It's a Thursday afternoon and the kitchen at The Community Church of Sebastopol is bursting with music and activity. At the large prep table, two young women are talking while they prepare butternut squash, red peppers and onions for vegetarian enchiladas. A young man is sauting onions and garlic for a minestrone soup while two of his friends mix together the ingredients for turkey loaf. At the end of the afternoon, eight families, each dealing with a serious health challenge, will be the welcome recipients of a bounty of organic meals.

The students are part of an innovative project in West Sonoma County about an hour north of San Francisco. The project addresses a range of needs for the students while providing a valuable service for local families facing cancer and other health challenges. Students learn or strengthen cooking skills, deepen their relationship with fresh foods, have an opportunity to experience food as a fundamental support to their bodies, and discover their power to make a difference in the world. They can use their participation to fulfill community service requirements and, for culinary arts students, to gain work experience in a non-school kitchen.

Chris Coursey, columnist for the Santa Rosa Press Democrat and spokesperson for SMART. The election of November 2006 brought an overwhelming majority of voters in Sonoma and Marin counties out to the polls in support of Measaure R, the SMART (Sonoma Marin Area Rail Transit) Rail and Trail, which would run state-of-the-art commuter trains up and down the existing 70 miles of tracks from Cloverdale to Larkspur with an adjacent bicycle and pedestrian path. With over a year to go until the next big election, the SMART Board has confirmed that it will, in fact, be placing SMART on the ballot again in 2008. This means that voters in will have another chance to bring a new, desperately needed source of transportation to the North Bay region, providing commuters an alternative to the notoriously congested Highway 101, and strengthening our local communities.

Kid Street Learning Center - Linda Conklin



"Kid Street Theatre is about realizing our similarities as human beings, rather than focusing on our differences, even if pain is what binds us. It is through acceptance of each other, and ourselves, that we are truly set free." --Linda Conklin

Kid Street Theatre (KST) was developed to provide a holistic approach to helping children without homes and other at-risk youth, break the cycle of self-depreciation and poverty. The lives of children who are homeless are riddled with poverty, chaos and trauma. The vast majority of services offered to the homeless are not directed toward the support of these children's very specific emotional, social and educational needs. KST brings about the opportunity to develop trust from within the child to empower him/her to believe that they are special in their own way, that their present situation is a circumstance beyond their control, not a life style of their choosing.

Mathematics can show that as the population continues to increase exponentially so do the problems of homeless children and youth-at-risk. At KST we serve the local middle schools, work with the family support center (homeless shelter), Sonoma State University (our interns come from there), Innovative Housing (connecting folks with places to live), the Church of Religious Science (supports us with volunteers), Hal Musco (donated building), the Volunteer Center and Railroad Square Merchants Association. KST applies for grants through private foundations and philanthropic organizations. We also depend on personal contributions of time, money and materials from hundreds of people who believe in the purpose and philosophy of Kid Street Theatre. And of course, we generate funds through our theatrical productions which involve children, staff and volunteers. It is our hope that you will join with the efforts of KST and our community, and show financial support to assist in healing

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this epidemic by supporting the children in their own hard work.

We provide art, dance, music, journal writing, martial arts, costuming, pottery, set building, drumming, computer and video activities. Through the vehicle of theatre we provide a safe environment to teach teamwork, cooperation, communication skills, conflict management and most importantly, to build self-esteem. The program is open to all children, regardless of socio-economic background. Because a child has an address does not guarantee him/her a healthy home environment, and our children develop an appreciation for both sets of circumstances immediately and begin appreciating the opportunities each lifestyle brings with it. We also provide services for learning disabled, tutoring services, support for children of divorce, foster and group home children, as well as providing meaningful opportunities for retired professionals and non-professionals.

The relationship that develops between the children, volunteers and staff provides an environment where these children can open up and try new experiences without concern for success or failure. The emphasis is on "doing" not "doing it right." Success is experienced by all--volunteers and children alike.

KST provides a model for all communities who are concerned about the deterioration of the healthy "childhood" and the increase in crime involving children and teens. Presently, San Francisco, Cloverdale, Kauai, and San Rafael have expressed interest in opening Kid Street Theatres. San Francisco will open its doors soon. However, even with all this enthusiasm and support, we cannot continue to provide services without the proper funding. Our program in Santa Rosa is run by 2 paid staff, and over 100 volunteers from the community.

KST has recently been acknowledged by the NEA as a model project for ARTS IN EDUCATION. We are recognized in the community by its senators, Congress people, Mayor, Supervisors, University Professors and local school Superintendents.

Dental and Eye Care Project by Dave Lorenzen



Thoughts from this years Dental and Eye Care mission to Nicaragua

The SR Sunrise Rotary Dental and Eye Teams left SFO about 1230am on February 2. We arrived in Managua about 940am. Our plans were immediately

altered when the local customs officials decided to keep our eye glasses and send them to the warehouse for proper processing. The customs official told Rafael our guide that the law changed within the last week. Rafael convinced them to give him an hour to meet with the person in charge of customs at the warehouse. Rafael convinced them to release our glasses that afternoon in exchange for a "symbolic customs tax and overtime wages for the workers". With glasses in hand we boarded our two charter 12-seat Cessna single-prop planes that took us from Managua to San Carlos on the southeast corner of Lake Nicaragua. We then traveled 2 hours down the San Juan River to our home base, called Sabalos Lodge. For the next four days we took boats to the village of Sabalos then boarded 2 vans and 2 trucks for the hour plus each way commute to the village of Buena Vista. The distance traveled each way was subject to much debate, but likely around 10-15 miles. The vans had seen better days. One van had no shocks in the rear as evidenced by the sound of metal scraping on metal thru every bump and rut. During our daily trek we had vehicles stuck in the mud and many flat tires. The final commute back to Sabalos from Buena Vista found the worst van getting stuck in the mud, then two flat tires. It was an adventure.

Both teams worked in the community center building at Buena Vista. The Rotary toilets that were installed were about 150 yards away at the local medical clinic. There was no running water (none in the entire village), so flushing required taking a bucket of water into the bathroom with you (we'll assume the reader can figure out what we did with the bucket). The community center had occasional power, poor lighting and even worse ventilation. The dental team set up an operatory in one small room with exams taking place on the nearby stage. Dr Davis did the exams and x-rays. Drs Waggener, Lehman and Sellman did extractions. Starting the end of day 3 and into day 4, Dr Sellman did fillings as well. Steve Amend with assistance from Steve Herron cleaned the dental tools. Ezbon managed the equipment and the operations. Early on it was determined that the compressor was inadequate. Our contact/guide Rafael was able to get another larger compressor by day 3. The dental team worked very hard under adverse conditions, but excelled and were a great example of Rotarians caring for their fellow man. They were also ably assisted by four Peace Corp

volunteers (Cody, Gemma, Ashley and Edward) along with Walter Murillo (friend of the Amends). The dental team saw approximately 80 patients, did over 240 extractions and about 30 fillings. There were patients that had as many extractions as 9, 13 and 14.

The eye care team worked in the same community center, seeing 605 patients during the four days. Because of the need for both distance and up close corrections we gave out close to 700 pair of eyeglasses and over 200 pair of sunglasses. We had a very good system down and could have seen at least 1,200 patients had the village been larger. We also identified another 30+ patients with severe cataracts that would benefit from surgery. The eye care team consisted of Elise Jones-Castro doing exams with the autorefractor, John Jones examining for cataracts and pterigiums and concluding on prescriptions, fitting done by Vicki Lockner, Steve Zwick, Steve Herron, Daniel Castro, and Patricia Killeen. We were also assisted by lodge personnel including Rafael, Dena, Michelle, Abraham and Issac. Mary Evitt from San Juan Rio Relief also accompanied us and provided support.

John Jones

This experience was loaded with feelings. The staggering poverty and its effects cannot be appreciated until you see it. Mindless boredom, borderline starvation, untreated illness, poverty, overwork for pennies and everything else is a polar opposite to the life that we live here. They have no hope for anything more than what they live day by day. Any hopes that they have for a better life are stifled from birth. In spite of all this, somehow they survive.

The Sabalos Lodge is considered a "Eco Lodge" in the sense of their commitment to the environment and energy conservation. Electricity was provided by solar panels with storage batteries and gas fired generators when the batteries became low. We knew when it was time for bed because the gas allotted for the generator became low and the lights flickered indicating it was time to head to our rooms. Each room had showers with cool water that was very invigorating or soothing depending when you showered, in the am or after our day in Buena Vista. Each bed had mosquito netting that

provided a sense of protection from the bugs. Mosquitoes were not a problem, but this part of the world had several large species of spiders so having a net all around you was comforting.

The accommodations were rustic, but charming. They were wooden plank buildings with battens covering the seams with palm thatched roofs over sheet metal panels. The room I was assigned (along with Ezbon, Rich Sellman and Walter Murillo) had several windows without screens and a door leading to a deck/porch that was perched high above the bank of the Rio San Juan. We had beautiful views of the river, an island in the river and the rain forest on the other side of the river. Each early morning a light mist hung over the river until the sun was high enough to disperse it. One of the trees on the island was home to 20-25 white herons who roosted there each night and provided a nice contrast between the green trees/ forests and their white feathers. When it became light in the morning we were greeted by many song birds and the sounds of the local troop of Howler Monkeys. They make an incredible sound that you would think was made by a 800 lb demon of some sort.

The meals we had were simple, but very good. All meals had the Nicaraguan staple of rice and red beans. In the morning it was supplemented with scrambled eggs, pancakes with cinnamon flavored syrup, fresh fruit and tropical juice. Lunch usually had some chicken, pork or beef to go with the rice and beans. The chicken and pork were good, the beef was tasty, but incredibly tough. We also had fried plantain chips with our lunches and local bananas. Dinner had spiced or flavored beef, pork or chicken and some salad greens. One night we had local bass from the river prepared Nicaraguan style. Which is deep fried with some tomato based sauce. We enjoyed cold beer upon our arrival back to the lodge and Mary Evitt brought in some Chilean and Argentinean wine to enjoy with dinner.

The Nicaraguan climate is described as dry tropical which means you have 4-5 dry months and 7-8 very wet months. I head different figures about the annual rain in that area but most estimates put the rain fall total over 200 inches each year. Even in the dry season, this area gets occasional rain showers so everything was green. Most Nicaraguans in the Buena Vista area are farmers raising corn, beans, cattle, goats, pigs chickens, bananas, papaya, cantaloupes and watermelons.. No one looked to be suffering from malnutrition and the dentist reported how tough these people were. On the drive back to lodge each late afternoon and early evening we observed kids and young adults playing baseball and soccer in the pastures. Most people observed our comings and goings without much fanfare, but we did get lots of looks and people waving at us.

Hi Everyone,

There are so many things happening on so many fronts these days that I thought it might make sense to take a few minutes to bring all of us up to date on various bits of exciting news. . .

I had an opportunity to speak at the January meeting of the Sunrise Rotary Club of Santa Rosa. This club has given us a donation and beginning in March their members will be doing all of our deliveries the first Thursday of each month. The Rotarians are deeply involved in service work and I felt honored to be able to share what we are doing with them.

Several wonderful things have already come from that meeting: Nancy Aita has offered to grow vegetables and herbs for us at her Sebastopol home. Nathan is helping to coordinate this and the contributions of other home and professional farmers.

Nancy has also contacted the owners of Fircrest Market on our behalf -- following on the heels of Jeff Edelheit's conversation with them -- and Mark and Dave will be providing us with \$1,000 worth of food this year. Thanks to Nancy, Jeff and especially to Mark & Dave.

Mountain Rose Herbs in Oregon called today to let me know that we will be on their donation list for the next three months (we can reapply after that). They will send us donations of any herbs, seaweeds or mushrooms that we might be able to use. Traditional Medicinal Tea Company has also offered herbal teas to us as well as their Throat Coat syrup and pastilles -- herbal lozenges that include echinacea and other immune support herbs.

Gourmet Mushrooms has also joined our list of sponsors. David Laws has agreed to supply us with 5 - 6 pounds of fresh mushrooms each week as well as medicinal mushroom powders.

Andy's Market has donated \$1,000 this year (last year they provided the \$5,000 that

helped us get on our feed) and they are also allowing us to order from United Foods, a natural foods wholesaler, at their wholesale price. I've place the first order through them and we now have many organic grains, organic nuts, and other items at a much reduced price.

This past Monday we received our first produce donation from the Sebastopol Whole Foods Store. Laura Litwin, who is in charge of community relations there, is working with us on this donated food program. We are receiving only organic fruits and vegetables, and occasionally other organic products, each Monday and Tuesday morning. This week we received a whole case of organic artichokes, about ten pounds of red potatoes, and lots of pears, oranges and apples. Several weeks ago we heard that Susan Reiheld, a client of ours, had passed away after a long battle with cancer. Susan's family has let me know that they are asking friends and associates of Susan's to send donations to The Ceres Project in her memory. Susan's daughter Sophie told me that the love and support Susan and Rich felt from us made an enormous difference to them over the past eight months. Jo-Ellen DiNicola and Julie Stuffelbeam piloted our first supplemental cooking day earlier this month. A group of adult volunteers gathered at Jo-Ellen's house and made about 5 gallons of our Immune Broth, several batches of sauerkraut and kim chee, an herbal spice blend and organic "truffles" with tahini, ground almonds, coconut, honey and a number of different immune supporting herbs. The day was so successful that we will be repeating it the first Monday of each month. This is a great opportunity for adults who want to cook to contribute.

Monday, February 25th, we will pilot our first client cooking class, again at Jo-Ellen's wonderful house in West Sebastopol. We'll be showing them how to make delicious nutrient dense meals easily -- and demystifying cooking with millet, quinoa, dark leafy greens, seaweeds and shiitake mushrooms! We'll cook together, eat lunch, and send everyone home with leftovers.

Last but not least, I want to thank all the organizers, poets and volunteers who participated in Rumi's Caravan on February 2nd. This is a beautiful evening of poetry in the "ecstatic" tradition, Persion food and music -- with all the proceeds given back to community organizations. We were blessed to be a recipient this year. . . and the organizers were so impressed with our volunteers -- especially the four teens (Mathilde, Ursul, Sarah and Anna) that they ended up giving us a larger share of the funds than they had planned. Thanks to all of you who showed up to help with your hearts open and your hands willing!

Nathan of First Light Farm, and Jo-Ellen, would both love to have volunteer farming help. This is a great opportunity to learn a bit about growing things from two experts, and support our clients with fresh organic foods that are grown with love and intention. Both Nathan and Jo will have regular weekly volunteer times soon and we'll make sure to get the word out.

Ok, I think that's it. The year has gotten off to a great start. I so look forward to working with each of you as we continue to grow this extraordinary community of love, and to provide ways for all of us to live from our hearts.

The community center had occasional power, poor lighting and even worse ventilation. The dental team set up an operatory in one small room with exams taking place on the nearby stage. Dr Davis did the exams and x-rays. Drs Waggener, Lehman and Sellman did extractions. Starting the end of day 3 and into day 4, Dr Sellman did fillings as well. Steve Amend with assistance from Steve Herron cleaned the dental tools. Ezbon managed the equipment and the operations. Early on it was determined that the compress! or was inadequate. Our contact/guide Rafael was able to get another larger compressor by day 3. The dental team worked very hard under adverse conditions, but excelled and were a great example of Rotarians caring for their fellow man. They were also ably assisted by four Peace Corp volunteers (Cody, Gemma, Ashley and Edward) along with Walter Murillo (friend of the Amends). The dental team saw approximately 80 patients, did over 240 extractions and about 30 fillings. There were patients that had as many extractions as 9, 13 and 14.

The eye care team worked in the same community center, seeing 605 patients during the four days. Because of the need for both distance and up close corrections we gave out close to 700 pair of eyeglasses and over 200 pair of sunglasses. We had a very good system down and could have seen at least 1,200 patients had the village been larger. We also identified another 30+ patients with severe cataracts that would benefit from surgery. The eye care team consisted of Elise Jones-Castro doing exams with the autorefractor, John Jones examining for cataracts and pterigiums and concluding on prescriptions, fitting done by Vicki Lockner, Steve Zwick, Steve Herron, Daniel Castro, and Patricia Killeen. We were also assisted by lodge personnel including Rafael, Dena, Michelle, Abraham and Issac. Mary Evitt from San Juan Rio Relief also accompanied us and provided support.

John Jones

This experience was loaded with feelings. The staggering poverty and its effects cannot be appreciated until you see it. Mindless boredom, borderline starvation, untreated illness, poverty, overwork for pennies and everything else is a polar opposite to the life that we live here. They have no hope for anything more than what they live day by day. Any hopes that they have for a better life are stifled from birth. In spite of all this, somehow they survive.

The Sabalos Lodge is considered a "Eco Lodge" in the sense of their commitment to the environment and energy conservation. Electricity was provided by solar panels with storage batteries and gas fired generators when the batteries became low. We knew when it was time for bed because the gas allotted for the generator became low and the lights flickered indicating it was time to head to our rooms. Each room had showers with cool water that was very invigorating or soothing depending when you showered, in the am or after our day in Buena Vista. Each bed had mosquito netting that provided a sense of protection from the bugs. Mosquitoes were not a problem, but this part of the world had several large species of spiders so having a net all around you was comforting.

The accommodations were rustic, but charming. They were wooden plank buildings with battens covering the seams with palm thatched roofs over sheet metal panels. The room I was assigned (along with Ezbon, Rich Sellman and Walter Murillo) had several windows without screens and a door leading to a deck/porch that was perched high above the bank of the Rio San Juan. We had beautiful views of the river, an island in the river and the rain forest on the other side of the river. Each early morning a light mist hung over the river until the sun was high enough to disperse it. One of the trees on the island was home to 20-25 white herons who roosted there each night and provided a nice contrast between the green trees/ forests and their white feathers. When it became light in the morning we were greeted by many song birds and the sounds of the local troop of Howler Monkeys. They make an incredible sound that you would think was made by a 800 ! Ib demon of some sort.

The meals we had were simple, but very good. All meals had the Nicaraguan staple of rice and red beans. In the morning it was supplemented with scrambled eggs, pancakes with cinnamon flavored syrup, fresh fruit and tropical juice. Lunch usually had some chicken, pork or beef to go with the rice and beans. The chicken and pork were good, the beef was tasty, but incredibly tough. We also had fried plantain chips with our lunches and local bananas. Dinner had spiced or flavored beef, pork or chicken and some salad greens. One night we had local bass from the river prepared Nicaraguan style. Which is deep fried with some tomato based sauce. We enjoyed cold beer upon our arrival back to the lodge and Mary Evitt brought in some Chilean and Argentinean wine to enjoy with dinner.

The Nicaraguan climate is described as dry tropical which means you have 4-5 dry months and 7-8 very wet months. I head different figures about the annual rain in that area but most estimates put the rain fall total over 200 inches each year. Even in the dry season, this area gets occasional rain showers so everything was green. Most Nicaraguans in the Buena Vista area are farmers raising corn, beans, cattle, goats, pigs chickens, bananas, papaya, cantaloupes and watermelons.. No one looked to be suffering from malnutrition and the dentist reported how tough these people were. On the drive back to lodge each late afternoon and early evening we observed kids and young adults playing baseball and soccer in the pastures. Most people observed our comings and goings without much fanfare, but we did get lots of looks and people waving at us.

The world's first service club, the Rotary Club of Chicago, was formed on 23 February 1905 by Paul P. Harris, an attorney who wished to capture in a professional club the same friendly spirit he had felt in the small towns of his youth. The Rotary name derived from the early practice of rotating meetings among members' offices.

Rotary's popularity spread, and within a decade, clubs were chartered from San Francisco to New York to Winnipeg, Canada. By 1921, Rotary clubs had been formed on six continents. The organization adopted the Rotary International name a year later.

As Rotary grew, its mission expanded beyond serving club members' professional and social interests. Rotarians began pooling their resources and contributing their talents to help serve communities in need. The organization's dedication to this ideal is best expressed in its motto: Service Above Self.

By 1925, Rotary had grown to 200 clubs with more than 20,000 members. The organization's distinguished reputation attracted presidents, prime ministers, and a host of other luminaries to its ranks - among them author Thomas Mann, diplomat Carlos P. Romulo, humanitarian Albert Schweitzer, and composer Jean Sibelius.

Gravenstein Apple Preservation Project -Paula Shatkin



Paula Shatkin, who along with her "Apple Core" is leading the Gravenstein Apple Preservation Project.

Suburban development and the popularity of wine production have reduced the number of apple orchards in SonomaCounty today. Some of the apple orchards grow on land that has been property of apple farming families for generations while others are operated by tenant farmers. These farmers rely on the support of landowners who could sell their land for grape production but have decided that the area's apple tradition is more important than personal financial gain. Only a dozen commercial growers and two commercial processors remain in SonomaCounty. Production in SonomaCounty is now only a tiny fraction of its historic high levels, and continues to diminish as small farmers struggle to market their heirloom fruit.

The Presidium works to promote and protect farmers who nurture their apples from tree to table. Most of the Sebastopol growers farm land that has been in apple production for over a century. Their agricultural traditions yield sweet-tart, crisp, juicy and delicious Gravenstein apples.

Our donation of \$860 will fund two kids to be able to attend.

\$350 for "Adopt-A-Village"

Requested by DG Ken, we are funding \$5 per member to the District 5130 Adopt-A-Village project.

From Rotary's Press Release Center -Kenyan peace fellow aspires to protect human security

Joseph Hongo of Kenya has long envisioned "a new world order shaped not by military and political might but tolerance and mutual understanding, where issues of human security and development take center stage."

He says his Rotary World Peace Fellowship to study at the University of Queensland in Australia, beginning in February 2009, echoes that ideal. Moreover, he believes the fellowship, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Mombasa, Kenya, and District 9200 in East Africa, will help him achieve his career goal: "to play a lead role in bridging the policy gap between community and government, policymakers, and other actors in the promotion of human security and economic development."

Hongo's "modest background," as he calls it, has driven him to work hard. Though he is the ninth of 10 children, seven of his siblings died before he was born, and he suffered the loss of his father, a fisherman, and his mother at an early age.

"I regarded myself a child of the community," he says, referring to his upbringing by different relatives. "[They] provided me with the opportunity to live in various parts of the country," instilling an appreciation of other languages and cultures.

In 2002, Hongo graduated with honors from KenyattaUniversity. The next year, as an intern with Kenya's National Assembly, he traveled to remote parts of the country, meeting with citizens and assessing the implementation of the nation's free primary education policy. He also helped analyze conflicts in rural communities and develop appropriate policies and mitigation measures.

As a program assistant with the Great Lakes Parliamentary Forum on Peace since 2004, Hongo has participated in several peacebuilding initiatives, he says, including interethnic conflict in Rwanda and Burundi, resource-based conflict in the Democratic Republic of the Congo , the small-arms problem in northern Kenya and southern Sudan, and displacement and refugee problems in northern Uganda, Kenya, Zambia, and Tanzania. His objective in each case has been to link the affected communities with policymakers to lessen conflict. "One of my most memorable experiences was observing the peace negotiation between the government of Uganda and Lord's Resistance Army rebels in Juba, southern Sudan, in 2006," he says. "I held talks with the rebels, where I implored them to abandon war and realize the value of human security."

In February, Hongo traveled to assess the situation in Kenya's north Rift Valley, which was plagued by violence after the national elections in December.

Though many are hoping for a positive outcome from the mediation process led by former United Nations Secretary-General Kofi Annan, "Kenyans must take individual responsibility in promoting that peace and justice they are calling for," he says. "It may sometimes involve the sacrifice of certain interests, but eventually all Kenyans will enjoy the fruits of their hard work for generations to come."

From Rotary's Press Release Center -Denver clubs, Open World host Russian health delegation



A delegation of 30 ardent Russian doctors and

health care professionals were in Denver, Colorado, USA, on 12-21

April participating in the Open World Program to examine health fairs with the expectation of implementing the same type of exhibitions back home.

The Rotary Club of Denver and five other clubs from District 5450 (Colorado, USA) hosted the delegates, in partnership with 9Health Fair, Colorado's largest volunteer-driven nonprofit health fair program, during a weeklong crash course on reviving Russia's fallen health care system. The Denver Rotary clubs used a grant awarded by the OpenWorldLeadershipCenter to administer the week's program.

Delegates observed several 9Health fairs in and around Denver. The fairs are volunteer-driven and offer free and low-cost health screenings and education. While Russia offers high-quality health care, there is little of it to go around. Health fairs can bring a sustainable and effective alternative to bridge the health care gap in struggling communities.

"The strategic and global effort will assist in addressing a major need in Russia to restore their failing health care system," says Irina Bulkley-Hopkins, director of the Denver Rotary club and Open World host coordinator. "Through Open World, Rotary International has always facilitated a better understanding between Russia and the U.S."

Established by the U.S. Congress in 1999, the Open World Leadership Center at the Library of Congress is intended to enhance cooperation between United States and the countries of Eurasia and the Baltic States. To achieve this, Open World develops a network of leaders who travel to the U.S. to experience and learn about democracy, accountable government, and a free-maket system.

"More than a hundred successful health fairs were already conducted in Russia over the last few years by Rotarians, and they are determined to continue building on this success," says Grant Wilkins, past RI director and a Denver club member. The delegates, selected with the help of Rotarians in Russia, met with national, state, and city leaders throughout the week, exchanging information and ideas about the two countries' health care systems.

U.S. Ambassador John O'Keefe, who is the executive director of Open World, toured the health fairs last Thursday and recognized Rotary's effort.

"I want to give all the Rotarians the entire [Open World] organization's appreciation for making this program possible," said O'Keefe during a luncheon at the Denver Athletic Club. "The power of Rotary is showing its positive influence in Russia."

James Goddard, president and CEO of 9Health Fair and a Denver Rotarian, says his organization's health fairs and Rotary's volunteerism provide an excellent model for the Russian delegates to work from and apply. "Hopefully, the delegates have gained a perspective on the variety of types of fairs that could occur and some of the logistics it takes to put on a fair. Rotary can be the catalyst to help get health fairs going in Russia for many, many years to come."

S.O.S Update with Mark Doolittle

Sometimes, no matter what you do, trouble seems to follow -especially when you are a 12-year-old boy with a tough-guy attitude, a mixed-up family and a history of schoolyard squabbles.

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For Skyler Langston, ``staying straight'' is practically a full-time job, requiring discipline, stamina and guts. Almost every day, he tells himself to be ``good'' and to avoid provocation. Still, problems come.

Usually, it's a small incident, a quarrel with friends at school or a disagreement with siblings. Other times, the trouble gets physical - involving fists, knees, feet and fingernails. In the past few years, he has been suspended from school more than 17 times, run away from his father's house, and suffered many cuts and bruises, his mother and school counselor said. Twice, his troubles have involved the law.

His mother and stepfather tried to talk to him, but nothing reached him or helped them understand the complicated emotions teeming beneath his blond, blue-eyed exterior.

Nothing until last year, when he was called into the HelenLehmanElementary School office to meet Jeannie Dulberg. A counselor in the Support Our Students program, Dulberg introduced herself to Skyler and over a period of months, the two became friends.

``She makes me more confident to stay good," Skyler said, of his weekly meetings with Dulberg. ``She makes me want to do it, and now I don't feel like a wuss when I walk away from a fight." Dulberg is one of an army of 24 counselors in the SOS program who believe that time, attention and a one-on-one relationship with an adult friend will help keep troubled children from ditching classes, joining gangs, using drugs and getting in other kinds of adult trouble.

Every week, she and Skyler talk about school, pressure, family or whatever comes up. The key is not what he says, but that he has learned to communicate and to articulate his fears, Dulberg said.

``This is a life skill," she said. ``He is learning to open up and to express."

Begun as a collaborative effort by Santa Rosa's four Rotary Clubs in 1991, the program originally targeted truancy and tried to link merchants, police and schools. By 1994, the focus had switched to counseling and the program had representatives in seven schools. Today, it operates out of 21 schools and serves more than 400 students.

Part of the reason for its success is the innovative and highly logical



method it uses to recruit counselors. Instead of scrambling in the community, the program taps a local resource: the counseling department at SonomaStateUniversity.

The idea came about when members of the Rotary clubs contacted **Mark** Doolitte, a counseling professor, and asked if he and his students could help. **Doolittle** has helped transform the program, staffing it with graduate students and those who hold advanced degrees, and pushing for more community and family involvement. As the program's reputation grew, so did its budget, increasing from about \$10,000 in 1994 to more than \$120,000 in 1996. While in the first two years, it was mainly funded by the Rotary Clubs. Most of the support now comes from Santa Rosa and RinconValleySchools, SonomaStateUniversity and the Finley Foundation.

Two Rotary clubs in Petaluma have begun a similar program and clubs in Windsor and Healdburg are considering starting their own, **Doolittle** said.

More than just helping students stay in classes, the program tries to reach into their homes, to talk to willing families and to help bring parents and students closer together.

``Skyler went through so much after I left," said Inga Scott, Skyler's mother, who left her husband three years ago. ``He really needed someone to talk to. Someone not in the family." Although it was hard to accept outside help or to believe that a counselor could understand her son in a way she could not, Scott encouraged her son's visits to Dulberg.

``He's always talking about his counselor," said Ken Scott, Skyler's step-father. ``We don't know what they are talking about, but it is really helping."

A 1996 evaluation shows that 60 percent of the students and families who participated in SOS showed ``significant improvement,'' **Doolittle** said. He added that since most of the students seen are the the ones who are most troubled, ``that's a pretty good number.''

In Skyler's case, the improvement means that he is bringing home B's rather than D's. He has also had fewer problems with teachers and peers. In fact, he was recently made a student ``conflict manager'' and is brought in to keep his classmates out of trouble.

``If someone is starting a fight, I walk in and talk to them," Skyler said. ``Sometimes I know what they are going through."

One of the big goals of SOS counselors is to keep certain kids from being branded as ``bad'' early on. Once a student gets a reputation as a troublemaker, teachers and peers tend to treat the child differently, Dulberg said. Eventually, the child comes to believe the label and acts in ways that reinforce and maintain an identity. ``The kid starts to believe the messages others give,'' **Doolittle** said.

That in part, is Skyler's problem.

For years, he felt singled out, like his teachers were punishing him for acts he didn't do. He developed an attitude, a smirk and an ability to hide within.

``I just couldn't put up with it," he said. ``Everyday I would sit in the office for no reason. I couldn't do anything."

These days, Skyler is trying to be more open, to talk straight and to say what he feels. Recently, he broke a personal record by staying out of trouble for 15 straight weeks.

``He's really determined to make things happen for himself," Dulberg said. ``Trouble sneaks in once in a while, but we're working on it."

Group Study Exchange Team from Nigeria!



The Rotary Foundation's Group Study Exchange (GSE) program is a unique cultural and vocational exchange opportunity for businesspeople and professionals between the ages of 25 and 40 who are in the early stages of their careers. The program provides travel grants for teams to exchange visits in paired areas of different countries. For four to six weeks, team members experience the host country's culture and institutions, observe how their vocations are practiced abroad, develop personal and professional relationships, and exchange ideas.

In a typical four-week tour, applicants participate in five full days of vocational visits, 15 to 20 club presentations, 10 to 15 formal visits and social events, two to three days at the district conference, three to four hours per day of cultural and site tours, and three to four hours per day of free time with host families.

For each team member, the Foundation provides the most economical round-trip airline ticket between the home and host countries. Rotarians in the host area provide for meals, lodging, and group travel within their district. This year for District 5130, the GSE Team is from Nigeria. Members represent the vocations of Banking, HR Resources, Engineering and an employee of HP.

From Rotary's Press Release Center -Rotary clubs provide emergency shelter, aid to thousands in Myanmar



As the humanitarian crisis worsened in Myanmar's

delta region after a powerful cyclone hit on 3 May, a response team of four specially trained volunteers moved into devastated areas on Thursday to distribute more than 800 ShelterBox containers.

ShelterBox, a grassroots disaster relief organization supported by Rotary clubs around the world, was among the first charities to reach cyclone victims. Desperately needed aid from many other international groups had been stalled at the border for days by Myanmar's military government.

More than one million people have been left homeless by the disaster, and 100,000 are feared dead, the United Nations reports.

The team will work in cooperation with local groups in Myanmar to line up transportation and determine where the shelters will do the most good amid the massive devastation.

The first deployment of ShelterBoxes will benefit more than 10,000 survivors. Each container provides a tent, stove, water purification kit, blankets, tools, and other necessities to help a family of 10 survive for six months. Some include two 10-person tents, doubling

the usual shelter capacity.

With no Rotary presence in Myanmar, Rotarians' direct involvement in the relief effort will be limited. But Beth Palmer, executive director of ShelterBox USA, has noticed a spike in online contributions and says her phone has been "ringing off the hook" as Rotary club members have called to donate. ShelterBox offices in Australia, Canada, and Germany have reported a similar increase in contributions.

Tom Henderson, a member of the Rotary Club of Helston-Lizard, England, and the founder of ShelterBox, says 224 containers left Dubai, United Arab Emirates, on Tuesday. Another 220 boxes have been sent from Melbourne, Australia, and 400 are en route from ShelterBox headquarters in Cornwall, England.

ShelterBox was launched in 2000 as a project of the Helston-Lizard club and quickly garnered support among Rotary clubs worldwide. To date, the nonprofit has raised US\$29 million and delivered aid to over 40 countries in response to more than 70 disasters. Each complete ShelterBox costs \$1,000 to sponsor, and Rotary clubs provide about half the charity's funding.

From Rotary's Press Release Center -Indian philanthropist commits US\$1 million to polio eradication



During a ceremony on 21 April at Rotary International headquarters in Evanston, Illinois, USA, Arch C. Klumph Society inductee Rajashree Birla gave a brief speech. The Rotary senior leaders in the audience expected her to talk about her US\$300,000 contribution to The Rotary Foundation , which endows an Ambassadorial Scholarship and supports *SHARE*. Instead, Birla, of Mumbai, India, focused mostly on polio eradication.

As she concluded, the soft-spoken Birla then made an announcement that took everyone by surprise: She is committing an additional \$1 million to Rotary's US\$100 Million Challenge for polio eradication.

"You took our breath away," said an elated Bob Scott, trustee chair of The Rotary Foundation, after a standing ovation for Birla.

Birla's late husband, Aditya Birla, led his family's business to become one of India's largest. Today, Aditya and Rajashree's son, Kumar Mangalam Birla, heads the Aditya Birla Group (ABG), a Fortune 500 company with 40 plants employing 100,000 workers in 20 countries.

Integral to the Birla business philosophy is a longstanding commitment to accountability, not only to shareholders and employees but also to the local communities in which the business operates. Birla continues the family legacy of giving back to society through her leadership in the Aditya Birla Centre for Community Initiatives and Rural Development, which focuses on sustainable development in the communities around ABG plants.

An honorary member of the Mumbai and Mulund Rotary clubs, Birla feels a strong kinship with Rotary and its commitment to

community service.

"As a fellow Rotarian, I'm always happy to see the amount of work you do. The Rotarians symbolize a culture of giving and caring which is strikingly close to our group's philosophy," she said.

Birla has been a key supporter of Rotary's top goal of eradicating polio. The Aditya Birla Centre has helped immunize some three million children in 3,200 villages in India, one of the four remaining polio-endemic countries.

"At the same time, we perform reconstructive surgery and try to rehabilitate polio victims so that they become independent and regain their self-esteem," said Birla.

Scott later said that, to some extent, he wasn't surprised by Birla's announcement. "I know of her keen interest in the eradication of polio," he said. "I just knew that she would do something as generous someday."

Past RI President Rajendra K. Saboo praised Birla and her family for their leadership in Indian society. "Mrs. Birla is one person who connects the corporate sector with the community," he said.

RI Director Ashok Mahajan described Birla as a "shining example of what humans have to do to be humane."

Birla is the second donor from India to make a commitment of \$1 million or more for Rotary's US\$100 Million Challenge for polio eradication.

When asked what lessons Rotarians can learn from nongovernmental organizations like the Aditya Birla Centre, she humbly replied: "Rotarians have a lot of compassion, which is very necessary. I do see people going to the smallest details to give all their support to the downtrodden or the needy people. I think *I* have to learn from Rotary."

From Rotary's Press Release Center -ShelterBox and Rotarians reaching out to aid Chinese earthquake victims



Four hundred ShelterBox containers will reach China's SichuanProvince this weekend to help alleviate the acute housing shortage after a 12 May earthquake there left 50,000 people dead and more than five million homeless. Another 400 containers are en route to the area.

Each container provides a tent, stove, water purification kit, blankets, tools, and other necessities to help a family of 10 survive for six months. ShelterBox is a UK-based disaster relief organization supported by Rotary clubs around the world.

At the request of the Chinese government, ShelterBox will also provide an additional 1,700 tents. Chinese officials have made urgent appeals to the international community for tents. News agencies are reporting that refugees flocking to the cities are sleeping in any spot they can find, many in sports stadiums and in makeshift tents.

Three ShelterBox response team members are in Chengdu, the capital of Sichuan, to help distribute the aid. "The enormity of it is far bigger than anything I have seen before," Tom Lay, ShelterBox team member, told BBC News.

LifeBox, a charitable project of the Rotary Club of Denton and Audenshaw in Manchester, England, is also contributing to disaster relief in Sichuan. One hundred LifeBox containers, which include tools, clothes, blankets, and baby items as well as a water purification tool called LifeStraw, have been sent to the province, along with 1,200 additional LifeStraws.

At the receiving end, Rotary clubs in China are helping pave the way for organizations like ShelterBox and LifeBox to enter the disaster area, securing permits for the boxes.

The Rotary Club of Beijing, located more than 900 miles away from the disaster area, is discussing earthquake relief projects. They plan to purchase US\$4,000 of baby formula to distribute in the affected area. They are also fundraising. Beijing club members contributed more than \$1,000 to earthquake relief at their meeting the day after the earthquake hit. Club president Mike Ma also said some funds from an annual charity ball next week, which will be attended by RI President-elect Dong Kurn Lee, will be redirected for earthquake relief.

"There are already discussions about an after-earthquake mental health consultation project working with China Red Cross and disaster area reconstruction projects," said Ma. "We are also studying the more long-term, significant reconstruction project possibilities to take on."

Rotary Fellowships, groups that bring together members from different countries and cultures to enjoy a shared interest. In addition to fostering lifelong friendships, Rotary Fellowships keep members active in Rotary, sustaining their interest and further inspiring commitment. The nearly one hundred Rotary Fellowships encompass a variety of vocations and avocations, ranging from sports and hobbies to

professional interests - all of which serve as a way to extend international fellowship, friendship, and service. In addition to offering members an opportunity to share their passion for a particular interest with like-minded Rotarians, many individual fellowship groups enable members to use their hobbies or skills to serve others. For example, the Fellowship of Canoeing Rotarians has organized cleanups of polluted rivers, and members of the International Computer

Users Fellowship of Rotarians conduct training sessions for Rotarians and other people in their community on how to use electronic media. Members of the International Fellowship of Rotarians with Repaired Hearts - or the "Zipper Club," as they call themselves - have provided life-saving surgeries to disadvantaged children with severe heart defects.

Rotary Fellowships began informally in 1928 when Rotarians with a shared interest in Esperanto joined together. In 1947, a group of

Rotary International News - 30 May 2008

In 1922, General Secretary Charles R. Perry stood before a group of Rotarians at the RI Convention in Los Angeles and read a message from President Emeritus Paul Harris:

"It is a wonderful thing to have friends, many good, staunch, and loyal friends. They warm the heart and brighten up life's pathway. . . . Rotary is the door to friendship. Let us throw it open to every people."

The message was received with prolonged applause.

Approximately 6,000 Rotarians and guests attended the annual gathering that year. They enjoyed a trip to Long Beach Pike and a gathering at the Hollywood Bowl, among other activities.

Along with fellowship, attendees accomplished Rotary business as well, changing the organization's name from the International Association of Rotary Clubs to its current moniker and unanimously adopting the RI Constitution and Bylaws.

L.A., take two

In 1962, Los Angeles hosted more than 22,000 registrants at its second RI Convention. California Governor Edmund G. Brown, the first speaker, recalled the expansion of Rotary in his state since the 1922 convention. "I hope that you continue your great work, not only here in the United States but throughout the world," Brown concluded.

From Rotary's Press Release Center -Former scholar keeps vaccine pipeline running in Pakistan, Afghanistan



Once an Ambassadorial Scholar, Farrukh Jamal Syed today plays a key role in the battle to end polio. His Pakistan-based company manufactures vitally needed vaccine carriers that are being provided through a PolioPlus Partners grant.

Substantial funding for the grant came from Dan Holzapfel, of the Rotary Club of Cleveland, Queensland, Australia.

The Pakistan PolioPlus Committee saved around US\$40,000, thanks to the involvement of this former Rotary Foundation Scholar, says committee chair Abdul Haiy Khan of Syed's contribution to the polio eradication effort. Khan adds that other carriers cost at least three times more than the ones produced by Simcon.

Khan had approached Syed with the committee's need for an easily transportable carrier that would keep vaccines safe in temperatures as high as 115 degrees Farenheit (46 degrees centigrade). Syed was up to the task: His firm, Simcon International, specializes in industrial product design, development, and manufacturing.

Since 2006, Simcon has produced approximately 100,000 carriers. "It is a nice feeling of satisfaction and great achievement [to work] for humanity and The Rotary Foundation," Syed says. "Work for the Rotary name has great importance in my life."

Syed has maintained ties with Rotary ever since he studied computer-assisted design and manufacturing as a 1989-90 Ambassadorial Scholar in England. He later joined his sponsor Rotary Club of Islamabad (Metropolitan), but was unable to maintain membership in Rotary after moving his company to a remote area. He has since relocated his business to downtown Karachi and says he would like to rejoin the organization that helped launch his career.

"The experience I gained from the scholarship directly helped me in building the concept for Simcon," he says, adding that it also helped shape his worldview. "Generally, people from any part of the world have the same feelings and the same needs. What matters is how quickly we can understand each other by establishing good communication and giving respect."

From Rotary's Press Release Center -Fellowship Project Hits All the Right Notes

Music is an integral part of Grenada's culture, and children in Grenada start learning to play instruments at a young age. But when back-to-back hurricanes hit the Caribbean island nation in 2004 and 2005, an unfamiliar silence fell over devastated schools.

The International Fellowship of Rotarian Musicians is bringing the music back. In its debut humanitarian project, it donated US\$2,500 to help rebuild the music program at St. Andrew's RomanCatholicSchool in Grenville. The school, which serves 500 students ages 5-15, lost all its musical instruments and books in the storms.

"Music inspires us all. It unites our children and enhances their feelings of self-worth and achievement," says Sister Lucy Gabriel, the school's director. The money helped purchase guitars, violins, music stands, and a partial set of steel pans, an important instrument in Caribbean music.

Fellowship member Peter Sotheran, of the Rotary Club of Guisborough & Great Ayton, Cleveland, England, presented the funds to the school in a ceremony last year. He also delivered an additional \$3,000 and 36 secondhand recorders (wind instruments valued at about \$28 each) that his club had collected from donors in England.

"Before I had finished unpacking, the children were experimenting to see what sounds they could produce," says Sotheran, whose club worked with the Rotary Club of Grenada East to rebuild the school's library.

The International Fellowship of Rotarian Musicians was founded in 1972. Its 400 members organize musical performances at Rotary functions, including RI conventions. As part of its mission to

promote musical literacy, the group has started funding other school and community projects similar to the one in Grenada.

- Reduce the prevalence of smoking, high blood cholesterol and physical inactivity by 25 percent.
- Reduce the rate of uncontrolled high blood pressure by 25 percent.

Santa Rosa Sunrise was well represented.. Del Raby, Don and Wendy Floriani, Steve and Kathleen Amend, Nancy and Bob Aita, and Dave, Shauna and Cole Lorenzen.

Throughout the entire event, members enjoyed plenary sessions and break out sessions covering topics from the election of the next RI President (2009-10), John Kenny, to the changes that will effect the Rotary Foundation and its numerous programs.

Rotarians at the 2008 RI Convention demonstrated their commitment to literacy by setting a Guinness world record for the most books donated during a seven-day period. Exactly 242,624 books were collected this week for public school students in Southern California and Southern Nevada.

Danny Girton Jr., an adjudicator for Guinness World Records, confirmed that Rotary now owns the record for Most Books Donated in Seven Days at the final plenary session on Wednesday.

The opening ceremonies that include the presentation of the flags of Rotary (all the nations that include Rotary Clubs), this year included 200 countries flags!

From Rotary's Press Release Center -At Los Angeles convention, stars become aligned to end polio



Rotary's goals to eradicate polio and improve health and literacy seemed to become more attainable after the 2008 RI Convention in Los Angeles drew

to a close on 18 June.

More than 19,000 Rotarians from around the world

celebrated fellowship, commemorated Rotary's history, focused on the future, and along the way set a Guinness world record.

The convention, which began on Sunday, 15 June, marked the official launch of Rotary's US\$100 Million Challenge, a three-year fundraising effort to match a grant from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. In concert with the launch were two tremendous boosts from the World Health Organization and the government of Canada.

On 17 June, Dr. Margaret Chan, director-general of the World Health Organization, announced that WHO is making polio eradication the organization's top operational commitment "on a most urgent, if not an emergency, basis." Chan praised Rotary's conviction and big thinking attitude for the reason polio eradication is within reach. (Watch the video)

RI President Wilfrid J. Wilkinson announced on 18 June that he just received a commitment of US\$60 million from the Canadian government toward polio eradication.

In a keynote speech on 16 June, Dr. Tadataka Yamada , president of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation's Global Health Program, warned Rotarians that they must not stop too soon in their efforts to eradicate polio.

"If we conquer polio, no goal is beyond our reach, and no disease is beyond our capacity," said Yamada. "This is a battle we can't afford to lose."

Stephen Lewis, co-director of the advocacy organization AIDS-Free World, spoke passionately on HIV/AIDS at the fourth plenary session on 18 June and encouraged Rotarians to take action.

Literacy was also highlighted during the fourth plenary session, with a video message from Dolly Parton, country music star and founder of the Imagination Library, and an address from Ontario Premier Dalton McGuinty.

Throughout the week, Rotary's Wide World of Books, a global literacy initiative, also put the spotlight on literacy. Rotarians from around the world were asked to donate a book. Exactly 242,624 books were collected for public elementary schools in Southern California and Southern Nevada. The response resulted in setting a Guinness world record for the most books collected in seven days. (See the video)

Inside the Los AngelesConvention Center, the House of Friendship provided a forum for Rotary Fellowships, Rotarian Action Groups, and club and district projects. Outside, the beautiful Southern California summer served as a scenic backdrop to the Concert under the Stars entertainment event at the Hollywood Bowl.

RI President-elect Dong Kurn Lee concluded the 2008 RI Convention by motivating Rotarians to take action in decreasing the world's child mortality rate. More than 26,000 children die each day from preventable diseases such as pneumonia, measles, and malaria, he said.

Lee told the assembled Rotarians that they are the ones who can make the difference by providing clean water to communities and delivering basic medicines and vaccines to sick children.

"I will ask you all to *Make Dreams Real* for the world's children," Lee said. "This will be our theme, and my challenge to all of you. We will *Make Dreams Real* by giving children hope and a chance at a future. "

Make Dreams Real - DK Lee by Dave Lorenzen

A New Year Begins - RI President DK Lee -"Make Dreams Real"

Dear fellow Rotarians,



The beginning of the Rotary year is always an exciting time, with new club and district officers, a new theme to work with, and a renewed sense of purpose for our service projects. The beginning of this particular Rotary year is, of course, especially exciting for me as I look forward to meeting Rotarians throughout the world and seeing firsthand the many remarkable projects you are carrying out.

In planning how your club, and each one of you, can *Make Dreams Real* this year, I ask you to consider the millions of children who never even have the chance to dream. Every day, more than 26,000 children under the age of five die from preventable causes. As appalling as that number is, it is a decrease from the figure of 30,000 that first caught my attention and spurred me to bring this matter of grave concern to Rotarians.

UNICEF's *State of the World's Children 2008* report states that "by 2006, the most recent year for which firm estimates are available, the annual number of child deaths globally fell below 10 million, to 9.7 million, for the first time since records began." I would guess that some of the improvement in child survival rates can be directly attributed to Rotary projects that have been successfully addressing problems related to health, hunger, water, and literacy for a number of years now. So I asked myself: "What would happen if 1.2 million Rotarians focused their service efforts on keeping even more children alive?"

I think we already know some of the answers. If Rotarians provide insecticide-treated bed nets, fewer children will succumb to malaria. If we dig wells and address sanitation problems, more children will have clean water to drink and more hygienic surroundings. And if Rotary clubs carry out effective nutrition projects, we can save some of the almost five million children who die each year from undernourishment.

UNICEF estimates that fully two-thirds of the 9.7 million deaths in 2006

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were preventable. With Rotarians working to provide vaccines, oral rehydration therapies, accessible health care for mothers and newborns, and other relatively simple interventions, I'm confident that many more babies will not only survive but go on to live healthy, productive lives. Let's *Make Dreams Real* by giving these children the chance to grow up and have dreams of their own.

From Rotary's Press Release Center -Historic Moments: Rotary's History in China

In 1919, the past president of the Rotary Club of Seattle, Roger D. Pinneo, was traveling through the Far East on business. It turned out to be a historic trip, especially for Rotarians in China. Pinneo established the first Rotary club in Shanghai on 17 July 1919 with 35 charter members. Rotary admitted the club on 1 October 1919.

From the beginning, the Shanghai club was international in its membership and objectives. Records from 1924 show that the club's membership was 80 percent American, 10 percent British, and 10 percent Chinese. The club's first officers and directors, elected 24 July 1919, were as follows: president Julian Petit, vice president A.B. Rosenfeld, secretary E.O. Baker, treasurer R. Buchan, and directors Thomas Sammons, F.J. Raven, and W.L.



Johnstone.

The Rotary Club of Shanghai was especially active in community work. It supported schools for Russian immigrant boys and physically challenged children. By the end of the 1937-38 Rotary year, the Rotary Mobile Clinic and Dispensary had completed eight months of charitable medical work among refugees in Shanghai.

By mid-1945, RI chartered 29 clubs in China. The clubs produced three RI directors: Fong F. Sec, Shanghai, 1933-34; Yen Te-Ching, Nanking, 1941-42; and Chengting T. Wang, Chungking, 1944-45 and 1945-46.

By mid-1946, due to World War II, Rotary International had terminated 20 of the original clubs.

Rotary experienced a resurgence in China after the war, with the admission or readmission of 19 clubs between 1946 and 1948, including Shanghai on 27 March 1946.

The club, however, was terminated five years later. The Shanghai club voted to suspend its activities in May 1951 citing the following reasons: members found it difficult to attend meetings regularly because of other duties, meeting facilities would no longer be available, and it was increasingly difficult to arrange suitable programs. The RI Board terminated the club in October 1951. By January 1952, all clubs in mainland China had come to an end, although the number of clubs in Hong Kong, Macao, and Taiwan continued to grow.

More than half a century later, the Rotary Club of Shanghai returned. In 2006, Rotary welcomed the Rotary Club of Shanghai and the Rotary Club of Beijing into membership.
