Mending Mindanao



Answering a call to lead typhoon Haiyan destruction recovery, Tim Miller, provided a comprehensive summary of his professional and personal assignment in Cebu, Mindanao, Philippines. For over a year, Tim, spouse Lara, and son Ari left their comfort zones in Santa Rosa and made their home in the heavily damaged seaside area.

No stranger to disaster preparedness, as Red Cross Emergency Services Director in Santa Rosa, Tim hit the ground running, tasked with organizing and monitoring health and sanitation development in the first phase of relief. Following the loss of 6,300 lives and hundreds of thousands homeless, Tim's new employer, Lutheran World Relief, partnered with Habitat for Humanity in rebuilding homes and with another local group produced concrete toilets, an essential utility in improved sanitation, often absent in pre-disaster neighborhoods.

An additional principal to the relief model was creating sustainable, resilient economic activities.

Toward this goal, Tim helped establish Milkfish hatcheries, replant denuded coconut orchards, introduce agricultural sprayers and pumps and move beyond a mono-crop dependency. Protective cropping (covering of young, immature plants) added to economic diversity. Risk Reduction assessment resulted in safer neighborhood locations, impending alert systems and civic awareness.

Lara applied her humanitarian values in establishing a cooperative relationship between a local orphanage and the nearby 5-Star Resort to redistribute unconsumed food at the orphanage. Son Ari participated at a Model United Nations Youth Assembly in South Korea.

Decades ago, Tim served as a Peace Corp Volunteer in the Philippines. Between then and now he observed a growing middle class, and noted that a significant sector of the country's opportunity is in Call Centers. Attractive wages, \$5-\$6/hour is very good. Combined with many people abroad sending money back to the Philippines, the nation's ranking as Asia's second fastest growing economy is remarkable.

From karaoke and yo-yo's to crop diversity and more toilets, Cebu, Mindanao and the Philippines are continuing on a course to a better quality of life. Tim, Lara and Ari Miller have built more than a few new steps forward.



he holds a microphone and instead delivered a heart-felt history of his bout with and recovery from polio. Korbin also lauded Rotary for stepping up to do something about the state of the world about which so many others merely complain. And he requested that we continue to "make a difference."

Stricken with "this terrible disease" as a young child of three, in 1943, long before the development of a vaccine in 1950 —51, Korbin considers his recovery to be a "miracle." Memories of being a young child confined to a hospital bed for over a year, in a small Jewish ghetto in New York, are still fresh in his mind. In the year of his ninth birthday, three out of nine children in his small village died. Korbin was completely paralyzed from his head to his toes. But he had no pain. And he survived

The polio virus produces chemicals that block synapses in the brain between neurons. Muscles, that are no longer triggered by the brain, atrophy. The local doctor visited daily, trying to lower his fever of 105 degrees and make him comfortable. Then, one day, he could wriggle his toes! And later he could turn his head! And eventually he could go out and play with the other kids. Korin even learned to punch a ball so hard that he knocked it out of the park.

Physical therapy has taught him not to compensate for weak muscles by using adjacent muscles groups. At Memorial Hospital, here in Santa Rosa, he has learned stretching exercises that help to tone down compensating muscles.

Korbin has been invited to come back and join the Sunrise Rotary. Whether or not he becomes a member, his story will continue to be an inspiration to all of us who strive to eradicate the 1% of the disease that still lingers.

Polio

Poliomyelitis (polio) is a paralyzing and potentially fatal disease that still threatens children in some parts of the world. The poliovirus invades the nervous system and can cause total paralysis in a matter of hours. It can strike at any age but mainly Read more... affects children under five. Polio is incurable, but completely vaccine-preventable.

PolioPlus

In 1985, Rotary launched its PolioPlus program, the Read more... first initiative to tackle global polio eradication through the mass vaccination of children. Rotary has contributed more than \$1.5 billion and countless volunteer hours to immunize more than 2.5 billion.

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

Ensuring Success

Every dollar Rotary commits to polio eradication will be matched two-to-one by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation up to \$35 million a year through 2018. These funds help to provide much-needed operational support, medical personnel, laboratory equipment, and educational materials for health workers and parents. Governments, corporations and private individuals all play a crucial role in funding.

Rotary in Action

More than one million Rotary members have donated their time and personal resources to end polio. Every year, hundreds of Rotary members work side-byside with health workers to vaccinate children in polio-affected countries. Rotarians work with UNICEF and other partners to prepare and distribute mass communication tools to reach people in areas isolated by conflict, geography, or poverty. Rotary members also recruit fellow volunteers, assist with transporting the vaccine, and provide other logistical support.

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

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factors including geographical isolation, poor public infrastructure, armed conflict and cultural barriers. Until polio is eradicated, all countries remain at risk of outbreaks.

Polio Today

Today, there are only two countries that have never stopped transmission of the wild poliovirus: Afghanistan and Pakistan. Less than 370 polio cases were confirmed worldwide in 2014, which is a reduction of more than 99.9 percent since the 1980s, when the world saw about 1,000 cases per day.

La Azucena Eye & Dental Clinic

La Azucena 2016 Eye & Dental Clinics





Today 1344 eyes are smiling, seeing "mas claro" in 672 very grateful Nicaraguans in the Rio San Juan Region of southern Nicaragua. Many of the those same people are equipped with both distance and near pair of glasses and protective sunglasses, "gafas" to keep damaging UV rays off their eyes. In addition, 103 mouths are "mucho mas limpio", reflecting improved oral health and a shift in treatment from extraction to restoration and prevention.



This year, the returning Nicaraguan Couple-Dentists Javier and Ana from the 200 km north capital Managua again worked with a Dental Hygienist from the Sabalos Regional Clinic to treat patients from pre-teen to "viejo", senior citizens. Peter Hoberg accepted the crucial role of instrument sterilizer, earning himself the unenviable evidence of chemically stained orange fingers. Fortunately he did not exhibit any apparent cognitive lapses while on duty.

Over the course of three days, Sunrise Rotarians and some of their family focused on improving people's visual acuity. Steve "Grandpa" Zwick was the third generation in his family represented and remarkably

both his daughter Jennifer and granddaughter Alessa brought valuable Spanish language and organizational skills. Steve's español is well known! Alessa, just 12, quickly established her organizational skills in the eyewear department, and with the village children: She taught them London Bridges Falling Down, and jumped rope (with the girls), creating a genuine sense of "amistad", aka friendship between our Team and the people of La Azucena.



Completing our Team were first timers Harry "Happy" Coffey, Paul O'Rear, and Carmen "Señiorita" Gutierrez. Veterans Peter "Green Fingers" Hoberg, Ezbon "General" Jen, Penny ~ also Spanish proficient Millar (her husband is Paul O'Rear) Steve "Auto-Refractor" Herron, Rich and Señora Habla Español Betsy Randolph, and our District Governor Erin Dunn from Fortuna. Planning, Leading, Encouraging and Mentoring us all, gladly again was John, "Numero Uno" Jones. With the assistance of Rafael Preslyn, John assured we all got to our appointed rounds on time, had wonderful accommodations and local places of interest to pique our curiosity in Central American history ~ of which there is a lot involving the United States.

Following our formal clinical operations, we visited

the town of Sàbalos where Sunrise Rotary is awaiting final approvals to build a surgical center adjacent to the existing Regional Medical and Dental Center. A visit to a local hotel gave us an opportunity to make and sample fresh chocolate, directly pressed from fresh roasted beans. Not far, in El Castillo, "The Fort" we could climb atop the sentry outlook for Pirates of the Caribbean. Further inland we had views of two volcanoes, Mombacho and Masaya. Currently aglow, Masaya was closed to local viewing as opposed to previous years in which one could peer over a cliff into the steaming caldera. The city of Granada, pop. 131,000 possesses, some say the best-preserved examples of Spanish architecture dating back to the 1500's.,

Our Team was also fortunate to be accompanied by a brigade of 4 Peace Corp Volunteers: Ana, Liz, and Chris & Freddy provided linguistic support as well as cultural enrichment. We learned of their work, ranging from entrepreneurship for high school students, Health Education, Public Health-Nutrition and Gender Equality (alternative role models for male machismo). 

The Rotary Foundation has been improving lives since 1917. Learn about our work and help us celebrate 100 years of doing good in the world.

Rotary Foundation Trustee Chair Ray Klinginsmith asked district governors in training at the International Assembly to lead the celebration of the **Foundation's centennial** year, 2016-17.

"You are the primary contacts between the Foundation and our 34,000 Rotary clubs in the world. The success of the centennial celebration is largely in your hands," said Klinginsmith at a 19 January general session. "Catch the spirit and spread the word about the importance of celebrating our success."

Since the Foundation was established in 1917, it has spent more than \$3 billion on programs and projects to improve the lives of millions worldwide, said Klinginsmith.

The centennial celebration officially kicks off in May at the Rotary Convention in Korea and culminates at the 2017 convention in Atlanta.

District plans for the centennial

Governor-elect Tom James Markos of District 5100 in Oregon, USA, says he is proud to be serving during such a historic year. He plans to promote the centennial not only to his district's members, but also through local media.

"We need the public to be aware of what we've accomplished," says Markos, who has set a district goal of raising \$1 million for the Foundation during the centennial year.

Bill Proctor, incoming governor of District 7080 in Ontario, Canada, believes the centennial year is an opportunity to "refocus and reeducate" members on the importance the Foundation's work.

"We have so many accomplishments to celebrate," said Proctor. "We need to use the momentum of

the celebration to strengthen the Foundation's future."

On 2 December, a terrorist attack killed 14 people and wounded more than 20 others in San Bernardino, California.

Less than two months later, an event nearby focused on peace: the Rotary World Peace Conference. The two-day meeting on 15-16 January brought together experts from around the world to explore ideas and solutions to violence and conflict.

The conference was the first of five <u>Rotary</u> <u>presidential conferences</u> planned for this year.

San Bernardino County official Janice Rutherford, a member of the Rotary Club of Fontana, California, told attendees at the opening general session that the conference couldn't be timelier.

"Now more than ever, we need to come together and create peace and reduce human suffering," said Rutherford, who declared 15 January 2016 Rotary World Peace Day and a Day of Peace for San Bernardino County. "We appreciate your commitment to exploring these options and taking them back to your community and the rest of the world."

More than 150 leaders in the fields of peace, education, business, law, and health care led over 100 breakout sessions and workshops. Topics ranged from how to achieve peace through education to combating human trafficking to the role the media has in eliminating conflict.

Hosted by Rotary districts in California and attended by more than 1,500 people, the conference is an example of how Rotary members are taking peace into their own hands, said RI President K.R. Ravindran.

"We can't wait for governments to build peace, or the United Nations. We can't expect peace to be handed to us on a platter," said Ravindran. "We have to build peace from the bottom, from the foundation of our society. The valuable information you leave with at the end of this conference will aid you in managing conflict in your personal lives, local communities, and potentially around the world."

Actress and humanitarian Sharon Stone urged conference attendees to find tolerance within themselves as a way to develop compassion and understanding for others. Noting that today's technology makes it easy to learn about diverse cultures and beliefs, Stone encouraged Rotary members to embrace differences while learning about others' work.

"The more we understand the darkness of our enemies, the better we know what to do, how to respond and behave," said Stone.

Rotary is inching the world closer to meaningful change, said the Rev. Greg Boyle, executive director of Homeboy Industries, a Los Angelesbased gang intervention and reentry program.

"Rotary decided to dismantle the barriers that exclude people," said Boyle, a bestselling author

and Catholic priest. "You [Rotary members] know that we must stand outside the margins so that the margins can be erased. You stand with the poor, the powerless, and those whose dignity has been denied."

Rotary's most formidable weapon against war, violence, and intolerance is its Rotary Peace Centers program. Through study and field work, peace fellows at the centers become catalysts for peace and conflict resolution in their communities and around the globe.

Dozens of Rotary peace fellows attended the conference to promote the program, learn about other peace initiatives, and help Rotary clubs understand the role they can play.

Peace Fellow Christopher Zambakari, who recently graduated from the University of Queensland in Australia, said the conference is a chance to increase awareness of what others are doing to achieve peace.

"Some people have only a local view toward peace," said Zambakari, whose consulting firm in Phoenix, Arizona, USA, provides advisory services to organizations in Africa and the Middle East. "An event like this, with so many diverse perspectives, can open up connections and different possibilities to how we all can work towards a more peaceful world."

Other speakers included Carrie Hessler-Radelet, director of the U.S. Peace Corps; Judge Daniel Nsereko, special tribunal for Lebanon; Gillian Sorensen, senior adviser at the United Nations Foundation; Steve Killelea, founder and executive chair of the Institute for Economics and Peace; Dan Lungren, former U.S. representative; and Mary Ann Peters, chief executive officer of The Carter Center and former U.S. ambassador to Bangladesh.

sexual assault, domestic violence, gang violence and homicide cases. Ms. Ravitch left briefly for private practice but soon returned to the courtroom as Chief Deputy District Attorney in Mendocino County, before winning election and returning to Sonoma County as District Attorney. During Ms. Ravitch's first term she opened the Family Justice Center, dedicated to providing wraparound services to victims of family violence, sexual assault, elder abuse and child abuse. She also established a dedicated elder protection unit and began an adult truancy program to hold parents accountable. Under Ms. Ravitch's leadership the Human Trafficking Task Force has become a model for other counties due to the collaboration of many agencies to engage in outreach, prevention and prosecution of offenders. Ms. Ravitch serves as an advisory member on many local boards, and is an adjunct professor teaching criminal law to first year students at Empire Law School.

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

Hospitality giants from England, Italy and Spain have established Five Star sites, and there is room for many more. Once the boast of Havana, the Hotel Nacional is still a Grand Dame. Aged, new in the 1930s, this landmark is referred to as a lady with plenty of powder on her face.

Wonderful service, cuisine and welcome, all of the hospitality industry we experienced shined well. Next visit will undoubtedly bring more choices of equal caliber, and likely a "Rotary Meets Here" wheel to greet.





Serving her second (elected) term as Sonoma County's first female District Attorney, Jill Ravitch provided a most enlightening overview of the District Attorney's Office, outlining, "Who We are & What We Do".

Quite revealing was the Department's Mission Statement. It describes foci on providing both citizen safety and preserving the dignity of victims and their families.

Ms. Ravitch summarized the process from citizen complaint/report through review by the DA's Office and determination of action, whether to open a file or dismiss the complaint Over 40 attorneys are employed by the department, as well as Investigators who are Sworn Peace Officers.

With a burden of proof "beyond a reasonable doubt", attorneys last year reviewed 20,396 cases, filed 11,362 of them, 7,228 misdemeanor and 2,021 felony. With a threshold of loss at \$950 between a misdemeanor or felony, the importance of filing an accurate report was emphasized.

Plea Bargaining is a fact of life. DA Ravitch also spoke of her Office' strong use of Restitution as a principle in determining justice for the victims. Age, criminal record, relationship, loss are all factored into a proposed disposition.

Advocates are known as the heart and soul of the District Attorney's Office. Within the Department's 9 Divisions & Programs, Advocates represent the face of outreach to victims, helping them recover dignity, loss and a confidence to move forward. Supporting them are the resources of the Family Justice Center. Mandated with creating a safer community, this agency at 2755 Mendocino Avenue serves victims and survivors of domestic & dating violence, child & elder abuse, sexual assault and

stalking.



Some years ago, I was asked to speak at an Interact club in my home city of Colombo, Sri

Lanka. I have always taken my interactions with Rotary youth very seriously, so I prepared my remarks carefully and put the same effort into my presentation that I would for any other event. After the meeting, I stayed to chat with a few of the Interactors, answering their questions and wishing them well.

I came out of the classroom where we had met into the autumn afternoon. The bright sun was shining directly into my eyes, so I found a bit of shade behind a pillar where I could wait for my ride.

As I stood there, hidden from view, I overheard a group of the very Interactors who had just listened to my speech. Naturally I was curious: What would they be saying? What had they taken away from my presentation? I quickly realized that what they had taken away was not at all what I had intended.

They were not talking about what I had said, the stories I had told, or the lessons I had come to their school to impart. To my astonishment, the major topic of conversation was my tie! I listened with amusement as they chattered about my Western clothes, my background, my business; every aspect of my appearance and behavior was dissected and discussed. Just as they began to speculate about what car I drove, my ride arrived and I stepped out into view. They were perhaps a bit embarrassed, but I just smiled, got into the car, and drove off with a wave.

Whatever they learned from me that day, I learned far more. I learned that the lessons we teach with our examples are far more powerful than those we teach with words. I realized that as a Rotary leader, and a prominent person in the community, I had, for better or worse, become a role model for these young people. Their eyes were on me in a way that I had never before appreciated. If they chose to emulate me, they would model themselves on what they saw, not what I told them.

All of us in Rotary are leaders, in one way or another, in our communities. All of us bear the responsibility that comes with that. Our Rotary values, our Rotary ideals, cannot be left within the confines of our Rotary clubs. They must be carried with us every day. Wherever we are, whoever we are with, whether we are involved in Rotary work – we are always representing Rotary. We must conduct ourselves accordingly: in what we think, what we say, what we do, and how we do it. Our communities, and our children, deserve no less.

When Arch Klumph was president of Rotary in 1916-17, he suggested in a speech at the 1917 Atlanta convention that Rotary should start an endowment fund for the purpose of doing good in the world. It was only a brief reference, but the idea caught on with Rotarians. The Rotary Club of Kansas City, Mo., made the first donation of \$26.50 to the new fund, which was officially named The Rotary Foundation in 1928.

The Rotary Foundation had some activity in the 1930s and 1940s, but it was the memorial gifts to honor Paul Harris after his death in January 1947 that provided the funds to undertake the first major program. That was the award of 18 international scholarships for successful college graduates to spend a year studying abroad as Rotary Fellows. The fellowship program grew to 125 students a year in 1960-61, when I was a Rotary Fellow in Cape Town, South Africa, and it later became the largest privately funded scholarship program with 1,200 students a year.

Rotarians' constant search for the best possible charitable programs led to the introduction of the Matching Grants and Group Study Exchange programs in 1965-66. From there, the Foundation assumed responsibility for the PolioPlus program in the early 1980s, established the Rotary Peace Centers in 2002, and restructured Rotary's Humanitarian Grants Program as a part of the Future Vision plan in 2013.

What has been the result of these efforts? Rotarians have been justifiably proud and supportive of the Foundation for many years, evidenced by their generous contributions of \$123 million to the Annual Fund in 2014-15. In addition, the CNBC television network recently confirmed the success of The Rotary Foundation by naming it one of the "top 10 charities changing the world in 2015." In fact, our Foundation was ranked as the fifth-best charity working to make the world a better place!

What a powerful tribute to Arch Klumph's visionary idea in 1917! We have so much to be proud of in Rotary, including The Rotary Foundation, and so much to celebrate at the Atlanta convention next year. Please plan now to attend the centenary celebration at the convention and show your support for one of the very best charitable foundations in the world!
