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

RECOURSE was conceived in the spring of 1991, when mediators Mary Brake and Jay Stewart brought their ideas to Sonoma County Legal Services Foundation. Together with Toni Novak, Foundation Director, they began to build support for a community mediation center for Sonoma County. In 1992 the first volunteers were trained. In 1996 RECOURSE received 501c(3) non-profit status.

Brian Baker, a Rotary Scholar in Pamplona Spain in 1984, continues his interest in travel promotion! "They come, they spend, they go. They do not vote." This is the short version of the perception of tourists, locally, and nationally by associations organized to promote travel and tourism. Know originally as Convention and Visitor Bureaus, the current moniker is DMO, or Destination Management Organizations, such as Visit California, San Francisco Travel or San Diego ConVis. In 1919, a group of Detroit hoteliers formed to promote occupancy in their unfilled rooms. Their efforts worked, and today these voluntary membership affiliations boost everything from Ecotourism, Agro tourism, our Sonoma County "Food & Wine Trails", largely the brainchild our Sunrise Rotarian Larry Martin. Currently our Golden State has 68 such DMO's. Here are some of the metrics of Tourism:

In the United States, tourism generates \$813 Billion revenue, and \$124 in taxes (ever hear of bed tax)

The 2010 Travel Promotion Act budgets \$200 million annually to advance domestic tourism.



Rotary news in brief from around the globe



The Rotary Club of Manama, Bahrain, donated a mobile diabetes unit to the Bahrain Diabetes Society as part of the club's ongoing effort to combat type II diabetes among youth in the country, where the disease accounts for 12 percent of child and adult

deaths.

The van, which cost US\$111,400 to equip, travels to schools and neighborhoods across the nation to screen children for diabetes and educate families on prevention. The unit's staff consists of volunteer doctors, nurses, and students from the Bahrain medical campus of the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland.

Cameroun

Early last year, the Rotary Club of Fergus-Elora, Ont., Canada, worked with the Rotary Club of Bafoussam to install potable water systems in seven rural villages as part of Hand Up Cameroon, a project involving 34 clubs in Canada and the United States. One of the villages, called Bawouk, has 1,300 residents, who are mostly women and children; many of the working-age men have migrated to the nearby city of Bamenda to find work. The new water systems will benefit these families as well as the students and traders who come from neighboring villages for Bawouk's primary school and market.

Canada

The 56 clubs in District 7070 (Ontario) set a new fundraising record in September for their annual Rotary Foundation Walk. More than 500 Rotarians, family members, and local residents helped bring in over \$142,000 for the Foundation. District Governor Ted Koziel, Past District Governor Bob Wallace, and Rotary Foundation Trustee Chair Wilfrid J. Wilkinson attended the event. In 2011, the district raised a total of \$848,000 for the Foundation.

Japan

Twenty years ago, Grace Michiko Saito, of the Rotary Club of Tokyo Seijo Shin, founded Tokyo Grace, a charity that supports young musicians, children with disabilities, and the elderly. Since Saito began organizing biannual fundraising concerts for PolioPlus in 2002, Tokyo Grace has raised close to US\$96,000 for polio eradication, disaster relief in Japan, and The Rotary Foundation. The concerts have featured distinguished vocalists, violinists, pianists, saxophonists, and flutists. The most recent event, held in November, raised more than \$3,300.

Nicaragua

Every November, the Rotary Club of Waterloo, Iowa, USA, sends Rotarians and other volunteers to impoverished areas of Nicaragua with two semitrucks full of donated Christmas gifts. Churches, school groups, and Rotarians from Iowa and seven other states work year-round to collect the goods. Since 2001, they've shipped about 2,400 "shoeboxes" – packages loaded with clothing, school supplies, and toiletries for kids – 790 layette bags filled with supplies for new mothers, 100 bicycles, and 12 tons of food.

Taiwan

District 3500 had an all-time record number of Rotary Foundation Major Donors (individuals or couples whose cumulative donations to the Foundation total at least US\$10,000) in the 2011-12 Rotary year. A ceremony at the district conference in April recognized 82 Major Donors, including three who decided to donate on the spot. Inspired by the generosity of his district, Tony Hung-Ming Chang, then district governor, declared his intention on stage at the ceremony to become a member of the Arch C. Klumph Society; he was inducted with his wife, Julia, on 26 October, along with three other couples and one individual from Taiwan who have donated \$250,000 or more to the Foundation. The district's total contribution exceeded \$1.5 million in 2011-12, another district record.

USA

The Wekiva River Basin provides clean drinking water, habitats for indigenous plants and wildlife, and outdoor recreation venues across 380 square miles in central Florida, but excessive nitrates have degraded the water quality. To preserve the federally designated Wild and Scenic River and the local water supply, the Rotary Club of Seminole County South launched an initiative to promote river-friendly policies among homeowners and businesses. By signing on to the Wekiva River Promise, residents pledge to limit their use of fertilizer and pesticides, grow native plants, regularly inspect their septic tanks, and write letters to government officials in support of Wekiva River Basin conservation efforts.

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Biosystems, a DNA testing company now operating in Rockville, MD and San Francisco, CA, in 2001.

His formal education began at Stanford University, where he was an under-graduate and graduate student, receiving a M.S.EE degree in 1960. He then served in the U.S. Navy for three years as Ensign and Lt(jg) at the Office of Naval Research, Washington, D.C. Following this service, he returned to graduate study and was awarded a Ph.D. in Physics at Pennsylvania State University in 1965. Following a year of post-doctoral study in Belgium, he began his academic career as Assistant Professor at the University of California, San Diego, with later faculty assignments at Utah State University, Stanford University, and the University of Michigan.

At Stanford, Dr. Banks led the Space, Telecommunications and Radio Science Laboratory of the Department of Electrical Engineering and Computer Science. He participated in three Space Shuttle missions via his role as Principal Investigator for the Shuttle Electro-Dynamic Tether System and as a Co-Investigator on the flight of Spacelab-1. At Michigan he served as Dean of Engineering and was affiliated with several academic departments and not for profit organizations.

In 1995 he moved away from academic life and became the founding CEO of ERIM International, Inc., a private remote sensing company located in Ann Arbor, MI. Following the sale of ERIM International to Veridian Corp. in 1998, he co-founded X-R Ventures, a Michigan venture capital company sponsored by the X-Rite Corp. of Grandview, MI.

Dr. Banks has received various professional awards, including the Appleton Prize of the Royal Society (London), the Space Science Award of the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics, and was named as a Fellow of the American Geophysical Union in 1973. In 1986 he was awarded the U.S. Government's Distinguished Public Service Medal for his contributions to the development of NASA's Space Station and other programs.

He was elected to the U.S. National Academy of Engineering in 1992 and currently serves on the Reports Review Committee of the National Academies. He recently completed a six-year term as Chairman of the Board of the Universities Space Research Association and two terms as a Trustee of the California Space Authority. He has also served as Director of a number of public and private start-up companies including Tecumseh Product Co., X-Rite Corp and HandyLab, all located in Michigan, as well as a number of small startup-up companies in California. Dr. Banks has advised the National Academies and various federal agencies on topics related to defense, space exploration and national economic security.

Dr. Banks was born in San Diego, CA. He and his wife Mary have resided in Santa Rosa, CA for the past 10 years. They have five sons and ten grandchildren living in California, Illinois, and Michigan. Peter has been a member of Sunrise Rotary in Santa Rosa for the past two years. He enjoys photography, sailing catamarans in the Caribbean, hiking anywhere, and fly fishing in the Sierras and Cascades.



Service project feeds hungry children



Rotary Coordinators and Rotary Public Image Coordinators put service into action on 5 March during a training event at the Hyatt Regency O'Hare in Rosemont, Illinois, USA.

The coordinators formed teams to bag 16,000 packages containing rice, soy, dehydrated vegetables, and 21 vitamins and minerals for Kids Against Hunger, a nonprofit organization whose mission is to reduce the number of undernourished or starving children in the world. The Fox Valley chapter of Kids Against Hunger is sponsored by four Rotary clubs in Rock County, Wisconsin.

Ben Stone was appointed Sonoma County Economic Development Board Director in 1986. He is responsible to the Board of Supervisors for various economic development activities:

According to verifiable evidence, atmospheric carbon dioxide in earth's atmosphere has increased nearly 30% in the last 100 years, and 4% in the last year alone.

Peter Banks, Sunrise Rotarian and recognized authority on Global Climate change guided us through a survey of scientific measurements from arctic ice core samples, oceanic & atmospheric data to present the challenges from the effects of increased surface temperature on agri and aqua culture, namely our food production and water consumption capacities.

For us humans, the 3-4 degree Fahrenheit increase in temperature is not too critical. Other species are more sensitive, especially aquatic natives. Measurements of pH and salinity bear on shellfish reproduction.

In addition to to food production, events such as wildfires, droughts and storms come on the landscape of climate change. Peter alluded to fellow Rotarian Tim Miller, American Red Cross Regional Director, as an interested partner in coping with the issues of climate change.

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



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
