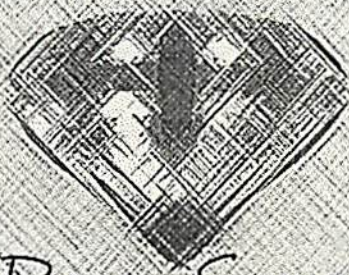

Cecil Humes and John Oakley on Taxes - October 16

No doubt you've heard something about the Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997. For a new tax law, it's received quite an extensive amount of media coverage. The new law is significant not only for the size of the tax cuts it provides, but also for its wide impact. Indeed, there's something in it for almost everyone. But in addition to over \$150 billion in tax cuts over five years, the new law raises more than \$56 billion through tax hikes. It also contains over 100 "simplification" and "miscellaneous" provisions.

Naturally, our speakers can't explain everything about the new law. In fact, their hope is to only summarize the more significant changes. Altogether there are 285 new sections to the Internal Revenue Code, along with 824 Code amendments. Some are effective immediately, some are effective retroactively, and some won't be effective for one, two, three or more years. Some present opportunities to take advantage of, others are a trap for the unwary. Please enjoy the program. *John Jones*

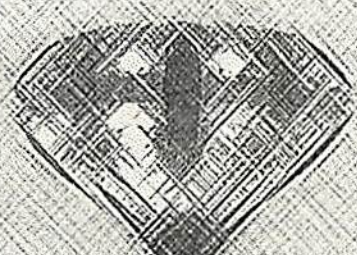

Our program will be presented by Steve Miksis, CPA and manager with Linkenheimer LLP CPA's and Advisors. Steve's presentation will be on "KidAccounts", which is a five-week program designed to teach elementary age school children basic money management concepts. The program is very interactive, with materials written to encourage children to talk about their ideas about money. Linkenheimer LLP are the authors and publishers of the workbook and program. A firm member attends the classroom on the first, third and fifth weeks, and the teacher is left with materials for follow up on weeks two and four. The follow up materials were written with the help of elementary school teachers, so they are in a format that is age appropriate, and are challenging and fun.

Each child gets a copy of the program book called Trackin' My Money with Lester Lynx. The book was designed to serve as both teaching tool and something the children can use to incorporate the program into real life. There is no charge to the kids or schools for the program. Linkenheimer has presented this program to nine elementary school classes and is scheduled for another 26 classroom presentations this fall.

October is Vocational Service month. What a great way for us to witness how the expertise learned in a profession can be transferred to the kids of our community. October 23 is also Bring a Friend to Rotary day. Consider bringing a child (say ages 8 to 12) and also an adult friend who might be interested in Rotary.

As each goose flaps its wings, it creates an "uplift" for the bird following. By flying in a "V" formation, the whole flock adds 71% more flying range than if each bird flew alone.

Lesson: People who share a common direction and sense of community can get where they are going quicker and easier because they are traveling on the thrust of one another.

Whenever a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and the resistance of trying to fly alone and quickly gets back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the birds immediately in front. *Lesson: if we have as much sense as a goose, we will join in formations with those who are headed where we want to go.*

When the lead goose gets tired, it rotates back into the formation and another goose flies at the point position. *Lesson: It pays to take turns doing the hard tasks and sharing leadership - with people, as with geese - interdependent with one another.*

The geese in formation honk from behind to encourage those up front to keep up their speed. *Lesson: We need to make sure our honking from behind is encouraging - not something less helpful.*

When a goose gets sick or wounded or shot down, two geese drop out of formation and follow their fellow member down to help and provide protection. They stay with this member of the flock until he or she either is able to fly again or dies. Then they launch out on their own, with another formation, or to catch up with their own flock. *Lesson: If we have as much sense as the geese, we'll stand by one another like they do.*
