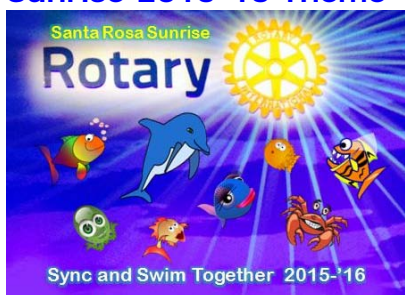

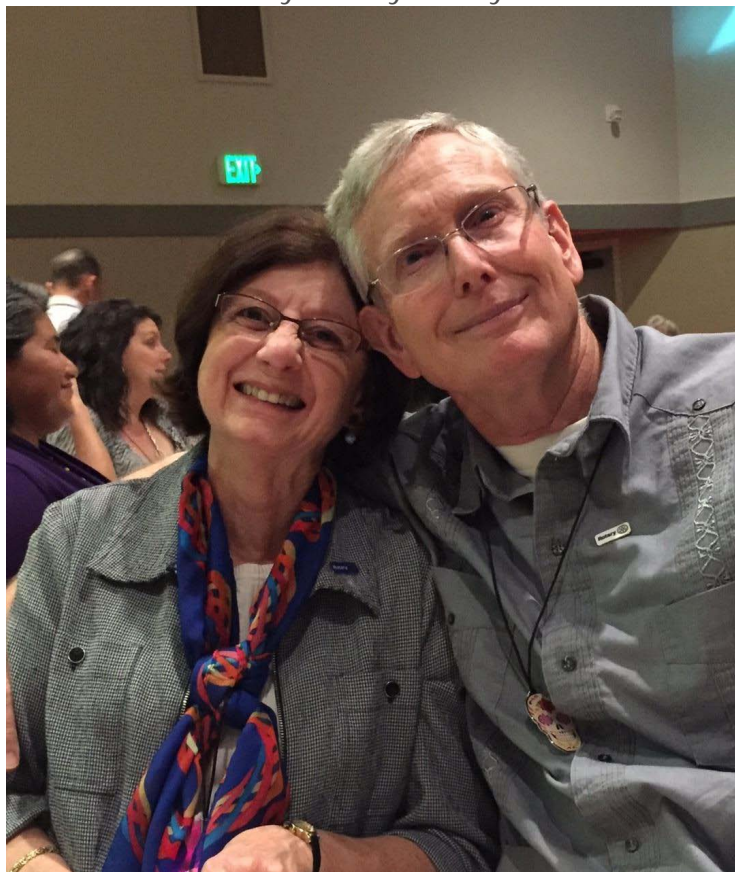

Some years ago, I was asked to speak at an Interact club in my home city of Colombo, Sri Lanka. I have always taken my interactions with Rotary youth very seriously, so I prepared my remarks carefully and put the same effort into my presentation that I would for any other event. After the meeting, I stayed to chat with a few of the Interactors, answering their questions and wishing them well.

I came out of the classroom where we had met into the autumn afternoon. The bright sun was shining directly into my eyes, so I found a bit of shade behind a pillar where I could wait for my ride.

As I stood there, hidden from view, I overheard a group of the very Interactors who had just listened to my speech. Naturally I was curious: What would they be saying? What had they taken away from my presentation? I quickly realized that what they had taken away was not at all what I had intended.

They were not talking about what I had said, the stories I had told, or the lessons I had come to their school to impart. To my astonishment, the major topic of conversation was my tie! I listened with amusement as they chattered about my Western clothes, my background, my business; every aspect of my appearance and behavior was dissected and discussed. Just as they began to speculate about what car I drove, my ride arrived and I stepped out into view. They were perhaps a bit embarrassed, but I just smiled, got into the car, and drove off with a wave.

Whatever they learned from me that day, I learned far more. I learned that the lessons we teach with our examples are far more powerful than those we teach with words. I realized that as a Rotary leader, and a prominent person in the community, I had, for better or worse, become a role model for these young people. Their eyes were on me in a way that I had never before appreciated. If they chose to emulate me, they would model themselves on what they saw, not what I told them.

All of us in Rotary are leaders, in one way or another, in our communities. All of us bear the responsibility that comes with that. Our Rotary values, our Rotary ideals, cannot be left within the confines of our Rotary clubs. They must be carried with us every day. Wherever we are, whoever we are with, whether we are involved in Rotary work – we are always representing Rotary. We must conduct ourselves accordingly: in what we think, what we say, what we do, and how we do it. Our communities, and our children, deserve no less.

When Arch Klumpp was president of Rotary in 1916-17, he suggested in a speech at the 1917 Atlanta convention that Rotary should start an endowment fund for the purpose of doing good in the world. It was only a brief reference, but the idea caught on with Rotarians. The Rotary Club of Kansas City, Mo., made the first donation of \$26.50 to the new fund, which was officially named The Rotary Foundation in 1928.

The Rotary Foundation had some activity in the 1930s and 1940s, but it was the memorial gifts to honor Paul Harris after his death in January 1947 that provided the funds to undertake the first major program. That was the award of 18 international scholarships for successful college graduates to spend a year studying abroad as Rotary Fellows. The fellowship program grew to 125 students a year in 1960-61, when I was a Rotary Fellow in Cape Town, South Africa, and it later became the largest privately funded

scholarship program with 1,200 students a year.

Rotarians' constant search for the best possible charitable programs led to the introduction of the Matching Grants and Group Study Exchange programs in 1965-66. From there, the Foundation assumed responsibility for the PolioPlus program in the early 1980s, established the Rotary Peace Centers in 2002, and restructured Rotary's Humanitarian Grants Program as a part of the Future Vision plan in 2013.

What has been the result of these efforts? Rotarians have been justifiably proud and supportive of the Foundation for many years, evidenced by their generous contributions of \$123 million to the Annual Fund in 2014-15. In addition, the CNBC television network recently confirmed the success of The Rotary Foundation by naming it one of the "top 10 charities changing the world in 2015." In fact, our Foundation was ranked as the fifth-best charity working to make the world a better place!

What a powerful tribute to Arch Klumph's visionary idea in 1917! We have so much to be proud of in Rotary, including The Rotary Foundation, and so much to celebrate at the Atlanta convention next year. Please plan now to attend the centenary celebration at the convention and show your support for one of the very best charitable foundations in the world!

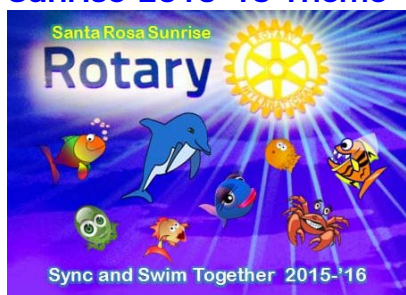

Santa Rosa Sunrise Rotary has examined 20,000 eyes fitted over 9,000 people with corrective lenses, 5,000 “gaffas” ~ sunglasses, in six countries over a period of ten years. On many of these international project missions dental services are also provided and have generated 900 extractions and 150 restorative fillings. In addition to Sunrise Rotarians and their family and friends, Dentists and Hygienists from the United States and Nicaragua, Peace Corps Volunteers, and Nicaraguan Ophthalmologists and Optometrist have participated in the three-to-four day clinics in extremely underserved, remote areas. The majority of these volunteers, whether professionally trained or entirely new to healthcare make multiple trips on these even-numbered year visits. 2016 was Sunrise Rotary’s seventh trip to Nicaragua. The first of hopefully more missions for our incumbent District Governor, this year **Erin Dunn of Fortuna Rotary**. Erin also set a first by presenting Rafael Praslyn his father Yaro’s Paul Harris Fellow. **Steve Herron** supervised the initial intake assessments Sunriser **Steve Zwick**, a fluent regular, travelled with both his daughter **Jennifer Somer** and 14-year-old granddaughter **Alessa Somer**. She managed an inventory of over 500 pairs of glasses as well as taught songs and playground games to the many children of Azucenas, Nicaragua. Other first timers Past Sunrise President **Harry Coffey** and soon to be Sunriser **Paul O’ Rear**, spouse of Past President **Penny Millar** quickly learned the roles of a “fitter”. Paul’s Spanish served him well. With Penny and **Betsy Randolph’s** fluency, the Fitting Room moved 672 very grateful people forward to new sights, most achieving at least 20-40 and many 20-20 acuity!

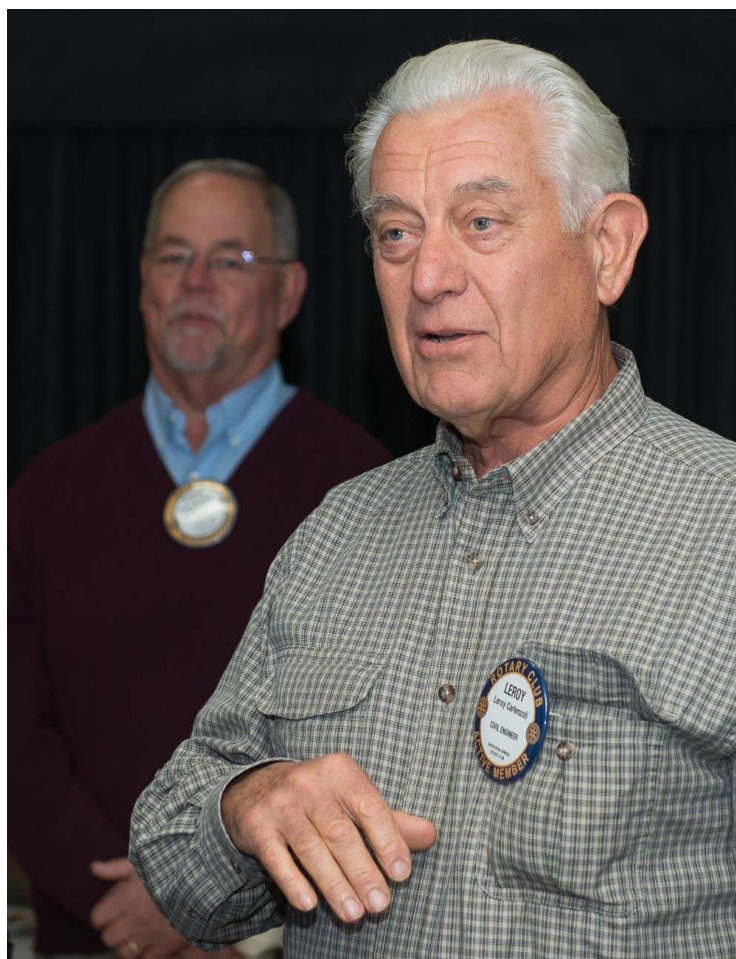

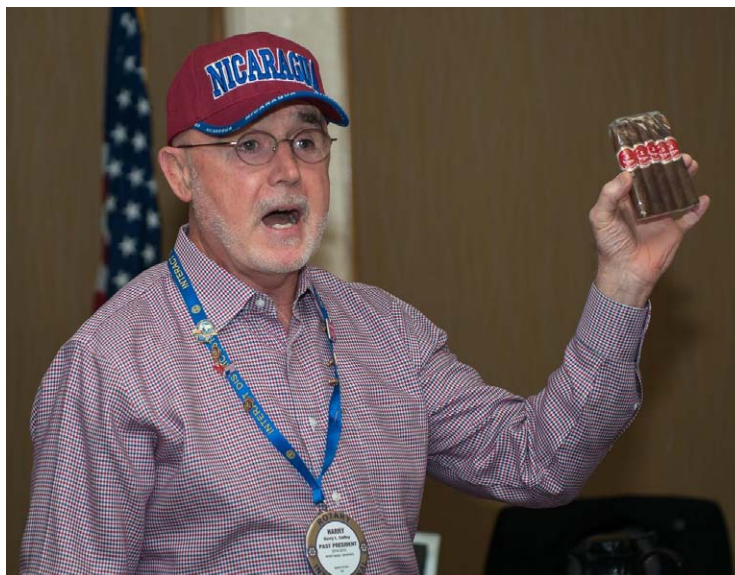

Successful women mentor youth through Rotary

When Clara Montanez was a student, she never heard the word mentoring. The idea of having a role model help you pursue your ambitions was unfamiliar to her.

"You basically chose your career based on personal interest and hoped you could find a job," says Montanez, senior director of investment for Oppenheimer & Co., Inc. "I went the route of getting married and having children first, and started my career later in life. I had no model for how to do that."

That changed for Montanez the day a friend invited her to join Rotary.

"Frankly, I was dragged into Rotary. I didn't see a connection at first," says Montanez, who's been a member of the Rotary Club of Washington, D.C., since 2003. "But then I met several women, including Doris Margolis, who took me under her wing and started mentoring me on how to get more involved. I began seeing the value in having someone I could count on as a mentor, and I have become more of a leader in our club, in my community, and at work."

Rotary's mentoring opportunities motivated Montanez, Rotary's alternate representative to the Organization of American States, to help organize an event for International Women's Day, 8 March. The event, to be held at the World Bank Group headquarters in Washington, will feature Deepa Willingham and Marion Bunch, both previously honored as [Rotary Women of Action](#). Rotary International Director Jennifer Jones will moderate the event, which will be streamed on [World Bank Live](#).

Montanez says Rotary has given her a platform to mentor young women as they balance career and family, as well as manage the challenge of repaying student loans. According to a [recent study by the American Association of University Women](#), the student loan debt burden weighs more heavily on women because of the persistent gap in pay between women and men.

"I think Rotary has given me access to young people, like Rotaractors, and they are ready to accept guidance because Rotary is a safe place to reach out and get advice," says Montanez.

Similarly, Jackie Huie, a member of the Rotary Club of St. Joseph & Benton Harbor, Michigan, USA, recognizes Rotary's mentoring power. In 2007, Huie's club created a [program](#) that matches high school juniors and seniors with a mentor in the field they'd like to enter. The program started with 40 students at one high school and has now expanded into schools across the area.

"I got a letter from a girl who came from a poor background, and through the program, she got a chance to meet with an attorney in town," says Huie, president of JohnsonRauhoff, a multimedia company that fosters creative thinking for artists. "It inspired her and gave her confidence to go to school and study law. She got accepted into four law schools and is on her way to becoming an attorney."

Besides the investment in young people's futures, mentoring brings clubs important community recognition. For example, Huie's club has 150 members, a large number for a club that doesn't hold membership drives, she says.

"Everyone in southwest Michigan knows about Rotary," says Huie. "We had a student who wanted to be a CEO for a large corporation. After we arranged for him to meet with the CEO of Whirlpool, his father was so impressed with the whole program that he joined Rotary."

Many of the program's early participants went on

to form an Interact club, and there are now more than 200 Interact members at four area schools. Forty of them will travel to the Dominican Republic this summer to install water filters and take part in a medical mission.

"It's important for Rotary to make an investment in young people," says Huie. "My own daughter is in Interact because of my membership in Rotary. I think her world is broader, and she looks at the world differently. We all do, because of what we've learned through Rotary."

CHOICES, a partnership with the North Coast Builders Exchange and the Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, is an interactive decision-making workshop that empowers teens to achieve academic success in pursuit of their career and life aspirations. In two hour-long sessions, business and community volunteers take students through real-world exercises on academic self-discipline, time and money management, and goal setting.

Developed in Seattle in 1985, this innovative program has spread to over 40 states and this year alone will reach approximately 140,000 students. Volunteer business and professional people are sent into classrooms and offer straight talk to young people about jobs that will be available to them (based on their educational achievement), goal-setting, time and money management, factors influencing their lives, and the consequences of the decisions they will make over the next four years.

One characteristic is stressed repeatedly: the key to success in anything they do is self-discipline. CHOICES has no hidden agendas, but simply encourages kids to think very carefully about the importance of graduating on time. Students are shown that being a high school graduate and getting further education or training will increase the number of opportunities available to them, have a positive effect on their career, and enhance their level of fulfillment over a lifetime.

In his surprise opening sentence, "Upbeat Times" creator and editor Paul Andrew Doyle offered his audience of somewhat somnambulant Sunriser's the opportunity to ask him questions first: "I am lyzdexic(sic), and often get things backwards." The more clinically erudite caught Paul's pun, and thus launched Paul's very personal and disclosing path toward his early-recognized goal of producing a newspaper. Not just any paper, but one filled with good news!

Drawing on childhood memories on his family's Candy Cane Lane Christmas Tree Farm in Sebastopol, Paul's inspiration for building had origins in a six story tree house project, each story linked with rope swings and scrap lumber steps. Encouraged by his grandfather's love of construction and tempered by his parent's divorce and sibling companionship, with references to cartoonist Charles Schultz, Paul persisted in pursuing his dream of writing and publishing despite erstwhile disruptive detentions and assignments imposed by his fourth grade teacher, Miss McPherson. One involved writing to New York newspapers and actually receiving a reply. "That opened my awareness of a much wider world," Paul revealed.

A wide variety of vocational sampling followed, including restaurant salad prep, dishwasher, waiter and carpenter. His waitering gift shined one sweltering day when Paul asked a heat-beleaguered customer if he preferred round or

Strongly believing the power of good news is what makes things work, Paul parlayed his advertising aptitude from Windsor and Healdsburg paper experiences and built what Sonoma County now knows as "Upbeat Times", the regional monthly which is circulated free, aside from the reader's smiles generated on each page.

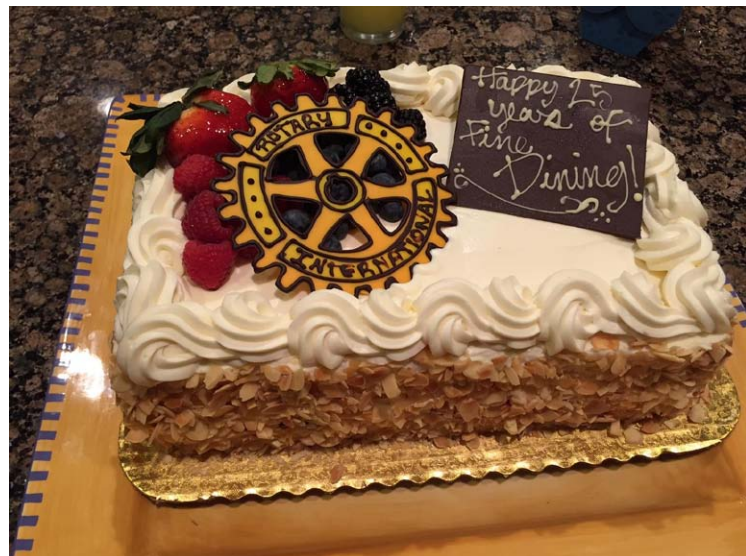

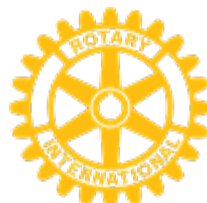

Institute equips regional leaders to advance Rotary's

story



Regional leaders from around the globe gathered at Rotary World Headquarters for a four-day training institute in early March

Regional leaders from around the globe gathered at Rotary World Headquarters in Evanston in early March for training they will use to inspire members in their respective areas.

Several participants - most of whom will begin their term on 1 July - noted that the true measure of the institute's success will be how well the information they learned is transmitted to Rotary members.

"We have to realize that training doesn't stop at the district level," said Michael Boyer, a Rotary public image coordinator from Pismo Beach, California, USA. "We train people really well to be governors and club presidents but we have to realize that we also have to train our members in how to talk about Rotary."

Boyer said his goal is to ensure that members can discuss Rotary's brand in a clear and compelling way. "We have to make our club presidents understand they can't just stand in front of their club and say, 'Go invite members.' They actually have to train members in how to ask and what to say," he said

A major goal of the four-day regional leaders training institute was to equip these leaders -- regional Rotary Foundation coordinators, Rotary coordinators, Rotary public image coordinators, and endowment/major gifts advisers -- to help club and district leaders strengthen club membership, focus and foster Rotary's humanitarian service, and enhance the organization's public image.

Many participants were impressed to learn about new tools available on Rotary.org, which they practiced using during multiple workshops.

"I have used Rotary.org for years but I have realized these past couple of days how much more advanced it has become," said Alasdair Seale, an endowment/major gifts adviser from Edinburgh, Scotland. "I didn't realize, for example, that there are alumni reports that include Group Student Exchange students, vocational training teams, Ambassadorial Scholars, and Rotaractors. They are all clearly a target for membership."

Patrick Coleman, a regional Rotary Foundation coordinator from Luanshya, Zambia, said members need to be encouraged to use Rotary.org.

"(What we are learning) is very exciting because we are bringing Rotary into the 21st century," Coleman said. "We have members who brag about being born before the age of computers. But that's a bit like saying, 'I was born before cellphones so I am not going to use one.' We're here, we need to use these tools."

Sherri Muniz, a Rotary coordinator from San Antonio, Texas, said the value of the institute for her was being able to share ideas.

"The program itself is designed to teach us teamwork," Muniz said. "But we are building connections with people who have success stories, with people who have similar challenges, and those connections will last us far beyond the end of the institute."

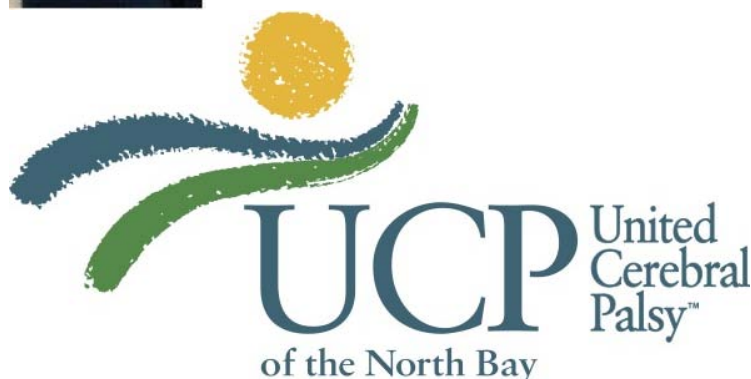

Katie Lightfoot Boost Cerebral Palsy




Katie Lightfoot is the Director of the BOOST Conductive Education Camp for the United Cerebral Palsy of the North Bay. Her photo is attached.

United Cerebral Palsy of the North Bay, based in Petaluma, strives to enhance the quality of life of people with cerebral palsy and other disabilities, their families, and their communities. They envision a future where people with disabilities live with dignity, participate meaningfully and experience success.

Boost Conductive Education Camp in Santa Rosa, is an intensive, five-week therapeutic movement program for children and teens with cerebral palsy and motor disabilities. It's where participants use repetitive motions to improve tasks from grasping utensils to taking first steps.

BOOST began in 2001 after two Sonoma County moms vowed to find an easier way than traveling out-of-state to help their daughters with cerebral palsy get the care and support they needed to progress. Since that time, BOOST has helped children by using the practice of Conductive Education to maximize participants' independence and quality of life, and to improve the confidence and psychological well-being of both BOOST participants and their families. Every day at BOOST, students are taught motor skills and their families learn how to integrate the practices of CE into all aspects of daily life. BOOST serves up to 20 participants in 3 classrooms, and each room is staffed with 1 conductor, 6 participants, 6 parents, and 6 volunteers. Participants' results and improvements range from sitting independently, to catching a ball, and to taking first steps. The results are life changing for BOOST participants and



In response, the North Bay Builders Exchange, Hispanic Chamber of Commerce with Educational leaders and concerned parents collaborated in developing the "Choices" program to reduce the dropout rate.

Modeled on a structured approach to develop a foresight oriented decision process instituted in Seattle in the mid 1980's by a dropout's father, Choices in Sonoma County has reached over 12,000 students in 8 high schools and has the support of hundreds of parents, the cooperation with Santa Rosa Police Department, and most of all, student's attention!

The non-judgemental dialogue exercise provides students a format to plug in their options and project their consequences over their lifetime, pictured about in the scroll. With an income difference of 3X's separating high school dropouts from their peers with education beyond high school speaks volumes, especially when coming from other than parents or teachers lips.

Students are reminded many people care about them: "You are our future. Teachers and parents cannot make your mind up for you. The key to your success is self discipline, for the rest of your life."

Grant brings clean water to thousands in Ghana



Investing in clean water could save 2.5 million lives a year. We can't afford not to protect the world's water supply. Take action with Rotary to create access to clean water.

Worldwide, more than 748 million people live without access to clean water and at least 3,000 children die each day from diarrheal diseases caused by unsafe water. Rotary is working to change that. For example, members used a Rotary grant to drill more than 20 clean-water wells and to repair another 30 in villages across Ghana. The project also included education about and treatment of Buruli ulcer, a debilitating infection that if untreated can lead to disability and death.
