# Special Report

The following report was submitted by Pat Martin and reflects recent action taken by the board. The Community Services Committee has received applications from the community requesting support for many local projects and programs. This report provides some detail of the programs have been approved by the club's board of directors.

#### Roseland Soccer Program - \$250

- to purchase soccer balls for the two Roseland teams
- to subsidize the cost of about 8 soccer jerseys for participants who cannot afford to buy them

#### Santa Rosa Senior Center - \$300

 to connect to the existing irrigation system to water the front landscaping installed by SR Sunrise Rotary during "Hands Across the County".

#### Santa Rosa Senior Center \$150-\$200

- to purchase food for a Pancake Breakfast to kick off the First annual "Spring Celebration" on April 4th. This first annual social event will celebrate spring with a variety of events focusing on poetry, art, writing and will feature the center's own "Silver Singers". They would also like 12 - 16 Rotarian Volunteers to cook and serve the breakfast.

# Drug Abuse Alternative Center/ Clean and Sober School -\$2000

to support the Clean and Sober School Program.

Program goal is to merge therapy and academic efforts for adolescents with a history of substance abuse problems who have chosen the commitment to sobriety.

- Targets 13-18 year old boys and girls of all ethnic groups and economic levels.
- They are referred by school counselors, juvenile probation, private counselors, peers and through word of mouth.
- Students spend time fulfilling the academic re-

quirements for high school graduation. They also spend time in outpatient counseling and group counseling sessions. They are required to participate in 12-step programs in relationship to their addiction.

 Some students return to public high school and a number have graduated from the Clean and Sober School.

#### Sonoma County Family YMCA - \$1500

General Fund Contribution

- YMCA's mission is to provide healthy, safe and wholesome programs for youth and family through comprehensive programs emphasizing the values of building character, developing self esteem and strengthening families.
- 1st Priority support the "After Hours" Y-Teen Center held every Saturday night from 8pm to midnight at the main facility on College Avenue. Over 150 6th 8th graders regularly attend and actively participate in a variety of programs that are supervised by trained and caring staff and volunteers. It is the "cool" place to be on Saturday nights.
- 2nd Priority Leadership in Training Program prepared teenagers, 13-16, for camp counseling. The teens serve as counselor aids in the Summer Day Camp program. Over 60 teens participated in Summer 1997.
- 3rd Priority Summer Day Camps offer a traditional day camp program at 8 county sites, a sports day camp at 4 sites, a performing arts day camp at 3 sites, 1 basketball camp, 1 kindercamp and 1 nature/adventure camp. There will be 5 week-long camp sessions. Over 3300 youth attend. Camps provide opportunities for kids to meet new friends, develop leadership and counselor skills, and learn the importance of teamwork and being reliable and responsible for one's actions.
- 4th Priority Low Income Subsidy Program subsidizes youngsters who would not be able to participate without help and support from the Y.

# Santa Rosa Sunrise Youth Grant Program

On occasion, the Club is approached by high school or college students who are looking for funding assistance to attend a special event or program. The Board decided to formalize the criteria for "Youth Grants", which is outlined below. As an example, we recently assisted Amber Taylor, our February "Student of the Month" from Elsie Allen, so she could attend her presidential retreat week in Washington, D.C.. If you have any questions about the criteria that has been approved, please contact Russ Lockner.

#### Criteria for Youth Grants

Amount: Not to exceed \$250.00 per grant. The grant amount awarded can not represent the entire amount of the the program or project costs. That is, the student will be required to obtain other sources of funding from family, other donations or earned money.

Eligibility: Any full time student in a Sonoma County high school, continuation school, Santa Rosa Junior College, Sonoma State University, professional or vocational school.

Purpose: To foster and encourage students to participate in programs or projects which will directly benefit them in achieving a career goal and enable them in making a contribution to their specific community. It may be a corollary of an existing program; a specific project which requires special equipment, supplies or tools; travel to workshops, seminars or special programs which are of interest and directly related to stated objectives

**Procedure:** Submittal of an application to the Board of Directors of the Sunrise Rotary Club of Santa Rosa at least 90 days prior to the requested funding date. The application should include the following:

- 1 A Resume
- 2 A short description of the project or program.
- 3 The amount requested and the source of the additional funds required
- 4 A short (maximum one page) statement of how participation in this program or receipt of equipment or supplies would benefit the student and enable the student to further their career goals and communicate and share this experience with other members of the community.
- 5 If the written application is approved, the student will appear before the Board of Directors to present the request in person.
- 6 Make a short verbal presentation at a regular meeting after conclusion of the project or program.




