

Speaker Recap-Michael Demick from Slow Food USA



Michel Demick shared his passion for Slow Food with us and introduced

the idea that the "spice of life is having all different kinds of diversity."

Slow Foods mission is to recognize that the enjoyment of wholesome food is essential to the pursuit of happiness. Slow Foods is an education organization with food and the environment as its focus.

They have identified three great challenges:

- Ecology suffers with industrialization of agriculture.
 Slow Foods supports local farmers and diversity.
- Human health suffers from fast food
- Our nation is trending toward more diversity, potential economic disparity.

Through four programs, Slow

Foods promotes that food is the cornerstone of human culture: (a) Convivium formations (125 chapters); (b) school gardens; (c) Ark of taste to identify endangered foods such as Heritage turkeys and

Gravenstein apples and most importantly, Presidia (market development of small farmers).

By 2010, Slow Food hopes to have 100,000 members plus







Food and Wine Center Takes Shape

Laura Whiting shared with us the vision to renew—rebuild—revitalize our community through the development of The Food and Wine Center in Railroad Square. The project will promote and tourism, and will create a center to emphasize the beauty of our County.

The Center will be a marketplace that serves us and our visitors. It will bring people into our community and feed our economy. It consists of a 30,000 sq. ft. indoor marketplace, plus 15,000 sq. ft for SRJC Culinary Arts Institute along with an outdoor market, public square and offices. The project is planned to happen over three years.

Wendy Eliot SONOMA LAND TRUST

Sonoma Baylands

Project Director Wendy Eliot has 20 years of experience with land protection and restoration projects. She worked as a private consultant on wetland acquisition, planning, project management and mitigation and served on the board of the Strong Foundation for Environmental Values. She developed a model wetland ordinance for local government and edited

a Wetland Restoration Guidebook for the Washington State Department of Ecology Wetlands Section. While living in Washington State, Wendy served on the board of the Capitol Land Trust, administering a wetlands preservation training and education program for land trusts. She has worked for the California State Coastal Conservancy, where she led local government and land trust efforts to acquire and restore wetlands throughout the California coastal zone. Wendy received her Masters of Landscape Architecture-Environmental Planning from UC Berkeley.

Vocational Talk—Mike Kelly

According to the 1978 Multiple Listing Service book, a Bennett Valley home was listed at \$145,000. Today that house sells for \$1.3 million. Mike brought a sample of the 1978 relic from the days when he first stared in the business. Today he receives all his listings to his Palm—every comp, every day.

The market has changed and will continue to change with more and more disclosures and protections. In 1954, a contract was one page, two-sides. Today, Ken's contract was two 2-inch packets.

Over the last 5 years, the home values have gone up 84% in the state. This is based on a paper by the Washington, DC based Center for Economic and Policy Re-

search. Rates are still low and the market is seeing many multiple offers for homes. Mike just sold a house that had 7 offers and it sold for \$20,000 over asking price.



Statewide our affordability dropped 5 % to 23%. Least affordable is the Northern Wine Country (that's us!) followed by the San Diego regions at 15%! Minimum income to buy a medium priced home in California is \$81,290 vs. the nation which is \$40,560!
