Natividad P. Natividad, Board Member Philippine National Association of Sign Language Interpreters



Natividad P. Natividad, or "Naty" to her friends, has been active with the Deaf community since 1992 as a volunteer, interpreter and organization adviser. She participated in a cross-cultural exchange program to Matsue, Japan in 1994 and to San Francisco, California in 1997 as an Ambassadorial scholar of the Rotary Foundation and hosted by Rotary District 5130. She took up classes in American Sign Language, Deaf Community Culture, Linguistics of ASL and Sign Language Acquisition, and Education of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing Children.

Returning to the Philippines after her Rotary Ambassadorial Scholarship year in California, Naty helped set up a Deaf Organization and a Deaf Rotaract club. Naty wrote a project proposal for a Rotary Matching Grant which provided equipment and sign language video materials to a local Deaf Organization. Naty gave various presentations on "Deaf Life and Culture in the Philippines" to deaf communities in Luzern, Switzerland; and to the Rotary Youth Leadership Assembly (RYLA) - The Deaf Way, in Ichalkaranji, India. She has interpreted for conferences, workshops and seminars conducted by the Philippine Federation of the Deaf, various government agencies, and other non-governmental organizations. She served as the project manager of the Philippine Deaf Resource Center for the project "Strategies for attaining legal access and safeguarding human rights of the deaf in the Philippines" funded by Australian Agency for International Development (AusAID).

Naty is one of the founding board members of the Philippine National Association of Sign Language Interpreters (PNASLI). As part of the PNASLI board, Naty pushed for the hiring of qualified sign language news interpreters at a TV network, and lobbied to the Supreme Court for compensation of court-appointed Sign Language Interpreters. Naty is a part-time faculty at the De La Salle-College of Saint Benilde, School of Deaf Education and Applied Studies teaching English and basic accounting to the deaf.

In May 2013, Naty participated in the EMPOWER Program, sponsored by the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs (ECA) in partnership with the Discovering Deaf Worlds (Find out more of DDW in http://www.discoveringdeafworlds.org). The Professional Fellows - EMPOWER COMMUNITIES program of the US Department of State, brought 11 Filipinos to the United States in May 2013 for a month-long fellowship designed to identify creative solutions to challenges facing Deaf communities in the Philippines. Similar numbers of Americans will participate in reciprocal programming in the Philippines in November 2013. The goal of the DDW EMPOWER program is for all Filipino and American participants to demonstrate an increased understanding of Deaf education, policy, advocacy, culture, organizational development, and community outreach.

Naty believes in respect for the inherent human rights of the Deaf, their language and culture. She also advocates for interpreters' rights - for them to be treated with dignity, provided a healthy and safe working environment,

It's roots may be traced back to pioneer Dr. Ned Steinberg. The agency provides education and treatment for adolescents from ages 11-22 who are struggling with emotional and behavioral difficulties and need special help to realize their full potential. Maximum enrollment is now 36, allowing for optimum student/teacher ratios. Children accepted into our programs receive intensive special education assistance in a supportive non public school classroom. Behavioral and academic skills needed for school success are strongly emphasized. At the same time they receive frequent and comprehensive psychotherapeutic support which includes intensive individual, group and family therapy. The overall goal of the program is to help adolescents return to mainstream school while progressing academically toward their high school diploma or equivalent graduation requirements.

The Art Therapy team provides students with a rich opportunity to express themselves creatively and develop a sense of mastery of emotional expression. World Water Summit draws attention to water's pivotal role



Ron Denham, a member of the Rotary Club of Toronto Eglinton, Ontario, Canada, has served as chair of the Water and Sanitation Rotarian Action Group.

Water and sanitation are at the nexus of Rotary's six areas of focus, says Ron Denham, of the Rotary Club of Toronto Eglinton, Ont., Canada.

"Without water, we'll never have conflict resolution. Without water, we'll never have basic education and literacy," he explains. Denham, who has served as chair of the Water and Sanitation Rotarian Action Group (WASRAG) since its founding in 2007, is stepping down from his post at the end of this month.

On 21 June, he'll speak at the group's fifth World Water Summit, in Lisbon, Portugal. *The Rotarian* caught up with Denham recently for a conversation about water and sanitation.

THE ROTARIAN: You recently got back from Uganda. What were you doing there?

DENHAM: In Uganda, all 74 Rotary clubs have come together as part of one water program. It's the first time this has happened anywhere. The program was launched by the Ugandan minister of water and environment a year and a half ago. It's going to transform the country.

TR: What has changed to make such a program possible?

DENHAM: Traditionally, Rotary clubs have thought about small projects. The project might be building a borehole, digging a well, putting in a pipeline. When they've done that, they say, "Now we're finished." The problem is that many of those applications have been unsustainable, because there's no emphasis on behavioral change. There's no emphasis on working with people in the community so they can sustain the systems themselves. So when the Rotarians in Uganda decided they wanted to make a significant impact, I said, "Let's stop talking about small projects. Let's think big." Getting water and sanitation is not an end in itself – it's the means to an end.

TR: You have a PhD in mechanical engineering. How did you get so deep into water?

DENHAM: I was senior partner at a Canadian management consulting firm. Most of our projects in the developing world were rooted in access to water. One project, at Lake Manzala in Egypt, was based on aquaculture and agriculture. In Greece, there was one in the horticultural business, which, again, depends on water. I realized what the impact of water could be. In 2004, incoming RI President Glenn Estess asked me to lead a task force on water. Then in 2007, we formed WASRAG.

TR: Why join WASRAG?

DENHAM: To engage in discussions about how to ensure your project is sustainable. We will help you promote

your project among other clubs and find funding. The exchange of information is important. For example, people in many parts of the world are making bio-sand filters and helping communities use them, but the practices are slightly different. On the website, we have a forum where users can share their experiences and learn from one another.

TR: Your term ends this year. What happens next for WASRAG, and for you?

DENHAM: [Past RI President] Bill Boyd is taking over as chair, which is fantastic. He's probably one of the most highly regarded Rotarians there is, and he's very enthusiastic about water. As for me, I told Bill that I will do whatever he wants me to do. I don't think I'm going to retire quietly. My wife wouldn't tolerate that.

Dear fellow Rotarians,

A Rotary convention is a powerful thing, and a first convention is an experience you never forget. My first was in Chicago, in 1980. That was the year I was president of the Rotary Club of Yashio. I thought we should learn more about Rotary, so I asked nine other members of my club to join me, and we traveled to Chicago together. We did not know what to expect from a Rotary convention. What we found was more than any of us had imagined.

That convention showed me Rotary, and changed me forever. It gave our club something to strive for. I came to that convention as a member of a Rotary club. I left it as a Rotarian. The feeling that entered my heart in Chicago is still there today.

As Rotarians, we work toward peace in many ways. We do it through humanitarian service. We do it through our belief in Service Above Self. And we work toward peace simply by being who we are. Every year, when we come together for a Rotary convention, we see, for a few days, the world as it could be. We see people of all colors and cultures come together. We work to build a better world.

Three-day event provides free health care to thousands in Africa

In 1994, Marion Bunch lost her son, Jerry, to AIDS.

It was early in the U.S. AIDS epidemic, and the stigma of the disease kept her from talking about her son's illness with anyone but family members. But three years later, Bunch recalls feeling a tap on her shoulder and hearing a voice telling her to "get up and get going."

"It was an epiphany ... that completely altered the course of my life," she says.

Within a year, Bunch, a member of the Rotary Club of Dunwoody, Georgia, proposed an idea to her club, and through Rotary, began bringing together community and professional leaders who shared her passion for disease prevention in general. That was the start of Rotarians for Family Health and AIDS Prevention (RFHA), a Rotarian Action Group that received recognition from the RI Board in 2004.

Health Days

Last month, the group held its third annual Rotary Family Health Days in Africa. Rotarians from 365 Rotary clubs fanned out across Uganda, Nigeria, and South Africa to help medical professionals and government

workers provide free health services to 250,000 disadvantaged people.

The event included polio and measles immunizations, dental and eye clinics, and family counseling and screening for HIV, diabetes and hypertension, breast cancer, and cervical cancer. Volunteers also handed out insecticide-treated bed nets, deworming tablets, and sanitary pads.

"The reach of this project is so phenomenal because of the presence of Rotarians all across these countries who felt emotionally connected by working together as one force on one project," Bunch says.

In South Africa, 225 Rotary clubs participated at 160 sites; in Uganda, 65 clubs supported 120 sites; and across Lagos and Ogun states in southern Nigeria, 62 clubs supported 70 sites. Two Rotary Foundation global grants provided funding to send vocational training teams to Uganda and to pay for malaria-preventive bed nets in Nigeria.

"The heartbeat of the health care system must be prevention of disease and the promotion of health rather than [trying] to cure disease, rather than trying to fix it after," says Dr. Aaron Motsoaledi, South Africa's national minister of health.

Volunteer Chris Pretorius, a member of the Rotary Club of Pretoria Sunrise, South Africa, was amazed by the turnout for the Health Days event.

"One of the members of the health department actually said they had never been able to get so many children here on a day like this," he says. "That in itself is success."

Working with partners

The campaign also illustrates how Rotary partners with other organizations to expand its impact. Since 2011, RFHA has partnered with the Coca-Cola Africa Foundation, which contributed US\$450,000 for this year's three-country event. Other partners were South Africa's Department of Health, South Africa Broadcasting Corporation, U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, USAID, Delta Airlines, and Nampak (a producer of sanitary pads).

"We are proud to have partnered with RFHA and the Department of Health in promoting access to health screening services," says Therese Gearhart, president of Coca-Cola South Africa. "At Coca-Cola, we invest in these initiatives because, together with our partners, we have a common vision of a South Africa that comprises healthy, strong, and thriving communities."

Leaders of the Rotarian Action Group hope to expand the event to more African countries each year.

"Rotary is the catalyst organization in this event because of the power and (political) neutrality of our brand and the respect we receive worldwide for our ability to mobilize communities into action," Bunch says. "This event represents the power of public/private partnerships. No one organization can do a massive event like this alone. Each partner has a defined role and set of responsibilities, and that's why it works."

Eureka Rotarian Receives Worldwide Recognition



Dr. Kim Bauriedel, a retired urologist from Eureka CA, was recently nominated for the Rotary Global Alumni Service to Humanity Award. Bauriedel joined a distinguished group of 18 Rotarians from all over the world who were nominated in 2012.

The Global Alumni Service to Humanity Award celebrates Rotary Foundation alumni whose extraordinary service activities and professional achievements exemplify the Rotary ideal of Service Above Self.

Bauriedel has a long list of credits to his name. His leadership and participation has included that of Group Study Exchange team leader in Russia's Siberian region, and participation in approximately 39 projects in Siberia. These projects included helping to bring donated medical equipment to the area to assist Siberian hospitals, schools and orphanages.

He has participated widely in humanitarian work, including assisting with numerous matching grant projects, helping to charter new Rotary clubs, and leading friendship exchanges, including five personal trips to Siberia, (two of which included bringing Friendship Teams into Siberia), and approximately 5 visits of Siberians to Eureka.

Tomsk, Russia presented Bauriedel with the Oblast Medal for Humanitarian and Merciful works in 2006 (the first time this award was presented to a non-Russian). Barnaul, Russia presented him with the Silver Mercury Award (also in 2006) for his humanitarian work in their community.

The Alumnus nominees are nominated by the regional Rotary Foundation Coordinator from their respective regions. The Foundation Trustees then select the global winner. This year's winner was recently announced as John Skerritt of Australia. Bauriedel said, 'he was honored and humbled to receive the nomination and congratulated John Skerritt on receiving the award.'

Bauridel was born and raised in Humboldt County, graduated from Stanford University, University of California-San Francisco Medical School, Vanderbilt University and went on to operate his own Urology Practice in Eureka, CA for many years, retiring in 1997.

He is a Distinguished Eagle Scout and has received numerous awards from the Boy Scouts of America, including the Distinguished Citizen of the Year award from the Redwood Empire Council in 2006. Bauriedel has served on many non-profit boards and is celebrating his 32nd anniversary with his wife, Sile Bauriedel (of Dublin, Ireland). They have a son, Thomas who resides in Eureka.

Bauriedel is a current member and 3rd generation past president of the Rotary Club of Eureka.

Dear fellow Rotarians,

The Portuguese found Japan by accident. But it is no accident that Lisbon has been chosen for this convention. Lisbon is A Harbor for Peace. And peace is the theme of this convention, as it has been the theme between Japan and Portugal for nearly 500 years.

As Rotarians, we work toward peace in many ways. We do it through humanitarian service. We do it through our belief in Service Above Self. And we work toward peace simply by being who we are. Every year, when we come together for a Rotary convention, we see, for a few days, the world as it could be. We see people of all colors and cultures come together. We work to build a better world.

I hope you will join me, and your fellow Rotarians, as we celebrate this year of *Peace Through Service* together.

Guatemala Rotarians use global grants to help school children receive a better education

At Próximos Pasos school for girls in Santa María de Jesus, Guatemala, the students look happy, healthy, and energetic.

Unlike their counterparts at some schools in the country, the girls have access to clean water and proper nutrition, and the results are apparent. The girls are able to focus on their studies, and they express an enthusiasm for their education.

"We saw many changes in the kids, in the teachers, and in the community," says Jorge Aufranc, past governor of District 4250 and a member of the Rotary Club of Guatemala Sur. "They appreciate the work that Rotary has done."

A Rotary Foundation global grant implemented by the Guatemala Sur club provided the school with computers and a machine called a mechanical cow, which produces soy milk. The device is made of stainless steel and does not look much like a cow.

Soybeans are put into a funnel at the top, and about 45 minutes later, they have been turned into soy milk and a pulp called okara, which is used in the school's cooking classes. On one recent day, the girls were using the okara to make realize

Aufranc's district has used the Rotary Foundation's new grants to help many schools in the area. It took part in the three-year pilot of the new grant system, during which 43 global grants have been undertaken in the district, including five by the Guatemala Sur club. The pilot ends 1 July, and the new grants then become available to all

The Guatemala Sur club began with projects that address needs they deemed critical. For example, one global grant is providing nine rural schools in Sumpango with washing stations, latrines, kitchen equipment, and furniture.

"Everything begins with water," Aufranc says. "If there is no water, we cannot have peace. Where there is a lack of water, there is conflict."

Partnerships are essential

For the grant used at Próximos Pasos, the Guatemala Sur club partnered with clubs from districts 6420 and 6440 (Illinois, USA), as well as Mission Impact and the World Soy Foundation. Aufranc says working with these other organizations is part of what made the grant successful.

"You have to involve as many Rotarians as you can, locally and internationally," Aufranc says. "With Future Vision, there has been resistance because people think, 'oh we have to think bigger and bigger.' But that's how you make an impact in a community. You have to think big."

His district's extensive experience with global grants has made Aufranc an advocate of the new grants.

He believes community involvement is essential to any Rotary project. Several of Guatemala Sur's global grants were made possible by the volunteer labor of community members and input from local leaders.

"To have a good project, a sustainable project, you have to involve the community. If the community participates from the beginning, they feel they have ownership of the project, and this helps guarantee sustainability," he explains. "We have to think of it as their project, not ours. It is a project of the community, not a Rotary project."

Mirna Pérez, the principal of Próximos Pasos, also believes involving her community made the project possible. She says keys to success included the sharing of responsibility by Rotarians and community members, good communication, and flexibility.

"We are thankful to Rotary for helping us and bringing change to the lives of our students and the community," Pérez says. "Our communities need more opportunities, and Rotary gives us those opportunities. We utilize everything and we work our hardest to put everything to good use."



News from Rotary International

The Rotary world comes to Lisbon for the opening of the 2013 convention

Several centuries ago, Portuguese explorers set sail from Lisbon to explore the world over the seas.

On Sunday, the world, or at least representative parts of it, came to Lisbon, as Rotarians from more than 225 countries and geographic areas gathered for the opening plenary session of the 2013 Rotary International Convention, Lisbon: A Harbor for Peace.

Peace took center stage all day. During his opening remarks, RI President Sakuji Tanaka, who selected Peace Through Service as this year's RI theme, shared how he came to make a connection between peace and service. He recalled that he was still very young when he heard the radio broadcast by Japanese Emperor Hirohito announcing the end of World War II.

"Until that day, the country had been working together to win the war. Now, we would work together to rebuild. And we would work together to build a new identity for Japan: one that was committed to peace," he said

Tanaka said when he joined the Rotary Club of Yashio, Japan, years later, he learned about the idea of Service Above Self.

"Through Rotary, I realized that I was working to make other people's lives better. I wanted to serve my customers, not only for my own profit, but so that they would be happier from my work, and my employees would also have better lives," he said. "Now, I see my business in a very different way. And I see Rotary service as an idea that is not limited to my Rotary club. Everything we do for other people helps to make the world a better place."

Tanaka said that by meeting basic human needs and engaging in international service projects, Rotary builds peace daily. He said he has seen the many different ways that Rotarians build peace through service during his year as president.

"Here in Lisbon, at this Rotary convention, we have the chance to experience the world as it could be: with people from every continent united to make their world a better place," he said. "Here, we see how little our differences matter. Here, we focus on what is truly important: what we can do to help others live better and happier lives."

Portugal's Minister of Solidarity and Social Security, Pedro Mota Soares, praised Rotarians for their peacemaking efforts and for tackling large causes like the eradication of polio.

"What is important to Rotary is important to Portugal, it is important to any country, and it is important to the world," he said. "You put your interest aside for the benefit of the world. It is something we as politicians should do more often."

The quartet II Divo, composed of Swiss tenor Urs Buhler, Spanish baritone Carlos Marin, French pop artist Sebastien Izambard, and American tenor David Miller, performed at the conclusion of the plenary. Buhler noted that the members of the group, being from four different countries, share Rotary's understanding of the importance of setting aside personal differences to work for the common good.

After the plenary, Bill Thompson, a member of the Rotary Club of Port Orange South Daytona, Florida, said he felt the emphasis on peace is very appropriate.

"Especially given the conflict that is going on in the world, to have an organization like Rotary making such an influence is very gratifying," he said.

Assam Musonza, a member of the Rotary Club of Gweru, Zimbabwe, referred to the conflict in his own country.

"Peace is quite an important theme," he said. "Peace is not just about villages not fighting each other. It's about peace within us. Because when we have peace within ourselves, we do not want to fight with each other."
