

Club in Southern California, USA, focuses on the environment



A member of the Rotary Club of Morro Bay Eco in California, USA, sets up a bin used to create compost tea for three public golf courses in San Luis Obispo. The composted food waste, landscape byproducts, and grass clipping are used instead of chemical fertilizers.

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The club has partnered with an environmental nonprofit agency and the County of San Luis Obispo to compost grass clippings, landscape byproducts, and concession food waste at three public golf courses, turning them into organic fertilizer for the courses.

Club members have also taken the "zero-waste" strategy to community events, where they recycle and compost virtually all the trash generated while educating the public about waste reduction. On another project, club members volunteered to plant native species and improve erosion control around a major creek bed.

John Weiss, president of the club, said its focus on the environment has helped with recruitment, attracting members who would not have been interested in a more traditional format.

"We're appealing to people who are excited about what we are doing," Weiss says. "They are great eco-Rotarians, but they are not people who would join any club. They want to do things, work on projects."

The Morro Bay Eco club received its charter on 16 June.

Other eco-clubs

Weiss, a Rotarian for eight years, was tapped last year by Deepa Willingham, 2010-11 governor of District 5240, to serve as the district's club extension chair, with the mission of chartering at least one new club focused on the environment.

In his research, Weiss read about <u>two other eco-clubs</u> on the RI website and called Kay Biga, cofounder of the Rotary Club of Duluth Superior Eco, Minnesota, for advice.

Biga's club, chartered in November 2008, has 45 members. It attracts many young professionals, including women, with a focus on environmental service projects, flexible late-afternoon meetings, popular social events, and an affordable dues structure.

"We schedule at least one, and sometimes two or three, service projects a month," says Biga. "We also have a monthly Fun Foods Night, where one of the club members hosts a dinner at home. This has been a terrific monthly fellowship opportunity."

Weiss's club adopted similar ideas, forgoing meals at meetings to keep costs down, emphasizing service projects, and holding only two official meetings a month, limited to one hour. But his club takes a slightly different approach because of its different demographic makeup.

"We have members in their 50s and 60s, and some who are retired. It's not just a youth thing," he says. "The common bond is a desire to get in there and actually do hands-on service."

Weiss's advice to other clubs includes being sensitive to the desires of prospective members.

"The underlying current for all Rotary clubs is Service Above Self," he says. "But how you define service is going to vary for different people. You have to listen and adapt."

Rotarians in other districts also have been expanding Rotary by chartering new clubs:

- The Rotary Club of Juba, South Sudan, chartered in March 2010, recently partnered with the Rotary Club of Bideford Bridge, Devon, England, on a Rotary Foundation Matching Grant project to donate US\$15,000 in anesthesia equipment to a teaching hospital in Juba. The club also supports a local orphanage.
- The Rotary E-Club of District 3170, Goa, India, became one of the newest additions to the e-club fold in April, with 25 charter members. With members from Australia, Bulgaria, Canada, China, India, Malaysia, Norway, South Africa, and the United States, the club meets both online and in person. A recent tree-planting project encouraged members to plant a tree in their neighborhood during the first two weeks of July.
- The Rotary Club of Berlin International, chartered in 2009, is the first club in Germany to target the large international community in the nation's capital. The club, with 31 members from 14 countries, conducts its meetings in English. Among its fundraisers, it organized a campaign in Germany encouraging people to donate in support of polio eradication by texting "POLIO."
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








RI President's Message

My dear brothers and sisters in Rotary,

We have a color for the 2011-12 Rotary year, and that color is green. Why green? Because green is the color of spring, of new life, of bright

leaves bursting forth from spreading branches. And there is no doubt that it is time to "green" Rotary – to lift our deepening pallor of gray and replace it with brighter shades of green.

Overall, in Rotary, only 11 percent of our members are under the age of 40, while 68 percent are over 50 and 39 percent are over 60. It's not too hard to see where this will lead us in 10, 20, and 30 years down the line, if we don't do something about it now. It is not enough to simply bring in new members. We need to bring in younger members, who will breathe new life and new vigor into our organization.

How can we be more attractive to younger members, who are so different in so many ways from the young professionals of a generation or two ago? We have to come to them where they are – and for most young people, where they are is on the Internet, on Facebook, on Twitter and e-mail, and on their smartphones. A club that doesn't have a presence on the Internet simply doesn't exist as far as they are concerned. A club's website is its public face – and it has to be a good one.

More than anything, I believe we need to bring back the idea of the family of Rotary. We need to look at all of Rotary as one family: Rotarians, their families, and also Rotaractors, Interactors, Youth Exchange students and alumni, Foundation alumni, and so on. And we need to consider retention as an idea that applies not just to Rotarians, but to the entire family of Rotary.

Too often, we look outward to find new members, and we do not see our own young generation, waiting to be called upon. We must look to them to find the capable and enthusiastic new members who will be the club presidents, the district governors, and the RI senior leaders of tomorrow.

We owe it to our Rotary family – past, present, and future – to make sure that our generation of Rotarians is not the last. We must, in a very real sense, reach within – to embrace our Rotary family, so that we can better embrace all of humanity.

Message from Foundation Trustee Chair

What will be your legacy?

September 2011





Years ago, during a visit to New York City , I saw a T-shirt that said, "He who dies with the most wins." It seemed funny at the time, but we all read the stories of people who judge their success by their wealth. The problem is that material possessions often do not bring happiness, for there is always someone who has more.

Most of us, however, want our life to be measured by what we have done. Many Rotarians have expressed their appreciation of fellow Rotarians' service by promising a contribution to our Rotary Foundation that will live on after them. The earnings from their gifts go to our Annual Programs Fund year after year. What better legacy to the world?

By earlier this year, we had almost 8,000 commitments to the Bequest

Society. These represented an expected value of about US\$338 million, a significant share of the almost \$700 million in assets and expectancies in our Permanent Fund.

The first Australian RI president, Angus S. Mitchell (1948-49), foretold the creation of the Permanent Fund in 1992, in a speech that ended with this story from the Talmud: Choni Hama'agel saw an old man planting a carob tree and asked when he thought the tree would bear fruit. "After 70 years" was the reply. "What!" said Choni. "Do you expect to live 70 years and eat the fruit of your labor?" "I did not find the world desolate when I entered it," said the old man. "And as my fathers planted for me before I was born, so I plant for those who will come after me."

We each have that same opportunity by making a bequest to our Rotary Foundation.



RI General Secretary John Hewko meets with Bill Gates on polio eradication

General Secretary and CEO of Rotary International John Hewko met with Bill Gates, cochair of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, 7 September in Seattle, Washington, USA, to discuss moving forward together to eradicate polio and continuing to energize Rotarians to see the eradication effort through to the finish.

"The meetings at the Gates Foundation were very productive," Hewko says. "Bill Gates recognized the enormous contribution of Rotary to the cause of polio eradication and the tremendous capacity of Rotarians to continue the fight. We identified several concrete opportunities to work even more closely together to achieve our mutual goal of a polio-free world."

Polio eradication is within reach. The Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) has made significant steps forward since the launch last year of its new strategic plan and the bivalent oral polio vaccine. Among the four polio-endemic countries, India has reported only one case of the disease so far this year. A recent report by the GPEI Independent Monitoring Board, while noting some concerns in meeting GPEI goals, nevertheless stated that India is "on track to interrupt transmission this year."

Polio cases worldwide decreased almost 50 percent during the first six months of 2011, compared with the same period in 2010.

Rotarians are raising funds for polio eradication as part of Rotary's US\$200 Million Challenge to match \$355 million in grants from the Gates Foundation. The resulting \$555 million will support immunization campaigns in developing countries where polio continues to infect and

paralyze children, robbing them of their futures and compounding the hardships faced by their families.

As long as polio threatens even one child anywhere in the world, children everywhere remain at risk.

Rotarians can help end the disease by providing funding and reminding their communities and government leaders that polio still exists and causes tremendous suffering.





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Continuing an enlightening theme of wellness resources in Sonoma County, Viveka Rydell, Esq., CEO of Pediatric Dental Institute (PDI) informed members and guests of the outstanding, nationally recognized efforts PDI makes toward corrective and preventive oral health.

Envisioned in 2002 as a widespread unmet need in childhood medical care, the organizational work to establish the Institute t ook four years to complete before clinical appointments were scheduled. A collaborative, integrative initiative created by former Kaiser Pediatrician Kathy Foster, and supported by county health official Mark Netherda, PDI took form from California's First Five in Sonoma County and partnered with St. Joseph's Health System mobile dental clinic to serve expanding pediatric oral hygiene demand which could not be accommodated within the MediCal benefit structure.

Today the unmet needs continue and new partners such as Santa Rosa Junior College' Dental Hygiene Clinic share in providing services to under served children. Sunrise Rotary too is participating in the process of offering the ounce of prevention to prevent the high cost of preventable oral/dental health problems. For each \$1 invested in early care and education, upwards of \$32 are saved in subsequent years.

Much remains to be accomplished: Additional Hygienists, community and


patient education, legislative reform to name a few. It is clear that early, integrative intervention is the effective approach. PDI is a leader in creating and providing such a model. Next time you brush and floss, thank PDI for instilling similar habits before baby teeth are "carried" away!

Historic Moments: Rotary and Boys' Week

In September, Rotary celebrates New Generations Month, reminding clubs of the ongoing need to provide positive influences for youth and equip tomorrow's leaders.

The history of Rotary's work with youth dates back to the 1920s, when many clubs took part in an international event known as Boys' Week.

The first Boys' Week was held in New York City in May 1920 by the Rotary Club of New York and other local organizations. The event was part of an effort to promote youth development in the areas of education, citizenship, health and hygiene, and vocation.

New York club members reported on the success of Boys' Week at the

1920 Rotary convention, hoping that it would become part of the Boys' Work program, which Rotary had established several years earlier with the creation of the Committee on Work among the Boys (later known as the Boys' Work Committee). The program encouraged Rotary clubs to work with other community initiatives and organizations to counter juvenile delinquency, truancy, and poor physical health, with the goal of developing good citizens.

Boys' Week events quickly spread throughout the world. By the mid-1920s, they were being held in almost 600 locations across 25 countries. In 1928, the number of participating cities and towns had grown to about 3,000.

The target audience also grew rapidly. Girls rode on the float sponsored by the Rotary Club of Vicksburg, Mississippi, in a 1924 <u>Loyalty Day</u> parade held in conjunction with Boys' Week.

By the late 1920s, the United States had established a National Boys' Week Committee, in which Rotary participated. Rotary clubs were encouraged to support their local Boys' Week events as a way to achieve the goals of the Boys' Work program.

In 1934, Boys' Week became known as Youth Week, and in 1936, Boys and Girls' Week.

The RI Board of Directors voted to discontinue Rotary's official sponsorship of Boys and Girls' Week in 1956 in order to support new youth efforts, but it encouraged clubs to continue participating in local youth service initiatives.

Rotary went on to create other programs for young people in the following decades, including <u>Interact</u>, <u>Rotaract</u>, and <u>Rotary Youth Exchange</u>.

In 2010, New Generations Service became Rotary's fifth Avenue of Service. Rotarians recognize the positive change that youth and young adults implement through leadership development activities, community and international service projects, and exchange programs that enrich and foster world peace and cultural understanding.



Young Rotarian advocates a new approach to Rotary

Katie Ischkin, past president and founder of the Rotary Club of South Metro Minneapolis Evenings, Minnesota, USA, believes in a new approach to Rotary.

Her Rotary club, chartered in June 2010, has already grown to more than two dozen members, including 12 new Rotarians who were recruited in a three-month period. The club has signed up for its first Matching Grant and international service project and has participated in more than 10 community service or hands-on volunteer efforts.

Ischkin recently shared her ideas on how to attract young professionals with RI. As a "proud, young, female Rotarian," she is among only 2 percent of club members worldwide under the age of 30, and only 11 percent under 40.

"We need to focus on generating interest in young people for the future success of Rotary," she said. "We are faced today with the need to grow not just for the sake of numbers but to create strong, young, global leaders who are going to help continue the success of the Rotary organization."

Ischkin advocates a new outlook on membership and a different approach to club structure. As a change management consultant, she said she understands people's fear of change. But she stressed that her approach doesn't mean altering the core pieces of the organization or losing what Rotarians hold dear.

"What does change are what I call surface-level elements," she said. "The pieces that individual clubs have the power to shift and redesign, such as meeting times and locations, program structures, club member involvement, and committee formats."

Manage expectations

Ischkin's club meets in the evening and lowers costs by not having meals. And it doesn't hold a traditional meeting every week: The third meeting of the month is a happy hour/networking event at different locations in the city, and the fourth meeting is a hands-on volunteering opportunity.

"We've also accepted that, with a younger membership, we have a higher rate of turnover, mainly because some members aren't quite settled on the city or their career," she says. "We can't be afraid of inviting members who may leave."

Ischkin added that it's important to understand the mindset of the new generation and manage expectations accordingly. Younger people are "always on the go and truly connected," she explained, whether it's through social networking, text messaging, or other means. They face a lot of pressure to be involved in multiple endeavors and to balance work and personal life. As a result, they may be "on call" with their careers, but they are no less dedicated to service.

"When you're trying to recruit younger members or even sponsor and start a New Generations Rotary club, take time with your club and committee to outline what your expectations are and whether they will align with the younger generation you are trying to attract and work with," she said. "Not every Rotary club can quickly shift gears to attract younger members; it takes time and baby steps."

But for many clubs, she said, "all it takes is opening up your minds and starting to think differently about the future of your club's membership."





Voice of change



When Jessica Xavier embarked on a singing career a few years back, one of her first gigs was a Rotary club Christmas concert. She recorded a hit song and appeared on magazine covers and on TV, but then she gave it all up.

"I realized that singing isn't my passion," she says. "Working with kids has always been my dream."

Xavier recently spent a month volunteering in the village of Yupukari, where a nonprofit called Rupununi Learners has set up schools, a cultural center, and a research station devoted to the endangered black caiman, a relative of the alligator. Xavier taught classes, helped write grant proposals, and worked in the library.

Back in Guyana's capital, Georgetown, she runs her own marketing company. Her club is filled with young Rotarians, she says, "and we're one of the most active in terms of outreach."

The club holds an annual career fair for teenagers and organizes two-week medical missions to indigenous communities to screen for diseases such as HIV, cervical cancer, and diabetes. So, even though she still gets stopped on the street and occasionally hears her voice on the radio, Xavier is focusing on others. "Volunteering is an amazing thing," she says. "It's nice to know I can do more than just work for myself."
