

My dear brothers and sisters in Rotary!

Together, we will *Reach Within to Embrace Humanity*. And in peace, harmony, and friendship, we will bring change – and a more joyful world.



Changes you should know about for the new Rotary year



The Changemaker Award will recognize clubs that make an extraordinary impact through their work in the Avenues of Service

A new Rotary year is set to begin, and with it several programs aimed at supporting and strengthening clubs and districts. In addition, a fresh slate of leaders will take over at the club, district, and international level.

Kalyan Banerjee, of the Rotary Club of Vapi, Gujarat, India, will become Rotary's 101st president, and the third from India, on 1 July. Read a <u>profile of Banerjee</u> from *The Rotarian*. William B. Boyd, of the Rotary Club of Pakuranga, Auckland, New Zealand, will take over as Rotary Foundation trustee chair.

John Hewko will become Rotary International's 12th general secretary on 1 July. He has said his priorities include improving Rotarians' connections with the Secretariat and increasing awareness about what the Secretariat can offer. Download Hewko's speech from the 2011 RI Convention.

Other changes include:

- Four pilot programs will begin 1 July, designed to improve recruitment and retention, allow for flexibility in club operations and structure, and give clubs an opportunity to explore new and innovative ways to promote member diversity -- all goals of the RI Strategic Plan. For each of three pilot programs corporate member, associate member, and innovative and flexible Rotary club -- 200 clubs have been selected to participate, and about 125 will take part in a satellite club pilot program. Learn more.
- The Changemaker Award will accompany the Presidential Citation during the 2011-12 Rotary year. The award will encourage Rotarians to focus on change and will recognize clubs that make an extraordinary impact through their work in the <u>Avenues of Service</u>. <u>Learn more</u>.
- The World Community Service and Rotary Volunteers programs will be phased out as of 30 June, replaced by a new model designed to expand the resources available to clubs for connecting and partnering with one another. The RI Board approved a shift to a resource and support model for RI programs to reinforce the priorities and goals of the RI Strategic Plan.
- Efforts to enhance Rotary's public image will be undertaken by 49 Rotary public image coordinators (RPICs) working in partnership with their zone's RI director, regional Rotary Foundation coordinator, Rotary coordinator, and district governors. RPICs, who are selected by the RI president or Rotary Foundation trustee chair, have professional expertise in public relations, journalism, or communications and will help support the RI Strategic Plan by conveying effective public relations practices to district leaders.
- The Rotarian magazine launches its digital edition with the July issue. Subscribers can now choose to receive either the print or digital edition, or both. This would be a good time to buy a subscription for your Interact or Rotaract club, to inspire them with Rotary's breadth. Learn more.
- Rotary clubs' annual per capita dues to Rotary International will increase to US\$51 in 2011-12. The 2010 Council on Legislation also set dues at \$52 for 2012-13 and \$53 for 2013-14.

The RI Board of Directors will seat nine new directors 1 July, along with RI President-elect Sakuji Tanaka, of the Rotary Club of Yashio, Saitama, Japan. The new directors for 2011-13 are: José Antonio F. Antiório, of the Rotary Club of Osasco, São Paulo, Brazil; Kenneth R. Boyd, of the Rotary

Club of Kerman, California, USA; Yash Pal Das, of the Rotary Club of Ambala, Haryana, India; Elizabeth S. Demaray, of the Rotary Club of Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan, USA; Allan O. Jagger, of the Rotary Club of Elland, West Yorkshire, England; Paul Knyff, of the Rotary Club of Weesp (Vechtstreek-Noord), The Netherlands; Shekhar Mehta, of the Rotary Club of Calcutta-Mahanagar, West Bengal, India; Juin Park, of the Rotary Club of Suncheon, Jeonranam, Korea; and Kenneth M. Schuppert Jr., of the Rotary Club of Decatur, Alabama, USA.



Be a Partner to Your Presidents: they're leading leaders

If you've been Club President, you know that it's one of life's most interesting and intense challenges, and that it can be a life-changing joy. If you haven't served in that role, it's almost impossible to imagine it - the experience is like no other, just about impossible to describe.

Ours is an exceptional group of Club Presidents in 2011-12. They are all accomplished professionals and business people - most hold demanding full-time jobs or run businesses, some have retired from highly responsible jobs in education, the military and industry. We have two restaurant owners, several bankers and financial consultants, some social benefit organization executives, a handful of past or current elected local officials, and one City Attorney. We have a few artists, a few writers and a few pilots, a stamp auctioneer, a landscaper, a B&B owner, Realtors®, insurance brokers and two grocery store owners. They range in age from 30 to their sixties, and are, as you can see from the photos, good-looking besides.

Women are over-represented, at 40%, compared to an overall district average of about 28% women Rotarians - both numbers are new highs.

Your Club President will likely devote, on the average, some 10 to 12 hours per week to the success of your club. She will be called on to intervene in disagreements. He will hear more about members' personal issues than he bargained for. She will sometimes decide to postpone a board vote if she senses that a split decision will be harmful and more discussion may lead to consensus. He will have to juggle his schedule for unexpectedly long announcements, late food, or a missing speaker.

Leading a Rotary Club is the President's major responsibility, but it is not only the President's responsibility. Leaders are those who take on accountability - they are the ones who look to themselves to see what is next to be done. They are the ones who notice when a new member looks lost, when a Greeter hasn't shown up, when the music isn't on-and spring into action. The ones who send cheery, supportive glances when a President is overloaded and rushed at the podium. The ones who

send a note of appreciation just because things are going beautifully, and especially when they're not.

One year from now, when your club has had an extraordinarily successful year, your President will hear many congratulations, and probably the response will be, "We did it together." That will be the exact truth. This is why we say that leading a Rotary Club is leading leaders. At an Institute for Leadership event, one of our IFL staff, 2011-12 Assistant Governor Wulff Reinhold shared the term, "courageous followership" - actively supporting the leader as a partner, with clarity about the shared purpose and the intended results.

The most extraordinary performance will be seen in those clubs in which members partnered with the President in accountability and pro-activity. Where members cared about details and about the big picture, where everyone took a partnership role in the club's leadership, and where the President had the full support and participation of every leader in the room. A club with members like that is in good hands no matter who is up front.



Group hopes to raise US\$3 million to restore Rotary founder's home for visitors

For nearly 40 years, Paul and Jean Harris hosted Rotary meetings and entertained visiting Rotarians at their home on Chicago's South Side. Today, Comely Bank, which they affectionately named after the street in Edinburgh, Scotland, where Jean grew up, is badly in need of repairs.

The <u>Paul and Jean Harris Home Foundation</u> hopes to raise \$3 million to carry out renovations, repay its debt from the house purchase, and add enhancements that would make the site a worthy tribute to Harris.

"Comely Bank is the <u>Mount Vernon</u> of Rotary -- it's the home of our founder, and it's too important an asset to not do something about it," said Robert C. Knuepfer Jr., 2010-11 governor of District 6450 and president of the Harris Home Foundation.

After Paul Harris died in 1947, Jean sold Comely Bank. It remained in private hands until the Paul and Jean Harris Home Foundation bought it in 2005 with money borrowed from the charitable foundation of the Rotary Club of Naperville. The Harris Home Foundation replaced the basement floor and made a few immediate structural repairs so Rotarians could safely visit the house during Rotary's centennial year.

But since then, the restoration project has come to a standstill.

The foundation hopes to restore the home to the way it looked when the Harrises lived there. It also wants to install digital monitors in each room that would display archived films, speeches, and photos of Harris.

During a celebration of the end of the Rotary year in late June, Knuepfer took a group of outgoing district governors and their spouses on a tour of Comely Bank. The 50-plus visitors checked out the basement where Harris held meetings around a table made of plywood and sawhorses, viewed the fireplace where he held his fireside chats, walked through the friendship garden where he planted trees in honor of his visitors, and stood in front of the bedroom window that he was looking out when he died.

"It's got a serenity in it," said Sunil K. Sharma, 2010-11 governor of District 5890 (Texas). "You feel like you want to sit and think."

"To me, it was like walking in Rotary history," added his wife, Rashmi. After the tour, the Rotarians agreed to help with the restoration efforts on behalf of their class of district governors.

Eventually, the Harris Home Foundation would like to establish an endowment fund to pay for the home's maintenance. The foundation's board envisions creating a Rotary history trail, with stops at Comely Bank, Harris's nearby gravesite, and Room 711 at RI headquarters -- a recreation of the office where the first Rotary meeting was held.

Knuepfer says Comely Bank could also be used as a meeting place for the RI Board and local or visiting clubs, and for Rotary Foundation functions.

Eradicating polio will take renewed resolve, says Gates

Bill Gates, cochair of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, praised Rotary for its continued success in the effort to eradicate polio, but cautioned that Rotarians will need to redouble their efforts to keep the disease from spreading -- and threatening hundreds of thousands of children.

Gates, the keynote speaker at the third plenary session of the 2011 RI Convention, 24 May in New Orleans, Louisiana, USA, said that because of Rotary, there are many places in the world where polio is no longer considered a threat.

"That's a blessing and a curse," said Gates. "The blessing is that in many places, polio is a disease of the past. The curse is that it is now harder for us to raise awareness that, in some places, polio is also a disease of the present. If we fail to help leaders around the world understand this, polio is certain to be a disease of the future."

Gates praised Rotary for reducing the incidence of polio by more than 99 percent worldwide since 1988.

"Your work has brought us so far," he said. "I'm so proud to be a partner in the work that Rotary has been doing to eradicate polic."





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Gates noted that only one case of polio had been reported in India this year, as of March.

"India is approaching zero cases," said Gates. "None of this would have been remotely achievable had it not been for Rotary. We would not be where we are without you. Nor can we get to where we're going without you."

Gates said that he and his wife, Melinda, have made eradicating polio their foundation's top priority. With the world on the threshold of eradication, the hard work really begins, he said.

The last 1 percent will be the longest and hardest 1 percent," he said. "It will require more work and more commitment than ever before. Without the redoubled effort of everyone in this room, and your fellow Rotarians around the world, we will not succeed. Redoubling is crucial to ending polio."

The Gates Foundation has awarded two grants totaling US\$355 million to Rotary in support of its work in eradicating the disease. Rotary has responded with Rotary's US\$200 Million Challenge. To date, Rotarians have raised \$173.2 million for the challenge.

Gates said he plans to work with Rotary leadership to keep polio front and center in the public eye. "You have helped so many people understand that we are 'this close.' I challenge you to make your voices louder."

Countries including Canada, the United Arab Emirates, the United Kingdom, and the United States have all increased their investment in the eradication effort. Gates attributed that success to the pressure Rotarians have put on the leaders of those countries. But he noted that with a funding gap of \$400 million next year for the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, it is no time to let up.

"If we fail, the disease will not stay at its current low level," he said. "It will spread back into countries where it's been eliminated, and will kill and paralyze hundreds of thousands of children who used to be safe."

Gates said that the monuments Rotarians have illuminated with the End Polio Now message are powerful images.

"But ultimately, the most important monument won't be the one we illuminate," said Gates. "It will be the one we create."


Michael Ellis - Footloose Forays!

Group hopes to raise US\$3 million to restore Rotary founder's home for visitors

For nearly 40 years, Paul and Jean Harris hosted Rotary meetings and entertained visiting Rotarians at their home on Chicago's South Side. Today, Comely Bank, which they affectionately named after the street in Edinburgh, Scotland, where Jean grew up, is badly in need of repairs.

The <u>Paul and Jean Harris Home Foundation</u> hopes to raise \$3 million to carry out renovations, repay its debt from the house purchase, and add enhancements that would make the site a worthy tribute to Harris.

"Comely Bank is the Mount Vernon of Rotary -- it's the home of our founder, and it's too important an asset to not do something about it," said Robert C. Knuepfer Jr., 2010-11 governor of District 6450 and president of the Harris Home Foundation.

After Paul Harris died in 1947, Jean sold Comely Bank. It remained in private hands until the Paul and Jean Harris Home Foundation bought it in 2005 with money borrowed from the charitable foundation of the Rotary Club of Naperville. The Harris Home Foundation replaced the basement floor and made a few immediate structural repairs so Rotarians could safely visit the house during Rotary's centennial year.

But since then, the restoration project has come to a standstill.

The foundation hopes to restore the home to the way it looked when the Harrises lived there. It also wants to install digital monitors in each room that would display archived films, speeches, and photos of Harris.

During a celebration of the end of the Rotary year in late June, Knuepfer took a group of outgoing district governors and their spouses on a tour of Comely Bank. The 50-plus visitors checked out the basement where Harris held meetings around a table made of plywood and sawhorses, viewed the fireplace where he held his fireside chats, walked through the friendship garden where he planted trees in honor of his visitors, and stood in front of the bedroom window that he was looking out when he died.

"It's got a serenity in it," said Sunil K. Sharma, 2010-11 governor of District 5890 (Texas). "You feel like you want to sit and think."

"To me, it was like walking in Rotary history," added his wife, Rashmi. After the tour, the Rotarians agreed to help with the restoration efforts on behalf of their class of district governors.

Eventually, the Harris Home Foundation would like to establish an endowment fund to pay for the home's maintenance. The foundation's board envisions creating a Rotary history trail, with stops at Comely Bank, Harris's nearby gravesite, and Room 711 at RI headquarters -- a re-creation of the office where the first Rotary meeting was held.

Knuepfer says Comely Bank could also be used as a meeting place for the RI Board and local or visiting clubs, and for Rotary Foundation functions.

Peggy Walsh Goebel is a professional registered nurse & educator shared he experiences on her third volunteer mission with the US Navy as a pediatric post-operative nurse on a trip thru Vietnam and C ambodia. Peggy was onboard the USS Comfort providing humanitarian aid and responding to natural disasters with medical, dental, eyeglass, veteranian service. There were 1100 troops on the mission with 11 partner nations and 17 NGOs. During the mission they provided 109,754 medical consultatio, 1505 dental, 60,883 glasse plus ENT and audiology evalutions. The teams provided 859 on board surgeries, plus 2800 vet services, and shared and trained information with the host nations. The total cost was \$25 million for 5 months. As Peggy said, this mission was filled with miracles, inspiration and peace.

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
