Letter to the Editor:

Dear Editor,

I noticed you have not yet weighed in on the events that are currently transpiring in Washington. It seems that in the feeding frenzy that has gripped the media you have taken nary a nibble. Is your reluctance to do so based in some high-minded but archaic ethic of wanting to get the facts first before expressing an opinion and passing judgement? Or, is your hesitation based only in squeamishness and some outmoded sense of propriety? Personally, I am wondering what your opinion is on the subject. As an editor of a newsletter, a medium of not inconsequential power in the history of America, it seems to me you have a responsibility to your readers in this time of Crisis in the White House. Perhaps you could offer us more substance and less nonsense.

An Anguished Reader Seeking Leadership

Dear Anguished Seeker,

You are not alone. I sense we are all anguishing and searching.

To begin with, I do not consider myself a "medium of power". Most of the time I feel more like a "below average of inconsequence".

Because I suspect I am not entirely up to date with all the recent developments in the Washington situation I have not felt qualified to address the

issue. Consequently I have not shared my opinions. Also, because I do not consider myself to be particularly astute politically, I have been reluctant to speak out on this matter of national importance.

All of that notwithstanding, I suppose you are right that I do have some responsibility to my readers to articulate my position. It is not without some considerable amount of anxiety that I begin down the path of editorializing in this newsletter. In spite of all that, because you (and possibly others) apparently need me to do so, I will at last express my opinion.

The other reason I am finally prompted to take an unequivocal stand on this subject is my conviction that this "scandal" has been going on entirely too long and it must come to an end soon for the good of the nation. If adding my small voice to the call for sanity in Washington can advance that goal by even a minute, it will be worth whatever personal price I have to pay. Having said all that, I proceed:

I feel very strongly that if the President was involved in planning the break-in at the DNC in the Watergate Complex, if he was complicit in the subsequent cover-up, if he has lied to the American public about his involvement in the "dirty tricks" that have been alleged, and if he did erase the 18 minutes of tape, he should resign from the Presidency immediately. And when this national nightmare is over, may we never again feel the need to use "-gate" as a suffix for scandal, may we only speak well of attorneys, and may we know true leadership once again. Perhaps then we can distinguish character from charisma, recognize nonsense for what it is and still have enough time to reread Thoreau and Chesterton.

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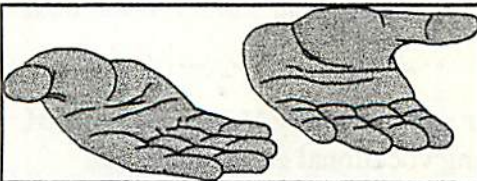

 8:24 a.m. - Pushed TV remote, heard TV weather report: " a welcome break in the series of storms today. Clearing!" Encouraged again, opened eyes. Raining still. Harder now. Concluded there is truth to the parallel universe theory and I am in the wrong damned one.
 9:07 a.m. - Got up anyway. Trundled to barn, fed horses. Retrieved morning paper. Wet feet got muddy. Felt terrible.

The Church of the Incarnation. 550 Mendocino Ave" I decided I would go in search of a metaphor. I had heard about the new pipe organ and was mildly curious. I thought if I could understand why someone would build a pipe organ in 1997 it may explain some of the news in the paper. Maybe I was groping.
 12:04 p.m. - Why would we need a pipe organ, with compressors and air chambers, and reeds, and wood and metal pipes, and a big room to house it all when we have electronics and samplers and digital technology? Why do we need character and judgment when the stock market is up and there is full employment and all seems right with the world? What can 32 ranks of pipes (1886 in all) in three manual divisions, and 25 stops and two keyboard do that an electronic chip can not?
 12:46 p.m. - I tried to remember when they no longer required competitive skaters to do their compulsory figures and if there was some coincident correlation to moral decline in the nation. I tried to remember when I had a sense of humor.
 3:05 p.m. - I decided to go early to get a good seat. It is a small church. Then I thought it wouldn't be necessary. Who would go? A small, hopelessly archaic coterie of pipe organ buffs? Elderly church members? A few lonely souls like myself needing to meet a deadline and fill a column for some club newsletter?
 3:40 p.m. - There is a great bustle of traffic in the 7th Street parking lot. I am astounded. Strike a blow for the good guys. My faith is restored. Good government will return to Washington, children will again play unbothered on front porches. Service returns to gas stations.
 3:42 p.m. - Found a parking place. People were streaming to UA5 for Wag the Dog, The Full Monty, As Good as it Gets, Tomorrow Never Dies (007) and Half Baked. I thought it started to sprinkle again. The line at the church was huge too. Probably turned away 200 people. Maybe more. I was patient and waited in line hoping they may find more space. They compacted the crowd and filled the aisles with chairs. I was one of the last to find a place. They escorted me to the very front of the church, in the chancel, about 7 feet away from the nearest pipes. I was happy to get in. I imagined sitting in the choir of a great stone cathedral.
 4:14 - The last possible person was squeezed in and the concert started.
 4:42 - The grandest piece so far. Some of those sitting around me winced from the impact of sound. A couple, less troubled by the world, dozed. I lost focus for a moment. All I could think of was some cool radical dude of a snowboarder saying "BIG AIR IN THE PIPE!" The sound was massive or gentle. It was huge and crisp; it spoke with clarity and precision and honesty. The only thing lacking for my taste was reverberation. How unlike the news recently. The search for metaphor was abandoned. The search for balance continues. Nothing is easy.
 5:45 p.m. - I wandered around in the church after the concert, studying the structure, the wood, the history, and was drawn to the past; the words and the feelings a link to memories - Septuagesima, chancel, nave, psalms, dedication, Lutheran Church of my youth. Gathering afterwards for coffee and dessert made me feel young again. I wondered where the kids were? I felt strangely disoriented. There was not a single molded Jell-O in the place. Clearly this was not a Lutheran event. But I knew that before - when there was no collection taken at the concert.
 6:20 p.m. - I drove home. Dark now. The constant party was still happening on the street outside restaurants and coffee shops on Fourth Street. The homeless troubadours on the corner were singing their own metaphors to damp, drying dogs.
 7:35 p.m. - The sky was clear and the moon a surprise. It, like the sun, had not made an appearance for days. It is not the same but I

guess we must take our light however and whenever we find it. Ambitious spirals of fog conjured themselves out of darkening Sonoma winter green. I remembered another night last summer when the fog danced the same choreography before settling into a blanket. Then too, music lingered.
 9:47 p.m. - Snowboarding looks like a hoot. Someday - go to Japan. Canadian wins medal and looks like a god. A tear for youth.
 12:35 a.m. - The fog at last rises to engulf the mountain and turn off the moon.
 12:45 a.m. - Take pill - wash glasses - respite from rain - Good Night to wonder!

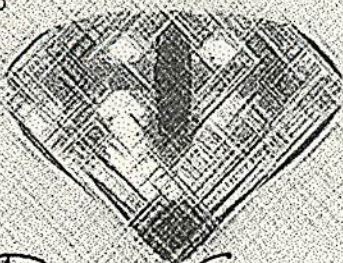

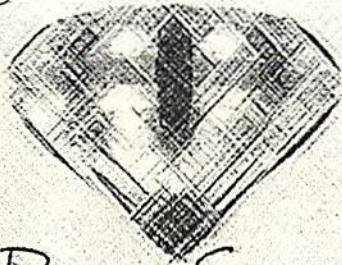
