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RI President's Address in San Jose



It was all worthwhile — the three hour commute, the endless no-host cocktail hour (with no appetizers) and 600-plus Rotarians forming long lines at the bar. The pay off was Ravi, our current RI President, his wife and his inspiring, yet profoundly human message.

A picturesque Power-Point of RI projects featured the faces of children taking polio vaccine drops and included a count down of 15, 14, 13, etc. minutes until 59, 58, etc. seconds until show time, flashing on the screen between clips. Until it ran into "technical difficulties. Ravi himself appeared in one segment encouraging Rotarians to "Connect with Korea and Touch the World" at the upcoming RI convention in Seoul.

Finally the moment we had been waiting for. Ravi took the stage amidst a standing ovation and shared a compelling mix of warm recollections, humorous stories and the pride of representing an organization committed to the benefit of others throughout the world. We all shuddered upon hearing about a Rotary club in another country (that will remain anonymous) whose sergeant of arms encouraged him NOT to join them, when he appeared at the door, saying dinner was over and he would not understand the speaker's language — taking his official RI card and putting it in his pocket without looking at it. (!) We appreciated the occasion when, being on the road for five



months, racking up many miles, only having had four days with family, he woke one morning, baffled as to where he was and eventually realized that he was in his own apartment.

There is a story told in my Hindu tradition of two sages, Shaunaka and Abhipratari. They were worshippers of Prana, the wind god. One day, the two men were about to sit down to lunch when a poor student knocked on their door, asking for food.

"No, boy, do not bother us at this hour," was the reply. The student was surprised but very hungry, so he persisted.

"Tell me, honored sirs, which deity do you worship?"

"Prana, the wind god," they answered impatiently.

"Do you not know that the world begins and ends with wind, and that wind pervades the entire universe?"

The two sages were by now very irritated by their impertinent guest. "Of course we know it!" they replied.

"Well, then," continued the student, "if Prana pervades the universe, then he pervades me also, since I am but part of the universe. He is also in this hungry body, which stands before you begging for a bite to eat! And so in denying food to me, you deny it to the very deity whom you say you serve."

The sages realized the student spoke the truth and invited him to enter and share their meal. For they understood, at that moment, that by opening the door to one who sought their help, they were not only serving that individual – but reaching toward a larger goal.

Our experience of Rotary is, for the most part, based in our own communities. We meet every week in our clubs, in the same places, with the same familiar friends. While almost all of us are involved in some way or other in international service, the Rotary we see and share from day to day feels very local. It can be easy to lose sight of the larger picture – of what our service truly means.

Every impact you have as a Rotarian, individually and through your club, is multiplied by the power of our numbers. When you feed one person who is hungry, when you educate one person who is illiterate, when you protect one child from disease, the impact may seem small. It is anything but. For it is only through the power of numbers, through




the power of our individual actions and gifts, that we can have the impact we seek: to truly *Be a Gift to the World*.

"Cowboy Logic," as sung by Michael Martin Murphey, has been one of my favorite songs for many years because of its happy music and thoughtful lyrics. It has relevance to Rotary because of its emphasis on honesty and hard work, but I did not fully appreciate its application to our organization until I read *Cowboy Ethics* by Jim Owen.

Jim was aware that the unwritten Code of the West was a powerful and positive force shaping the ethical behavior of cowboys in the Western states of the USA, and he distilled the code into 10 guiding principles. They are succinctly and aptly stated, and they align closely with The Four-Way Test, one of the hallmarks of Rotary.

Three of the principles are particularly applicable to the PolioPlus program. In the 30 years since the program was launched, Rotarians have remained steadfastly committed to the goal of polio eradication, even though it has taken much longer and been more expensive than anyone originally imagined. But we stuck with it, and now the goal of ending polio is clearly in sight. Along the way, we have fulfilled three of the principles of the Code of the West: "Do what has to be done," "When you make a promise, keep it," and "Always finish what you start"! Two other principles have special relevance for The Rotary Foundation as a whole: "Take pride in your work" and "Ride for the brand." Through their support of Foundation programs, from the first ambassadorial scholarships in 1948 to newer initiatives such as the Rotary Peace Centers and the Future Vision plan, Rotarians have truly made the world a better place. And because Rotarians have "ridden for the brand" through their creative work and generous contributions, these programs have been highly successful, enhancing members' ability to take pride in their work. Therefore, I do not need to ask Rotarians for their loyalty to the Foundation. Instead, I want to thank them for their amazing loyalty!

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

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

News from *The Rotarian* Meet our Polio Partners

From the September 2015 issue of The Rotarian Eradicating polio is a complex job. Since 1988, we've collaborated with the World Health Organization, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and UNICEF to tackle the disease through our Global Polio Eradication Initiative. Here's how our roles break down.

The Strategist: WHO

The World Health Organization (WHO) coordinates the management and administration of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative and provides technical and operational support to ministries of health in countries around the world. WHO is responsible for monitoring our progress and strategic planning.

The Virus Hunter: CDC

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) deploys epidemiologists, public health experts, and scientists to investigate outbreaks of polio, identify the strain of poliovirus involved, and pinpoint its geographic origin.

The Immunizer: UNICEF

UNICEF buys polio vaccine and manages its distribution. The agency spreads the word about the benefits of vaccination to gain community acceptance – a process known as social mobilization. On the ground, field workers immunize children with the help of local health workers and volunteers such as Rotarians.

The Advocate: Rotary

Rotary uses its members' business acumen and passion for volunteerism to build awareness, fundraise, and encourage national governments to donate to and otherwise support the polio eradication effort. More than one million Rotary members have volunteered their time and personal resources to help end polio.

Our other partners

WHO, CDC, UNICEF, and Rotary spearheaded the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, but many other partners help us work toward our vision of a poliofree world.

Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation: The Gates Foundation is a core partner of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. It is the largest private funding source of the GPEI, contributing over \$1.9 billion to the fight against polio. The Gates Foundation will match all donations to Rotary for polio two to one, up to \$35 million per year, through 2018.

National governments: Governments are the largest donors to the polio eradication effort. Without the financial support of governments worldwide, and especially political support in polioendemic and at-risk countries, we could not administer the polio vaccine.

Local health workers: Local health workers often risk their lives to vaccinate children. For example, women in Pakistan receive training to go door to door, speaking to mothers about the benefits of the vaccine. They address fears and help bring the vaccine into remote communities.

Gavi: Gavi is an international vaccine alliance that brings vaccines to some of the world's poorest countries. It is working with the GPEI to introduce at least one dose of the injectable inactivated polio vaccine into the routine immunization schedule. The Rotarian

Peter Banks, The Paris Climate Accord

The Paris Climate Accord, New Observational Data, Predictions, and Ideology vs. Reality

The signing of the Paris Climate accord is a major political achievement. However, the agreed-upon carbon gas controls are insufficient to constrain the global average temperature rise to less than 2C (3.6F). Scientists at the December American Geophysical Union meeting in San Francisco say that even this limit will result in major environmental changes in all regions of Earth, affecting life-support and economic systems in many negative ways. With respect to the Arctic, major changes are irreversibly underway: reduction of ocean ice, rapid now frequent and very disruptive to Arctic life and biota and huge flows of tropical air in the Arctic. These, in turn, lead to massive, sustained flows of very cold air into subpolar regions, including northern Europe and North American. Earth is now warming faster than at any time in its history.and many secondary effects are becoming more visible. Sea level predictions now give more rapid melting of the Greenland and Antarctic icepacks with higher ocean levels now predicted sooner than previously estimated. Many subsidiary studies are now underway to determine impacts upon food, fresh water, desertification, spread of disease and enhancement of storm damage. Yet, in spite of this, the U.S. political right and major global energy producers continue to deny the reality of the changes in climate being a result of the huge volumes of carbon dioxide and methane released from human activities into



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Earth's atmosphere.

Professor **Peter Banks**, Sunrise Scientist member, presented statistics, facts, needs and goals of the 2016 Paris Climate Accord Conference – the 21st meeting of 195 nations since 1880 -- the start of the industrial Revolution. The specific goal this year is: To achieve a legally binding and united agreement on climate with the aim of keeping global warming below two degrees centigrade. Peter reports that the temperature has already risen by 1-1/2 degrees centigrade since 1880.

Twenty billion tons of polluting material has already been put into the atmosphere. Europe is doing well in cutting back on emissions. South America follows. However, the rest of the world is conducting "business as usual." India is attempting to catch up to China in industrialization. China is serious about addressing this issue and sent more scientists to the conference than any other nation in the world.

Rising sea levels, caused by rapidly melting polar ice caps, are creating rivers under the ice that will have a significant impact on the entire globe. This phenomenon, "Hypsographic Demography" is the study of how altitude affects human populations. One thousand people per kilometer of coastline, in South East Asia, will be affected by rising water. Eight hundred million will be displaced by the rise of just one meter. The Rotary Foundation has been improving lives since 1917. Learn about our work and help us celebrate 100 years of doing good in the world.

Rotary Foundation Trustee Chair Ray Klinginsmith asked district governors in training at the International Assembly to lead the celebration of the <u>Foundation's centennial</u> year, 2016-17.

"You are the primary contacts between the Foundation and our 34,000 Rotary clubs in the world. The success of the centennial celebration is largely in your hands," said Klinginsmith at a 19 January general session. "Catch the spirit and spread the word about the importance of celebrating our success."

Since the Foundation was established in 1917, it has spent more than \$3 billion on programs and projects to improve the lives of millions worldwide, said Klinginsmith.

The centennial celebration officially kicks off in May at the Rotary Convention in Korea and culminates at the 2017 convention in Atlanta.

DISTRICT PLANS FOR THE CENTENNIAL

Governor-elect Tom James Markos of District 5100 in Oregon, USA, says he is proud to be serving during such a historic year. He plans to promote the centennial not only to his district's members, but also through local media.

"We need the public to be aware of what we've accomplished," says Markos, who has set a district goal of raising \$1 million for the Foundation during the centennial year.

Bill Proctor, incoming governor of District 7080 in Ontario, Canada, believes the centennial year is an opportunity to "refocus and reeducate" members on the importance the Foundation's work. "We have so many accomplishments to celebrate," said Proctor. "We need to use the momentum of the celebration to strengthen the Foundation's future."
