"She told me about the night commuters, who would walk miles into town to find a safe place to sleep to avoid being abducted or murdered by the rebels" – that is, by the cultish Lord's Resistance Army, led by Joseph Kony, whose actions displaced millions of people in Uganda and neighboring countries. "I thought it was crazy. It was a huge human migration that happened on a nightly basis."

Duncan decided to go to Uganda herself. "She is one of those people who, when a commercial comes on about Africa or sponsoring children, won't look away," says her husband, Paul.

When Duncan made her first trip, in 2006, Kony's forces were omnipresent in Gulu, the northern city where she stayed. (Kony remains at large and is wanted by the International Criminal Court on charges of crimes against humanity.)

"I signed up with Life Connections International for the trip. Nobody else signed up," Duncan says. "I never thought about how dangerous it was. When I got there, I stayed with a missionary couple. They had to check on the conditions of the only road into Gulu. The rebels ambushed cars, blew them up, and burned the occupants alive."

On her first day, she went to a camp for 20,000 displaced persons. "I was the naive American," says Duncan, who brought a suitcase full of candy, clothes, and other goods donated by her church. "Within five minutes, I was completely overwhelmed. As I was handing out clothes, mothers were handing me naked babies.

"The children were so malnourished," she recalls. "They are lucky to get one meal in three days. Every night I heard personal stories about the war, and every story was a brutal murder story. There was no hope in people's eyes," she says. "I came home devastated. Those images kept running through my head. I asked a lot of questions. What can one person do?"

Duncan, now 31 and a member of the Rotary Club of El Segundo, California, USA, spent five years planning and fundraising. Today, 136 children – most of them orphaned by war or AIDS – are receiving an education through Mercy's Village International primary school. The school, which opened in 2011, has students ages five to nine in the first, second, and third grades and aims to add a grade each year, through grade seven. An individual recently donated \$10,000 to construct a kitchen, and the school is raising money for a building to use as a dining hall and as a space for after-school and adult literacy programs. Eventually, Duncan says, "we would love to have a computer lab and electricity."

The idea for a school came from the villagers themselves. In 2007, Duncan returned to Uganda and consulted with elders in Gulu about the best way to help. "They humbled me," she says. "They told me that a lot of aid organizations or Westerners come in and do what they want to do." The villagers advised her to focus on education. Though primary education is officially free in Uganda, fees for uniforms and supplies are overwhelming for many families.

Joe Harding, a member of the El Segundo club, plans to visit the school with several other Rotarians. When he first met Duncan, he was impressed. "Having been to Uganda in 1998, I knew firsthand all the things she was talking about," Harding says. "I was inspired by her. I felt she had to become a Rotarian. She doesn't just talk about it. You can see the long-range plan and the energy she puts into it. Mercy's Village is a part of her, and she has a way of making it a part of you."

Dear fellow Rotarians,

The year 2012 is nearly gone, and we have reached the midpoint of this Rotary year. It is time to take stock of the goals we have set for ourselves, and the progress we have made toward them. Are we on track to achieve what we set out to accomplish?

I am a great believer in the importance of setting goals that are high but realistic. A worthwhile goal should be within your reach but still require you to stretch. Opening yourself to a new challenge helps you find out what you are really capable of which may well be more than you think.

On 1 July, we will embark on our newest challenge as an organization: the full rollout of the Future Vision Plan, the new grant model for our Rotary Foundation. We in Rotary have set for ourselves a simple and vital goal: to do the most good we can with all the resources we have. To do this, we will be working to reduce overhead; to improve accountability, transparency, and local control; and to focus our service more intensely in the areas where we know we can have the most impact.

With Future Vision, we will implement a simplified grant structure that will encourage Rotarians to serve in our six areas of focus: peace and conflict prevention/resolution, disease prevention and treatment, water and sanitation, maternal and child health, basic education and literacy, and economic and community development. These are areas in which Rotarians around the world have already been working for many years, and in which we have experience and a track record of project sustainability.

Sustainability will be a major focus under Future Vision, as we shift our emphasis to long-term, high-impact projects. Simply put, a sustainable project is one that will continue to benefit the world even after Rotary funding ends. The ultimate example of a sustainable project, of course, is polio eradication: When polio is gone, the good that we have done will continue forever, centuries after the last polio vaccine is given. And the lessons we have learned from PolioPlus are universal. A truly sustainable project requires an emphasis on planning and cooperation, a long-term perspective, and an approach that considers community members as partners in our service, not passive recipients.

Embracing Future Vision means embracing a more ambitious view of Rotary - one in which we work to address major issues in a serious, lasting way. It is a new way of thinking about our service, and an approach that I believe will lead to a Foundation more capable than ever of Doing Good in the World.

Rotarians call for "Peace Without Borders" during Berlin forum

More than 1,800 Rotarians, community leaders, and students and alumni of the Rotary Peace Centers program gathered in Berlin 30 November through 2 December to promote peace during the first of three Rotary Global Peace Forums.

"Peace is like bread. You have to bake it fresh every day," said Luis Vicente Giay, past RI president, in convening the forum.

Two upcoming forums will be held in Honolulu, Hawaii, 25-27 January, and in Hiroshima, Japan, 17-18 May. Nobel Peace Prize laureate and Member of Parliament Aung San Suu Kyi of Myanmar will be the keynote speaker in Hawaii.

The three-day Berlin forum was the largest Rotary event in Germany since the RI Convention in Munich 25 years ago. The audience was as diverse as the nationalities of the participants, with Rotaractors, Rotary Peace Fellows, exchange students, and guests joining Rotarians and community leaders. More than 100 participants from District 1940's Rotary Youth Leadership Award (RYLA) seminar involving 12 countries also took part in the forum.

Berlin declaration

The attendees adopted a declaration calling for "Peace Without Borders," recognizing that "all human beings have the right to live in a state of peace, free from violence, persecution, inequality, and suffering "

The three sites for the peace forums were selected by RI President Sakuji Tanaka because each was heavily affected by the events of World War II and now represents the healing power of sustainable peace between nations.

"As a member of the first generation to grow up in Japan after World War II, I understand the importance of peace and its connection to our well-being," said Tanaka. "Working for peace is a lifelong task. Every day, in 34,000 clubs around the world, we work together for a more peaceful world by bringing water, health, education, and hope to the people who need it most."

My Rotary Moment

Every Rotarian, said Tanaka, has a story to tell. Some of those are compiled in his new book "My Rotary Moment," a collection of personal essays and stories written by Rotary's senior leaders. Copies of the book, signed by Tanaka, were sold at the forum, with proceeds going to The Rotary Foundation.

Wilfrid J. Wilkinson, chair of The Rotary Foundation, noted that building peace in the world is one of the main elements of the Foundation's mission. He said Rotary's efforts to eradicate polio have demonstrated how Rotarians can band together to overcome barriers of culture, religion, language, and conflict.

"We can create one of the great miracles of polio eradication: Days of Tranquility, when those involved in an armed conflict call a cease-fire to allow children access to health care," Wilkinson said. "To save children from polio, we've convinced people to lay down their arms in Afghanistan, Southern Sudan, and Somalia. That's something no one else has been able to do. And if that's not creating peace through our Rotary Foundation, I don't know what is."

Calmer societies

RI General Secretary John Hewko explained how Rotary's humanitarian service, even when it is not explicitly labeled peace-building, creates communities and societies that are calmer, more prosperous, and less violent.

"By helping to build a healthier, more literate society, you are doing the single most effective thing you can do to establish peace in the long term," Hewko said. "A society that is educated, self-sufficient, and has its citizens productively engaged in commerce and agriculture and industry, is

simply more stable, and less prone to conflict."

Five former peace fellows took part in a panel at the forum. "I would like to encourage you to contact us and to use the resources you have invested so much in," said Brigitta von Messling of Germany, a member of the first class of peace fellows, in 2002. Constanze Maria Abendroth, past chair of the Rotaract Germany Committee, presented the New Generation perspective on peace.

Peace project display

More than 100 peace projects were also on display at the forum's marketplace. Two of the projects were selected to receive an award from Tanaka during the final session.

Intercountry committees from all over the world convened separate meetings in the run-up to the forum, asking the question, "How can the intercountry committees make a more effective contribution to the Rotary peace initiatives?"

Past RI President Rajendra K. Saboo explained that ten years ago, Rotary created the Peace Centers program to promote research, teaching, public relations, and knowledge on issues of peace and conflict resolution.

"We believe that by providing advance education opportunities for peace fellows chosen from various countries and different cultures, they will grow into potential leaders in their respective regions or countries," Saboo said. They will then be able to use their training "to promote greater tolerance and co-operation among peoples, leading to world peace and understanding."

Rotary clubs have sponsored scholars earning master's degrees in peace and conflict resolution at leading universities in Australia, England, Japan, Sweden, and the United States. A three-month professional development certificate program was established at Chulalongkorn University in Thailand in 2004.

Dear fellow Rotarians,

The year 2012 is nearly gone, and we have reached the midpoint of this Rotary year. It is time to take stock of the goals we have set for ourselves, and the progress we have made toward them. Are we on track to achieve what we set out to accomplish?

I am a great believer in the importance of setting goals that are high but realistic. A worthwhile goal should be within your reach but still require you to stretch. Opening yourself to a new challenge helps you find out what you are really capable of – which may well be more than you think.

On 1 July, we will embark on our newest challenge as an organization: the full rollout of the Future Vision Plan, the new grant model for our Rotary Foundation. We in Rotary have set for ourselves a simple and vital goal: to do the most good we can with all the resources we have. To do this, we will be working to reduce overhead; to improve accountability, transparency, and local control; and to focus our service more intensely in the areas where we know we can have the most impact.

With Future Vision, we will implement a simplified grant structure that will encourage Rotarians to serve in our six areas of focus: peace and conflict prevention/resolution, disease prevention and treatment, water and sanitation, maternal and child health, basic education and literacy, and economic and community development. These are areas in which Rotarians around the world have already been working for many years, and in which we have experience and a track record of project sustainability.

Sustainability will be a major focus under Future Vision, as we shift our emphasis to long-term, high-impact projects. Simply put, a sustainable project is one that will continue to benefit the world even after Rotary funding ends. The ultimate example of a sustainable project, of course, is polio eradication: When polio is gone, the good that we have done will continue forever, centuries after the last polio vaccine is given. And the lessons we have learned from PolioPlus are universal. A truly sustainable project requires an emphasis on planning and cooperation, a long-term perspective, and an approach that considers community members as partners in our service, not passive recipients.

Embracing Future Vision means embracing a more ambitious view of Rotary – one in which we work to address major issues in a serious, lasting way. It is a new way of thinking about our service, and an approach that I believe will lead to a Foundation more capable than ever of Doing Good in the World.

Indian Rotarians perform corrective surgeries in Nigeria



Nigerian Rotarians help surgeons from India unload baggage in Abuja

A group of Rotarians from India gave hope and dignity to about 400 children crippled by polio during a 10-day medical mission in Nigeria this month.

The team of 19 physicians -- most of them orthopedic surgeons -- assisted by 6 nonmedical volunteers, performed corrective surgeries on young polio patients ages 1 to 18 at two hospitals in Abuja, Nigeria's capital. The project was partly funded by a US\$50,000 Rotary Foundation Matching Grant.

The mission also aimed to create awareness of the need for immunizations and of Rotary's efforts to eradicate the disease, says project leader and Past RI President Rajendra K. Saboo.

Nigeria, along with Pakistan and Afghanistan, are the only three countries where polio remains endemic. In February, the World Health Organization removed India from the polio-endemic list.

Reaching across borders

"Many experts predicted that India would be the last country to stop polio. Instead, India was able to beat polio," says Saboo, who is from Chandigarh, Union Territory, India. "Now it is our turn to help the remaining polio-endemic countries by reaching across borders to share our success and strategies."

Through the surgeries, Saboo says, Rotary not only gives hope to young polio victims but also helps build trust and confidence with parents in communities where immunizations are still desperately needed

"This is a humanitarian project about goodwill and international understanding, but more important, it's about social mobilization and advocacy to reach out to parents of children who are not getting immunized," says Saboo. "If India can do it, so can Nigeria. We have similar problems, similar conditions, and are afflicted by poverty and illiteracy. But we [brought] a message of hope that Nigeria will soon be polio-free."

Rotarian Deepak Purohit, one of 12 orthopedic surgeons on the team, has worked on several similar surgery missions over the last 15 years, including projects in India, Ethiopia, Zambia, and Nigeria.

"Polio-corrective surgeries are a professional passion of mine," says Purohit, a member of the Rotary Club of Panvel, Maharashtra, India. "When the polio deformities are corrected on these children, we give them dignity and normalcy. When they can only crawl coming here and then be able to stand weeks later, we make them feel like normal human beings. This is a great thing we are achieving."

Bone correction

Purohit says the team conducted three types of surgeries: soft tissue repair, bone correction, and tendon replacement. The average recovery time is three to eight weeks, depending on the surgery.

Nigerian Rotarians will follow up to make sure the patients receive the required postoperative care, says Saliu Ahmed, past governor of District 9125 (Nigeria).

"This is a great opportunity for Nigeria to meet the medical needs of those crippled by polio and to be able to help them use their limbs," says Ahmed. "This medical mission is a loud message to our communities that Rotary cares, that Rotary will stay in this fight for polio eradication until it is won."



First packaged grant with Oikocredit develops women's business skills

Philippine Rotarians conduct a survey of women who received loans from Ahon Sa Hirap, Inc., as part of a packaged grant.

Rotarians in Antipolo, Philippines, are teaching more than 2,000 women how to run businesses and balance family and work responsibilities, through an economic and community development project supported by a US\$50,000 Rotary Foundation packaged grant.

In packaged grants, the Foundation has already completed the initial tasks of finding a strategic partner and designing the project's framework, which lets participating Rotarians focus on assessing community needs, providing technical expertise, publicizing the project, and evaluating its progress.

The project, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Manila Circle, features the first packaged grant applied in collaboration with Oikocredit, one of Rotary's strategic partners. The Rotarians work with microfinance institutions in their own communities to develop and run targeted training programs that increase the impact of microloans.

Assessing local needs

In the spring of 2012, the Philippine Rotarians teamed up with Ahon Sa Hirap, Inc. (ASHI), a network of microlenders supported by Oikocredit, to survey ASHI borrowers living in and around Antipolo. The study revealed that most of the women who had failed to repay their loans on time did so because they lacked experience balancing work and family responsibilities.

The survey also discovered that almost all of the women were willing to learn new entrepreneurial skills to expand their income-earning opportunities.

Implementing the project

After receiving approval for a packaged grant, Rotarians got together with ASHI to hire university-trained professionals to develop two training modules. The first explores the demands of family life and the demands of employment.

A second module helps the women identify and develop their business skills and also identify business opportunities, based on their resources and local market conditions.

Speakers and facilitators hired by the club have begun teaching weekly classes at 52 centers ASHI runs in the Antipolo area. Each class is 25 sessions. The staff at each center provides logistical support, such as transporting women to the sessions, preparing conference rooms, supporting the speakers and facilitators, and serving food as needed.

Ensuring sustainability

The women will be able to use the business skills they learn to better provide for their families throughout their lives and the training is expected to make them less likely to default on their loans. This in turn will expand the capacity of the microlender to make new loans.

In addition, ASHI staff are being trained to teach the modules, which will increase the project's sustainability. Rolando Pagaspas, president of the Manila Circle club, said ASHI's president has pledged to make the modules a requirement for all women seeking loans and to extend the training program to some of ASHI's other 2,000 centers.

"The outcome of the project will be further duplicated, and sustained, even after the funding has been expended," Pagaspas says.

Measuring impact

The Manila Rotarians are testing the women before and after the training to determine how much they learn and asking each participant to form a simple entrepreneurial plan roughly equivalent to a small business plan. They, along with ASHI, also plan to monitor the participants' income levels and loan repayment rates.



Top 5 Rotary stories of 2012

The year got off to an exciting start in January when India marked a year without a new case of polio. By February, the World Health Organization had removed India from the list of endemic countries.

Here's a look back at this and other memorable Rotary events of 2012.

1. India polio free

After going an entire year without a new reported case of polio, India was removed from the list of polio-endemic countries by the World Health Organization (WHO). Ghulam Nabi Azad, India's minister of Health and Family Welfare, made the announcement at the Polio Summit 2012 in New Delhi on 25 February.

The news was a huge boost to the morale of Rotarians, who have been laboring to eradicate the crippling disease since 1985. Only three countries -- Nigeria,

Pakistan, and Afghanistan -- remain on the polio-endemic list.

A chief contributor to India's success is the widespread use of the bivalent oral polio vaccine, which is effective against both remaining types of the poliovirus. Another is rigorous monitoring, which has helped reduce the number of children missed by health workers during National Immunization Days to less than 1 percent, according to WHO. The lessons learned in India may well serve to help immunization efforts in the remaining endemic countries.

In May, Rotarians at the RI Convention in Bangkok, Thailand, celebrated Rotary's having exceeded the US\$200 Million Challenge for polio eradication efforts. The challenge was Rotary's response to \$355 million in matching grants from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

But the work is far from complete, because worldwide eradication has not yet been achieved. Later in the year, Rotary launched an online petition drive to urge government leaders to continue funding the Global Polio Eradication Initiative's efforts. And in October, RI launched the World's Biggest Commercial, which enables people visiting the new End Polio Now website to add their photo and join the effort to make history.

2. New grant model

Rotary districts have begun qualifying for The Rotary Foundation's new grant model, which goes into effect for all districts on 1 July. For the past three years, 100 pilot districts have been testing this Future Vision model, providing feedback to help the Foundation refine it.

The model includes three types of grants: district, global, and packaged. Applications for district grants began in late October, and those for the other two types will begin early in 2013.

District grants offer clubs and districts flexibility in carrying out activities that further the Foundation's mission, and can be used for short-term projects in both local and international communities. Districts can request up to 50 percent of their District Designated Fund in one annual block grant.

For example, Rotarians in District 5340 (California, USA) used district grants to provide clean water for rural communities in South Sudan and to boost the capacity to carry out search-and-rescue efforts in their own community, among other projects. Read more.

Global grants support large international activities with sustainable, measurable outcomes in one or more of the six areas of focus. Rotarians in Mozambique used a global grant to provide water and improved sanitation for 2,500 students and staff at a primary school. Read more.

Packaged grants provide opportunities for Rotary clubs to work with the Foundation's strategic partners on predesigned projects and activities that support the areas of focus and that are funded entirely by the World Fund and the strategic partner. Through a packaged grant in District 3810 (Philippines), Rotarians are teaching more than 2,000 women in Antipolo business skills and ways to balance family and work responsibilities. Read more.

3. RI theme

RI President Sakuji Tanaka unveiled the 2012-13 RI theme, *Peace Through Service*, during the International Assembly in January. The then president-elect urged the Rotary leaders in training to explore the many ways they would be able to build peace through acts of service. He also asked Rotarians to promote three Rotary Global Peace Forums, the first of which was held 30 November to 2 December in Berlin. Remaining forums will be in Honolulu, Hawaii, in January, and Hiroshima, Japan, in May.

4. 2012 RI Convention

More than 35,000 Rotarians from 181 countries and geographical areas converged on Bangkok, Thailand, in May for the 2012 RI Convention. They celebrated successes in the campaign to eradicate polio (see above), and left with renewed energy to continue the fight against the crippling disease.

Her Royal Highness Princess Chulabhorn represented His Majesty the King during the opening ceremony, thanking Rotarians for their good work around the world. During four packed days of plenary and breakout sessions, Rotarians heard from a number of speakers, including microcredit pioneer and Nobel Peace laureate Muhammad Yunus; antipoverty crusader Hugh Evans; Gillian Sorenson, senior adviser and national advocate at the United Nations Foundation; and Grammy Award-winning singer-songwriter and activist Angelique Kidjo.

During the World Peace Symposium that preceded the convention, former Sudanese child soldier Emmanuel Jal talked about the atrocities he had witnessed, and Liberian Nobel Peace laureate Leymah Gbowee urged attendees to continue working for peace.

5. Interact turns 50; peace centers, 10

Interact clubs and their sponsors around the globe celebrated the program's 50th anniversary during World Interact Week, 5-11 November.

The first Interact club, at Melbourne High School in Melbourne, Florida, USA, received its charter in November 1962 under the guidance and sponsorship of the Rotary Club of Melbourne. In celebration of the golden anniversary, charter members of the club joined current Interactors and Rotarians from District 6930 for a night of reflection and fellowship.

The Rotary Peace Centers program marked its 10th anniversary in 2012. The program has been offering master's degrees in peace and conflict resolution at leading universities in Australia, England, Japan, Sweden, and the United States since 2002. In 2004, a three-month professional development certificate program was added at Chulalongkorn University in Thailand.
