#### MILES TO END POLIO: \$6 MILLION CROSSES THE FINISH LINE FOR POLIO ERADICATION



Rotary members and staff biked 104 miles in the annual El Tour de Tucson, raising \$6 million for the fight to end polio.

Rotary General Secretary John Hewko and six RI staff members bicycled 104 miles in Tucson Arizona, USA, on Saturday, for the Miles to End Polio event, raising more than \$6 million for polio eradication.

The money raised by Rotary will receive a two-to-one match from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation.

In addition to the team from Evanston, 100 Rotary member riders took part in the ride.

The fundraising ride is part of the annual El Tour de Tucson bike event in Tucson, Arizona, USA. The race attracts more than 9,000 cyclists a year, making it one of the top cycling events in the U.S. The Rotary team from Evanston was joined by Rotary members from Arizona's District 5500, and other members from around the world.

Hewko tweeted that he finished the race in 5 hours and 2 minutes.

"Really enjoyed riding in EI Tour de Tucson along with 100 Rotarians and members of the Rotary International staff," Hewko added. "As a group we were able to raise over \$6 million for polio eradication which will help bring us even closer to the dream of a polio-free world. I am deeply moved by the generosity and passion of Rotarians around the world and Rotary staff."

#### The Rotary Foundation rises on expert list of top nonprofits

#### THE ROTARY FOUNDATION'S EXPENDITURES GO TO ...



The Rotary Foundation has continued its steady growth, moving up 35 spots to 85th in The Chronicle of Philanthropy's annual ranking of the top 400 nonprofit organizations in the United States. The ranking is based on monetary contributions from private sources and reflects the increasing generosity of those who support Rotary's mission.

According to The Chronicle of Philanthropy, The Rotary Foundation received \$239,576,000 in 2013, a 32.4 percent increase from the previous year.

"This clearly shows our members recognize the unparalleled value of giving to their Foundation," says John Hewko, Rotary's general secretary. "They know that by giving to the Foundation their dollars have a much greater impact. And friends of Rotary respect that the Foundation puts their gift to great use."

The Foundation recently earned a 4-star rating from Charity Navigator, the largest and most prestigious independent evaluator of nonprofits in the United States. In the 2013-14 Rotary year, 92 percent of the Foundation's expenditures were applied to programs, with only 6 percent spent on fundraising and 2 percent on administrative expenses. The Foundation funded \$23.5 million in district grants and \$47.3 million in global grants. These grants support local and international humanitarian projects as well as scholarships.

Together with its partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, Rotary has led the effort to eradicate polio, contributing more than \$1.3 billion to the initiative since its outset. When an outbreak of polio threatened the Horn of Africa and the Middle East in 2013, Rotary provided emergency funds, including a \$500,000 rapid-response grant for Somalia and a \$500,000 grant to the World Health Organization (WHO) to cover operational costs in the Middle East. As a result, the outbreak in the Horn of Africa slowed, and Syria reported only one case of polio in the first half of 2014.

Rotary is also at the forefront of efforts to fight other diseases. According to WHO, indoor air pollution causes 4.3 million deaths per year worldwide. To combat it, members of the Rotary Club of Taos-Milagro, New Mexico, USA, mobilized Rotary clubs in several countries to support the Himalayan Stove Project, which has installed more than 3,000 clean-burning stoves in Nepal.

In Tamil Nadu, India, Rotary clubs partnered with clubs in Maryland, USA, to use a Foundation global grant to purchase a large van and outfit it with X-ray equipment to screen women for breast cancer in hard-to-reach communities. The "mammobus" has conducted more than 2,500 free breast cancer screenings and detected and treated early-stage cancer in six women. Rotary members in Malindi, Kenya, teamed up with members in Maryland and Idaho, USA, to work with the Genesis World Mission in creating a rainwater catchment system to provide clean drinking water, irrigate crops, and establish fish farms in Burangi, Kenya.

In Seattle, Washington, USA, Rotary members are diverting millions of pounds of fruit and vegetables from the waste stream and into the hands of those who need it through Rotary First Harvest, a program of District 5030.



## Visit, Tell A Friend, Volunteer: Sonoma County Museum

Sonoma County Museum

980s Expanded to include Art

2010 Joined with the ATT "Mus the Square" Project

Director Diane Evans provided a window of insightful history into the past and present at The Museum of Sonoma County. While not a public agency, the Museum's current history venue is located in the former U.S. Post Office Building moved to 7<sup>th</sup> Street in the late 1970's.

Recently acquired, the former Conklin Brother's showroom and warehouse built in 1957 is being transformed into the second venue, exclusively to focus on the Museum's art features. This site replaced the former Courthouse Square ATT building, under previous consideration. The former Conklin building displays a unique roof fascia, Artist Ned Kahn's "Erratic Fence", a dynamic mobile sensitive to wind.

Compared to similarly budgeted (\$1.5-1.6 million annual operating) regional museums such as Ventura and Santa Cruz, Sonoma County Museum's dual Art-History mission is accepting challenges posed by funding changes since the 2008 recession, (fortunately greatly improved) and proximity to San Francisco's cultural institutions.

Designated in 1984 on the National Historic Register, the landmark Post Office/Museum's History venue is well on its way to becoming a

destination location for regional tourists. Director Evans has developed countywide support as reflected in the endowment increase to the Museum, now at \$3.5 million, 22,000 visitors annually, including 3,200 students. As a Smithsonian Affiliate, (see below), our Museum features regular exhibits in conjunction with our Nation's premier institute.

The Sonoma County Museum celebrates and interprets the region's rich history, art, and culture by exhibiting and collecting relevant objects and artworks, by serving as a vital community gathering place, and by inspiring visitors with dynamic experiences that engage, educate, and enlighten.

#### Smithsonian Affiliate

The museum is a Smithsonian Affiliate. Smithsonian Affiliations has established partnerships with 144 museums and other organizations in 39 states, the District of Columbia, Panama and Puerto Rico since it was established in 1996. A Smithsonian Affiliation is conferred by application to institutions whose collections and mission are similar to those of the Smithsonian.

#### MAKE FRIENDS IN JAPAN THIS SUMMER

In April, 1865, fifteen young students left Kagoshima, Japan, to travel abroad and learn Western ways. After spending some time being educated in Great Brittan and Europe, these students returned to Japan and became the driving force behind Japan's modernization.

One of these students, Kanaye Nagasawa, did not return to Japan and eventually came to Santa Rosa, where he was the builder and owner of the Round Barn which is the historical link between Kagoshima, Japan and Santa Rosa.

Now, more than 75 years after Nagasawa's death, we are sending students to Japan to learn Japanese ways. We hope this cultural exchange will inspire many lifelong friendships and strengthen the bonds of world peace.

In 1987, the Santa Rosa—Kagoshima Student Exchange Program was founded as a joint venture of the Friends of Kagoshima and the Santa Rosa Sunrise Rotary Club.

Santa Rosa Sunrise Rotary is now the sponsor. The purpose of SRKSEP is to send exchange students to Japan and to host exchange students from Japan in order to improve the cultural understanding of our young people and to broaden their horizons. The Programs sends students to Japan one year and the following year receives students from Japan. For the fourteenth time in 2015, Santa Rosa will send students to Japan.

#### **ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS**

- 1. Students and parents must be Sonoma County residents
- 2. Generally, students should be between 15 and 20 years old.
- 3. Students must have maintained a respected level of achievement in both academic and extra-curricular activities.
- 4. Students must attend all orientations
- 5. Students and families must host a visiting Japanese student the following year, 2016, for two weeks in the summer.

The cost to each student is approximately \$3,000. A limited scholarship might be available. The trip is subsidized by the Santa Rosa Sunrise Rotary, The Friends of Kagoshima, and Santa Rosa businesses, Rotary Clubs of Hiroshima and Kagoshima and the Friends of Santa Rosa in Kagoshima. The trip is valued at approximately \$6,000.

The recent Ebola outbreak in West Africa, the worst ever, has claimed several thousand lives and generated worldwide concern. But its impact pales in comparison to that of AIDS, which, despite advances in treatment, still kills more than a million people a year, the majority of them in Africa.

"Even with the Ebola outbreak at its worst expected levels, it's never going to reach what we've seen with the HIV/AIDS epidemic," said Dr. Timothy B. Erickson, director of the Center for Global Health at the University of Illinois at Chicago, speaking at Rotary's World AIDS Day event in Evanston on 1 December. "There's a lot of mystery behind Ebola, and it's grabbing the headlines," he said. "But we need to keep [focused] on what's killing people."

Warning that donor fatigue is causing a drop in funding for AIDS prevention and research, Erickson said that the time to give is now, because biomedical advances hold the promise of eliminating the disease. Existing drugs are making it possible for a person with HIV to have a long and normal life without developing AIDS. And, perhaps even more promising, a person who is HIV-positive and receives treatment is 95 percent less likely to spread the disease than someone who goes without treatment.

Rotary is involved in the fight against HIV/AIDS through its emphasis on disease prevention and treatment, one of its six areas of focus. Rotary clubs sponsor projects to help those infected with HIV and hold school forums to educate young people about lowering their risk of infection. A Rotarian Action Group, Rotarians for Family Health and AIDS Prevention (RFHA), organizes large-scale Family Health Days in sub-Saharan Africa to deliver HIV screening and counseling along with a wide range of health services.

But despite the advances, problems remain in getting help to the people who need it. A major obstacle, according to another expert who spoke at the World AIDS Day event, is the stigma that is still often attached to HIV/AIDS.

"One of the biggest things that prevents us from getting people tested, getting people linked to medical providers, is that people anticipate the stigma they are going to confront," said Matt Richards, director of Care2Prevent at the University of Chicago, a pediatric and adolescent HIV treatment and prevention program.

Richards said that less than 25 percent of HIV-positive people in the United States are receiving virus-suppressing treatment.

RFHA aims to minimize the stigma and reach as many people as possible with its Family Health Days by focusing the event on the entire family. Mothers bring their children to receive polio and measles vaccines, and adults come to be screened for tuberculosis, malaria, diabetes, and hypertension as well as HIV.

"There is something for everyone," said Marion Bunch, a Rotary member from Atlanta, Georgia, USA, who founded the group after her son died of AIDS in 1994. "We added all these enticing services to get them to come and to bring their kids. They will not come just for HIV," she said.

By partnering with governments, nongovernmental organizations, and private foundations, the Rotarian Action Group has steadily expanded the scope of its Family Health Days, from 100 sites in Uganda and Nigeria in 2011 to 414 sites last spring across Uganda, Nigeria, Ghana, South Africa, and Swaziland. MTN, an African telecommunications company, has signed on as a partner for next year's health days in South Africa.

In Georgia, Rotary clubs sponsor an AIDS Awareness program in schools. Students in seventh, eighth, and ninth grades learn how to avoid HIV, and hear first-person accounts about living with the virus. Bunch says it's a program that any club could easily replicate.

Rotary's World AIDS Day event was the latest in a series of global updates in the areas of focus, where Rotary directs its efforts. Another update, on water and sanitation, is planned in March for World Water Day.

How a simple school project in India became a global grant

Two years ago, U.S. Rotary members in Maine set out to improve the education system in Bikaner, Rajasthan, an Indian city near the border of Pakistan.

The Rotary Club of Kennebunk Portside chose Bikaner because club member Rohit Mehta was originally from the area and had connections there. Mehta put the club in contact with Rotarians in India to provide desks for four government-run schools.

But when community leaders returned with a request for more desks, the Maine Rotarians decided they had to think bigger. The Rotary Foundation had rolled out its new grant model, which required that the club do more than just purchase school furniture to qualify for global grant funding. Club leaders put their heads together and turned a simple project to provide school desks into a global grant project by adding a campaign to recruit new students and professional development for teachers.

"Because the new grant standards required further thought, a superior grant emerged," notes Peter Johnson, Rotary Foundation chair for District 7780, which covers Maine. "Additional questions were asked, which boil down to, 'OK, they need benches [desks] and you want to help them get their benches, but what's going to happen with these benches?' The standards dramatically improved the project's scope, tone, and tenor."

The Rotary clubs worked with School Management Committees — teams of school administrators, community leaders, and Bikaner Rotary members — to determine what each school needed most. They discovered that the children were unschooled and had never sat in a classroom before. So the committees decided it would be easier to get the students to commit to a three-day-a-week lesson plan. That left the other two days for the same benches to be used for teacher training.

"The teachers at the government schools are well qualified, but they provide an education within the framework of their stipulated syllabus only," says Man Mohan Kalyani, project leader for the Bikaner club. "This does not include many things that are needed for the overall development of the students. So we set about supporting both teachers and students with these additional skills."

The global grant will provide desks for 1,685 students. The training will target 240 teachers. In addition to instruction in basic subjects, the curriculum aims to improve students' self-confidence, communication skills, leadership skills, and personality development. The clubs expect the program will have even better results than the earlier shipment of desks, which helped improve grades by 23 percent in the four recipient schools. Those results alone led regional authorities to select two of the schools as sites for annual examinations, meaning local students did not have to travel 15 miles to another city to take the exam.

Cornelia Stockman, a member of the Maine club, traveled to Bikaner early in the grant planning process. She said she was impressed by the level of commitment and professionalism displayed by the School Management Committees.

Stockman said local families who can afford it send their children to private schools with classrooms and desks. By contrast, students at the government-owned schools sit on the ground in an open area surrounded by security walls and gates. There is no compulsory attendance beyond sixth grade. The local education experts insist the students are more likely to stay in school if they have a desk to sit at, Stockman says.

Mehta is thankful the grant was able to help his native country.

"I thought it would be great if we could do something with a region that I had ties to," Mehta says. "And good education is fundamental to the quality of life."

Stockman said even though the process of expanding the project's scope was not without bumps, the Bikaner community responded to every need as the grant application evolved.

"We had to go back to them three or four times, but every time we asked them to do something else, they did it," she recalls. "They never gave up, and did everything necessary to meet the requirements of the global grant."

#### MAKE FRIENDS IN JAPAN THIS SUMMER



#### MAKE FRIENDS IN JAPAN THIS SUMMER

In April, 1865, fifteen young students left Kagoshima, Japan, to travel abroad and learn Western ways. After spending some time being educated in Great Brittan and Europe, these students returned to Japan and became the driving force behind Japan's modernization.

One of these students, Kanaye Nagasawa, did not return to Japan and eventually came to Santa Rosa, where he was the builder and owner of the Round Barn which is the historical link between Kagoshima, Japan and Santa Rosa.

Now, more than 75 years after Nagasawa's death, we are sending students to Japan to learn Japanese ways. We hope this cultural exchange will inspire many lifelong friendships and strengthen the bonds of world peace.

In 1987, the Santa Rosa—Kagoshima Student Exchange Program was founded as a joint venture of the Friends of Kagoshima and the Santa Rosa Sunrise Rotary Club.

Santa Rosa Sunrise Rotary is now the sponsor. The purpose of SRKSEP is to send exchange students to Japan and to host exchange students from Japan in order to improve the cultural understanding of our young people and to broaden their horizons. The Programs sends students to Japan one year and the following year receives students from Japan. For the fourteenth time in 2015, Santa Rosa will send students to Japan

#### **ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS**

- 1. Students and parents must be Sonoma County residents
- 2. Generally, students should be between 15 and 20 years old.
- 3. Students must have maintained a respected level of achievement in both academic and extra-curricular activities
- 4. Students must attend all orientations.
- 5. Students and families must host a visiting Japanese student the following year. 2016, for two weeks in the summer.

The cost to each student is approximately \$3,000. A limited scholarship might be available. The trip is subsidized by the Santa Rosa Sunrise Rotary, The Friends of Kagoshima, and Santa Rosa businesses, Rotary Clubs of Hiroshima and Kagoshima and the Friends of Santa Rosa in Kagoshima. Indoor air pollution linked to millions of deaths

After decades dreaming about the Himalayas, Rotary member George Basch went on his first trek through the mountains in 2001, when he was 64. A member of the Rotary Club of Taos-Melagro in New Mexico, USA, Basch found that the experience was even more than he had hoped.

"My expectations were high, and dramatically exceeded," he remembers

But a less-than-pleasant aspect of the experience was the indoor smoke pollution he encountered in the guest houses and private homes he visited. Many families in the Himalayas use rudimentary cookstoves or, in some cases, an open fire pit inside the home to prepare food.

Basch says the effect is like sitting in front of a campfire roasting marshmallows and suddenly having the wind blow the smoke in your face. "You're coughing, your eyes are tearing, you want to leave," he says. In some homes, this unpleasantness is compounded by the use of yak dung for fuel.

It turns out that the smoke is not only bothersome, it's downright dangerous. The World Health Organization estimates that 4.3 million deaths in 2012 were linked to indoor air pollution in households where cooking is done over coal, wood, and biomass stoves. More than half of the deaths were among children

under age 5. One expert says that having an open fire in the kitchen is like burning 400 cigarettes an hour.

After a second trip to the region in 2009, Basch decided he had to do something. The good news was that the problem could be solved relatively easily with the installation of clean-burning cookstoves.

Basch, an engineer by training, tracked down a clean-burning cookstove made by a company in Colorado and met with the inventors to determine whether the stove would be a good fit in Nepal. The Himalayan Stove Project kicked off with delivery of four dozen stoves to Nepal in 2010. When Basch followed up with a visit the following year, he learned that the stoves had been universally well received.

To date, his project has provided more than 3,000 stoves. For about \$100, the Himalayan Stove project can buy, transport, and install a new stove in a home. Because some of the recipients live in remote areas, the stoves have to be taken in by helicopter and then hand-carried, in some cases for days, to their destinations.

Each family that receives a stove provides a service or makes a donation in exchange, perhaps donating time to a local community center or purchasing supplies for a school or clinic. In one community, families paid small fees for the stoves, and the money was used to create a microfinance program.

Basch is hoping to drum up more support for his project from Rotary clubs around the world. His New Mexico club was the first to make a contribution. Individual Rotarians also have donated to the project.

Basch also is partnering with Rotary members in Nepal. In February, the Rotary Club of Tripureswor, Kathmandu, helped deliver and install 90 stoves in the village of Gamcha. When the Rotary members returned later to interview recipients, they were told that the new stoves used less fuel and cooked food faster than the ones they'd used before.

News like this fuels Basch's determination to change as many lives as he can. "Just in the mountainous areas of Nepal, there is a need for a million stoves," he says. "That would be a wonderful outcome, if we could deliver a stove to everyone who needs one."

This is the time for us to take stock and see, of the goals we set for ourselves at the start of the year, how many we have achieved, and how we can fully realize all of them by the end of this Rotary year.

How are we meeting our goal of polio eradication? Did we encourage our district to give 20 percent of its District Designated Fund toward the eradication of this terrible disease? Are we supporting National Immunization Days? There is still much to do. The number of polio cases in Pakistan in 2014 far exceeded the number in 2013.

Have you made your contribution to our charity – our only charity – our Rotary Foundation? Have we impressed on those Rotarians who have not made a contribution the need to do so? The number of Rotarians who have not given to our Foundation far exceeds the number who have given, and we need to reverse that statistic. Our target for the Annual Fund is US\$123 million. Have you considered taking advantage of the new grants program by using district or global grants? Last year, 858 district grants and 492 global grants were awarded.

Have you nominated a Rotary Peace Fellow candidate? Have you sought out a Major Donor to help fund the program? Have you registered for the Rotary Peace Symposium, just prior to the Rotary International Convention in São Paulo, Brazil, in June?

I have always held the belief that if the message of Rotary does not get to the Rotarian and the club, it loses its thrust. The Rotary club is the heartbeat of Rotary. What you make of the remaining months of the year, as you endeavor to Light Up Rotary, is up to you.
