Service Projects



Observing October as Vocational Service month, Santa Rosa Rotarian Jose Octavio Guillen shared his personal and professional history: As a 14 year old immigrant from Guatemala, Jose came to the California's Imperial Valley. He was a by-product of our ESL, English Second Language Program, empowering him to awaken to the American Dream of a fulfilling, successful life. Jose sees his Rotary membership as his payback opportunity.

In 1974 Jose's ambition and capacity for a heavy workload quickly gained him reputation as a "heavy case lifter" ~ carrying files over 20 pounds while a CETA, Comprehensive Employment Training Act advisor. His administrative skill continued to develop and led him to the right side of the judicial system. He currently serves as the Executive Director of Sonoma County's Superior Court, overseeing 174 employees, a budget of 27 million dollars, and hundreds of volunteers. Jose was introduced by Sunrise Rotarian Peter Steiner, Executive Director of Sonoma County Bar Association, who described the Court as a seamlessly running system.

In 1998 California voters approved a measure which realigned Superior Courts from county to state funding. Jose described this process as generally beneficial, yet pointed out the link to the overall State economy, and that his agency presently operates with 3 less judges, 20 out of allocated 23, and approximately 20% fewer employees and finances than workload indicators would justify. The good news is caseloads have dropped nearly 10% from 118,992 in 2009 to 108,013 in 2012.

Challenges facing Sonoma County Superior Courts include:

*Budget funding 20% less than needed.

*Backlogs created by staffing shortage of 60 employees

*Volunteer recruitment, Case Management, Labor Relations and Interpreter Services.

On the horizon is the construction of a new Court Facility. Estimated completion is 2019. The 150 million dollar project will replace current buildings rated poorly for both seismic and public safety. The six story building will secure transportation of high risk inmates from the adjacent jail, and provide upgraded telecommunication and security infrastructure.





Posted by Max Bridges on Oct 29, 2014 RESTORING VISION TO HUNDREDS IN CHINA



Four hundred citizens in northeast China received free cataract surgeries in 2013 thanks to efforts by the Rotary Clubs of Warner Robins, Georgia, USA, and Shanghai, China.

Seeing an elderly Tibetan woman weep with joy when cataract surgery restored her vision after 10 years is the kind of moment Dave Razo will never tire of.

For several summers Razo, a member of the Rotary Club of Warner Robins, Georgia, USA, traveled to rural northwest China with a team from Georgiabased nonprofit Gansu Inc., to provide free sight-restoring cataract surgery to some of the country's poorest residents. In 2012, after 22 years and 6,000 successful procedures, Gansu's founder, ophthalmologist William Conrad, retired and discontinued the organization's operations.

But Razo didn't want the effort to end. He had seen how life-changing the surgery could be, not only for the patients but for their families and their community.

"When you see the face of someone who regains their sight for the first time in years, you can't help but share their overwhelming happiness and gratification," says Razo, who is a retired U.S. Air Force pilot. "There was so much good work done by Dr. Conrad and his organization that I felt I could continue his legacy through Rotary."

Cataract, a clouding of the lens of the eye, is responsible for an estimated 2.5 million cases of blindness in China, nearly half of the country's blind population. In rural areas, blindness can be a death sentence for villagers who must walk dangerous mountain trails to obtain food and water.

Nearly half of China's population lives in rural areas, without access to the same health care as urban residents. With its huge population of older people, China is likely to face a growing backlog of people in need of cataract surgery, Razo says. "Chinese families in these regions are close knit, and three or four generations often live together. So giving sight to a patriarch or matriarch has a multiplier effect for the family and the community," he says.

Razo turns to Rotary to continue the project

During one of his missions with Gansu, Razo had met Frank Yih, of the Rotary Club of Shanghai. Yih, who is chair of the nonprofit HuaQiao Foundation, which provides in-country logistical support for international charities, arranged housing for team members during their last two visits to China. When Gansu closed its doors, Razo's Rotary club and the Shanghai club partnered to fund cataract surgery for 400 people at two hospitals in the northeast provinces of Shandhai, as well as remote areas closer to Shanghai.

The clubs raised a total of \$46,000, including \$21,000 in matching funds from The Rotary Foundation. The surgeries, each of which cost about \$110 and took about two hours, were completed in June. The Shanghai club collaborated with Vision in Practice, an organization that provides surgical training, consultation, and assistance to eye care institutions and professionals, to oversee the procedures and assist hospital staff.

Yih says the grant project has introduced a low-cost, high-quality cataract surgery model into the Chinese health care system, and he hopes his club can help expand the effort.

"If this type of surgery and outreach can be integrated nationwide, millions of elders in the rural villages can enjoy the benefit of regaining their vision through affordable operations," says Yih. "This will ease the burden of our country's health care dramatically."

1996-97 - Randy Seelye - President



My Year As President - 1996-97 - Randy Seelye

Serving a president of our club during 1996-97 presented me with some of the most difficult and challenging tasks I have ever attempted. In my farewell "President's

Corner" column in our club newsletter I said, "The challenge for me was similar to the commitment and training it took for me to complete a marathon when I

was younger.

But the marathon was over in one day! The year-long Rotary experience has already proven to be the most rewarding I have ever had. Rotary's motto of 'Service Above Self' has always had a good ring to it; now I really know what it means."

It was truly a rewarding year for me, and I hope for the club.

During the year we:

• Completed installing a 3½-acre grass field at the Steele Lane Elementary School, the biggest community service project in our club's history. This two-plus-year project required \$45,000 from our club, countless work parties and from \$80,000 to \$100,000 in donated labor and materials from contractors and companies throughout our area. Leroy Carlenzoli spearheaded the project and secured the donations. His engineering firm contributed \$10,000 in labor and work parties.



• We held our club's first Progressive Dinner organized by Past Dist. Gov. Del Raby, and re-started the Valentine's Dinner-Dance after a several year absence, organized by Past Presidents Peter Treleaven and Dave Lorenzen.



• Established a Membership Development program, led by then president-elect Art King. This program reduced the number of people leaving our club, and within a year added 15 members to our club (from a low-point of 43 members).

• We sent \$29,000 in medical supplies to war-torn Croatia in a project led by director Dale Zumfeld. This two-year effort was honored with the Homer Wood Award at the District Conference, for the top World Community Service project in the 40-club district (district now has 43 clubs).

• We held two club job fairs as Vocational Service programs, allowing club members to show off either their workplace or hobby. They were organized by director and future president Steve Olsen.

• We held two very successful fund raisers, including a fall raffle that raised \$19,000 and offered trips to Tahiti and Puerto Vallarta, and the club's eighth annual golf tournament, raising more than \$14,000. The raffle was led by future president Russ Lockner. The golf tournament, led by future president Steve Herron and Jeff Young, sold out with 144 golfers.

It is surely the wish in all our hearts that there is peace in our world.

Our Rotary Foundation is endeavoring to advance this with the establishment of Rotary Peace Centers in various parts of the globe.

The Rotary Peace Centers are the premier educational program of the Foundation, and this year I am asking Rotarians to foster world understanding, goodwill, and peace by promoting and publicizing the program so its work is enhanced.

The program funds up to 100 Rotary Peace Fellowships per year, for fellows to study at one of the Foundation's specially chosen universities. Fellows can earn a master's degree in peace and conflict resolution or a related field at Duke University and University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, in the United States; University of Queensland in Australia; Uppsala University in Sweden; University of Bradford in England; and International Christian University in Japan. Additionally, our professional development certificate program in peace and conflict resolution is offered through Chulalongkorn University in Thailand.

The idea of the Rotary Peace Centers is to create a cadre of individuals who are dedicated to peace and conflict resolution, and who have been given the tools to succeed in their efforts. Since the program began in 2002, nearly 900 peace fellows have been engaged in peace activities throughout the world, working for nongovernmental organizations, government agencies, the World Health Organization, World Bank, and others.

To fund the program, the Rotary Peace Centers Major Gifts Initiative has set a target of US\$125 million by the end of this Rotary year. This is an achievable goal, but it needs your continuing financial support

Veteran Honoring Luncheon

Santa Rosa's 14th Annual Veteran Honoring Luncheon jointly sponsored by area Kiwanis & Rotary Clubs hosted nearly 1,000 Veterans from all branches of the Armed Forces. A four member panel composed of three Military Veterans and a Rosie the Riveter National Museum founder provided a up-close and personal account of service life abroad and back home.

Phylis Gould, one of the first women admitted to the Boilermakers Union disclosed how earning a wage equal to her welder-husband's cost them their marriage. All he military veterans expressed "family" as their longed for at Christmas abroad, and two Mexican food. When the last major earthquake struck Japan in March 2011, Regan Masi, USAF airport operations specialist found himself and new subordinate coordinating the emergency diverted flights into the nearest USAF airbase. Susanne Rea saw how social media propelled an event to raise money for polio eradication, and figured she could use the same tools to encourage Rotary clubs around the world to hold similar fundraising meals. To date, clubs and districts have raised over \$1 million for Rotary's polio eradication campaign through more than 600 dining events.

"At the peak of our registrations, it became an almost around-the-clock commitment," says Rea, a member of the Rotary Club of Cairns Sunrise in Queensland, Australia. "Social media really gave our project momentum."

In early January, Rea consulted her friend Mukesh Malhotra, a member of the Rotary Club of Hounslow, Greater London, England, and a past governor of District 1140, about her idea to encourage clubs to hold a meal to celebrate Rotary's anniversary on 23 February and benefit the polio eradication campaign. Their clubs agreed on a joint project, which they called the World's Greatest Meal, to spread the word. A Facebook page was launched, then a website, and a video was created for YouTube. As a result, hundreds of individual clubs promoted their own meal events through their Facebook pages.

What Rea did for her event, you can do for yours; all it takes is a little bit of social media know-how. We consulted several Rotary members with the right sort of expertise and came up with this list of "must-do's":

1. Create a page for your event on Facebook.

If you're not using Facebook yet, find someone in your club to serve as page administrator, and follow the easy steps at Facebook.com.

When creating an event page, add some news before inviting friends. Keep the text short and snappy, bearing in mind that social media is designed to entertain. Avoid Rotary jargon and abbreviations. You want your page to sound like what you would say to a friend who doesn't know anything about Rotary.

You can also download Rotary visuals for your page from the Brandcenter (My Rotary login required)

2. Use active photos that show people doing things.

Photos of active people having fun will generate the excitement you want to portray far better than check-passing photos or group shots. Get up close for compelling portraits. Five photos provide a good start for a Facebook post or gallery. You can tag people in the photos so they appear on their timeline, but don't go overboard.

3. Use Twitter and hashtags often.

Rotarian Rich Lalley, who manages social media campaigns for District 6440 in suburban Chicago, explains why Twitter is absolutely essential.

"Every reporter in the world uses Twitter; they are addicted to it, and use it constantly to get story ideas," he says. "Why would you not want to use it?"

Hashtags are a way to group social media posts on Twitter, Instagram, Google+, Pinterest, Facebook, and other social networking platforms. A hashtag is created by putting "#" in front of a word.

Using one or two hashtags per post makes your posts visible to anyone who shares your interest. For example, Rotary is using #ricon15 to amplify our message and generate enthusiasm about the Rotary International Convention in São Paulo in 2015. And the hashtags #endpolio and #WorldPolioDay built excitement about polio eradication and Rotary's live-streamed event on World Polio Day, 24 October.

4. Get all members involved in social media.

Social media works as a public relations tool because likes, shares, and comments spread the original message beyond the creator's immediate network and into the networks of friend's friends. It's much like a stone skipping across a pond: Each bounce produces new ripples. Every member needs to play a role in sharing posts.

5. Spend a little money on a Facebook ad.

Facebook has made changes over the years that limit the number of people who automatically see your posts. In the past, Lalley explains, posts would be seen by 60 to 80 percent of the people in your network. "Today, you are lucky if 8 percent of your network sees any of your posts," he says.

The good news, Lalley says, is that an investment of as little as \$25 to \$50 can boost your reach significantly. For example, if your club is planning a 5K race, you can take out an ad that targets people who live a certain distance from your community and who are runners, and reach several thousand people.

Once you have set up account information with Facebook, you need only click on the Boost Post button that appears on many of your posts to create an ad.

"If you want people to see your post or if you want to target people who have an interest in your event, a Facebook ad is really an inexpensive way to get results" Lalley notes.

Our Rotary Foundation is endeavoring to advance this with the establishment of Rotary Peace Centers in various parts of the globe.

The Rotary Peace Centers are the premier educational program of the Foundation, and this year I am asking Rotarians to foster world understanding, goodwill, and peace by promoting and publicizing the program so its work is enhanced.

The program funds up to 100 Rotary Peace Fellowships per year, for fellows to study at one of the Foundation's specially chosen universities. Fellows can earn a master's degree in peace and conflict resolution or a related field at Duke University and University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, in the United States; University of Queensland in Australia; Uppsala University in Sweden; University of Bradford in England; and International Christian University in Japan. Additionally, our professional development certificate program in peace and conflict resolution is offered through Chulalongkorn University in Thailand.

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



Malala Yousafzai, the Pakistani teenager shot in the head for speaking out against the Taliban in support of girls' education, has been awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for 2014.

Yousafzai, whose father is a Rotarian, shares the prize with Kailash Satyarthi, a native of India who has worked to combat the exploitation of children for financial gain, according to an announcement in October from the Norwegian Nobel Committee.

In announcing the award, the committee praised Yousafzai for demonstrating that "children and young people, too, can contribute to improving their own situations." It noted that "through her heroic struggle she has become a leading spokesperson for girls' rights to education."

Yousafzai was a voracious reader and a star student at the Khushal School and College in Swat Valley when she began blogging, at the age of 15, about life in the valley and her opposition to a Taliban edict banning girls from attending school. Although she used a pseudonym, her identity was widely known, especially after she began granting TV interviews.

In October 2012, she was going home from school when a gunman barged onto her bus and shot her point-blank in the head. She was airlifted to Peshawar, where she endured a three-hour operation to remove the bullet and part of her skull. Six days later, she was flown to a hospital in Birmingham, England, that specializes in treating war casualties. Her plight became international news, and she has continued her activism since her recovery.

Yousafzai's father, Ziauddin Yousafzai, a member of the Rotary Club of Mingora Swat, has taken part in a number of the club's projects to improve the Swat Valley. He was instrumental in creating a nonprofit group called the Swat Relief Initiative, which purchased new equipment for a local hospital, built a water filtration plant, and established a mobile prosthesis clinic for people who had lost limbs to bombs.

Now in Birmingham, he serves as an adviser to former UK Prime Minister Gordon Brown, a UN special envoy for global education.

Malala Yousafzai's story was featured in the January issue of The Rotarian.

"I am very proud of the Interact Club at Elsie Allen. 1993 was the year it started, with Carnell Edwards; he had been the superintendent of a Stockton School District, and they had Interact there – he was a firm believer, and helped us establish the club; and now, where Ross Andress has taken it, is phenomenal."




