

Hunger relief, not food per se is the mission of The Redwood Empire Food Bank, REFB. In 2008, during the commencement of the recent economic downturn, the hunger of 11,000 Sonoma County residents was becoming more and more apparent as the nearly one in six county residents currently receiving relief. Today 78,000 people receive nourishment from REFB: Children, adults, breakfast, lunch and dinners are provided. Some meals are prepared for special diets such as anti-anemia and diabetic considerations

REFB is a member of Feeding America, a cooperative of 204 Food Banks across the United States. These agencies share resources, and partner to distribute inventories where needed the most.



With 49 employees and 3,500 volunteers, Redwood Empire Food Bank eases hunger pains with fifteen million pounds of foodstuffs annually. Individuals, community kitchens, FISH, Boys & Girls Clubs are just a few of the recipients. People, working hard to make ends meet are provided a bridge, helping eliminate hunger, and preserve their health and self respect.

**POLIO'S RETREAT** 



Months of physical therapy have allowed Samir to keep active with his siblings. He loves to play outside, and his favorite game is chase. Since 1995, when India held its first national polio immunization campaign, 2.3 million vaccinators have visited 209 million households to immunize 170 million children every year. Their efforts will help provide a polio-free future for generations to come throughout Southeast Asia.

As photojournalist Allison Kwesell walks through the narrow streets of an Indian village, familiarity sets in. She visited here four years ago, when she first met Samir and his family. He was two years old then and had recently contracted polio.

Kwesell approaches the front porch of a home when she hears an older woman yelling "Samir! Samir!" She runs toward the voice, wondering if she'll recognize the boy. She sees six children playing chase on the dry earth, the dirt forming clouds around their feet. From afar she notices a young boy, not unlike the other barefoot children in the backyard overlooking patches of farmland, except for his slight limp. She moves closer and the children pause, half encircled around the boy. Kwesell recognizes him by his eyes. Samir is six now, and with the help of physical therapy, he can run and play with the rest of the children in his village on the outskirts of Moradabad.

Samir is one of the last children in India to contract polio. In March 2014, the World Health Organization announced that its Southeast Asia region is officially polio-free. The certification came on the heels of India's successful fight against the disease: It celebrated three years without polio in January.

The nation's achievement is the result of a grueling 36-year battle that sent millions of health workers down alleys, up mountains, and across deserts to reach every child in this sprawling country. Not long ago, India had more cases of polio than any other nation in the world. This milestone means that 80 percent of the population worldwide lives without fear of the paralyzing disease.

Samir's mother, Fahmida, has seven children now. She worries about Samir, who will have to cross a busy road on his way to school when he starts later this year. He sometimes falls down when running too fast, but he always gets right back up. Samir's doctor believes that his case was less severe than it could have been because earlier vaccinations against polio helped him build partial immunity. Fahmida is hopeful for his future; Samir wants to be a doctor when he grows up.

Eric is no newcomer to SOS: His affiliation began in 1996 as an Intern while in Graduate Studies at Sonoma State University. He was a protégée of Dr. Mark Doolittle, then Director of Save Our Students. Eric went on to serve on the organization's Board of Directors. His current tenure as succeeding Director came after receiving a phone call in Colombia where he was serving as an administrator for an international school.

Save Our Students Core Values include Social Justice,
Sustainability and a Fair Living Wage. Social Justice asserts
universal access to quality Mental Health Services.
Sustainability plans for ongoing accountability structures to
move the organization into the future. A Fair Living Wage
supports the right of Interns to earn as they learn, and not be
expected to volunteer their time for nearly two years.

Challenges facing Eric include implementation of a more oriented Business Model for operations, developing

documentation of procedures and fund raising/supporters databases and continuing the many critical life-supporting services currently in effect. These include alternative school counseling, special cooperation with Sonoma County Sheriff's Department in responding to calls involving psychiatrically disturbed citizens. Central to Eric's Transition Plan is that closure is not an option. With 40 clients awaiting an appointment opening in the free of fee schedule, Eric sees the ongoing need for community services.

Today Sunrise Rotary presented Eric a total of \$5,000 for SOS Counseling to assist in meeting unmet counseling funding. To learn more of SOS, visit their website at <a href="https://www.soscounseling.org">www.soscounseling.org</a>. SOS operates services in Marin & Sonoma County.

#### GIVING VOICE TO CHILDREN WHO MIGHT OTHERWISE LIVE IN A SILENT WORLD



The Rotary Club of Ulaanbaatar Peace Avenue, Mongolia, has raised more than \$10,000 to outfit two Mongolian hospitals with screening devices to test newborns' hearing.

Misheelt Batjargal and her fellow club members are giving a voice to infants and toddlers in Mongolia who would otherwise live in a silent world.

As part of a large-scale community project, the Rotary Club of Ulaanbaatar Peace Avenue, Mongolia, is equipping hospitals with screening devices to test newborns' hearing. Batjargal, an ear, nose, and throat physician, says screening to detect hearing loss is not routine nationwide in Mongolia. She estimates that more than 200 hundred children in the country lose their hearing each year.

But Batjargal believes this is preventable. Early screenings are crucial for infants because, left undiagnosed, hearing impairment can impede children's development in speech, language, and cognition.

"If we can detect hearing loss before babies turn six months old, we can fit them with hearing aids or cochlear implants and give them good early intervention programs that will allow them to communicate normally at school and with friends," says Batjargal, who noted that only one hospital in Mongolia conducted screenings before club members launched the project in 2013. "Our club is helping prevent hearing-impaired babies from growing up in a world of isolation."

The club has held two fundraisers since January, including a performance of the ballet "Swan Lake." They raised more than \$10,000 -- enough to outfit two hospitals with screening devices. The Ministry of Health worked with the club on both events, which indicates the issue's importance for Mongolia, says Enkhtur Sodnomtseren, chair of the club's service committee.

"Hearing disability has been largely ignored by the government, as it is seen as low-priority in the overall list of pressing health issues," says Sodnomtseren. "It's also been under the radar of most charity and grant organizations. We as a club want to fill this gap. We can see that with a little extra effort and time, we can dramatically improve the quality of life, for not only the affected babies, but their families as well."

Sodnomtseren says that the club, with the cooperation of the Ministry of Health, can expand the project. It hopes to raise enough funds to supply every maternity ward with screening devices and training over the next few years. More than 78,000 infants will be tested each year, he estimates.

Batjargal, who plans to train other medical practitioners in how to use the screening devices, says this project exemplifies the positive change Rotary can make.

"Instead of waiting for the government to address this problem, our Rotary club has decided to solve it," says Batjargal. "We're making a major contribution to society. This is simply what we do."

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

#### Mitch Stogner, NCRA and Jake Park, NWP Co. - Freight Rail Service

Mitch Stogner has more than 30 years of public sector experience working at the local, state, and federal levels of government, with an emphasis on public and private investment in transportation projects.

From 1978-1982 he worked at the State Capitol in Sacramento as Chief-of-Staff to Assemblyman Doug Bosco, advancing legislation in support of North Coast transportation projects.

From 1983-1991 he served in Washington, DC as Chief-of-Staff for Congressman Doug Bosco, and as Staff Professional on the House Public Works and Transportation Committee. During this period (1986) he worked successfully with Rep. Bosco on federal legislation to preserve the Northwestern Pacific (NWP) rail corridor from San Rafael to Eureka.

From 1991-2003, Mitch was the Director of Government Affairs for the Bay Area Rapid Transit District (BART) responsible for all lobbying activities related to the extension of BART Service from Daly City to San Francisco International Airport (SFO).

For the last 11 years, Mitch has served as the Executive Director of the North Coast Railroad Authority (NCRA) responsible for an administrative and engineering staff dedicated to the restoration of rail service from Napa County to Windsor (62 miles), and maintenance of the NWP line from Windsor North along 101 to Eureka. With over \$60 mil. in capital repairs complete, a contract railroad operator, NWP Co., resumed freight service on this 62 mile stretch of track in July 2011.

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Imagine a community where the residents are all free to plant, grow, harvest, and eat healthy food whenever they want without having to pay for it.

Sound too good to be true?

That's exactly what residents of more than 20 cities and towns in France are doing through a project called Potalib. Launched by the Rotaract Club of Versailles, Potalib was inspired by the Incredible Edible project, an international food-sharing movement founded by Nick Green in England. The Rotaract members obtained Green's permission to apply the concept in France, changing the name to "Potalib," a contraction of "potager libre" (free vegetable garden).

The club registered the Potalib name, created a brand, and now sells the project as a kit to French institutions, local communities, and corporations. The materials include seeds for as many as 18 kinds of vegetables, information on how to cultivate them, and 12 wooden bins, each about a cubic meter in size and filled with around 270 kilograms of soil. In cities where the gardens are planted, the club sponsors a festive opening-day ceremony, featuring a free meal cooked by club members and a professional chef.

"The goal is quite simple: To give everyone, from the wealthiest to the poorest, the opportunity to eat quality vegetables," says Club President Thibaut Mathieu.

"Everyone" includes parents who want to teach their children "that fries do not grow in the ground," joke the project's supporters. According to a recent survey, one in four children in France doesn't know that fries come from potatoes.

Potalib also offers the homeless a reliable source of free healthy food.

Mathieu says that people readily take responsibility for maintaining the vegetable gardens and no instances of theft, hoarding, or vandalism have been reported. Instead, Potalib is bringing communities closer together.

"I was almost afraid to take some vegetables at first," says Nathalie from Plaisir, a suburb of Paris. "But now I do it with great pleasure. I made new friends there. We plant seeds and we have a good time!"

Each Potalib package costs more than \$15,000. Mathieu says that would be a high price for one person to pay, but not for a town, government department, or a company. The money is paid directly to the club, which then pays the suppliers, "who have become genuine and trusted partners," he says.

Potalib is also good for local business. If the community isn't able to fund the entire project, the club contacts companies in the area. Mathieu says a local company can finance one or several bins in its city, and in doing so, improve its image by showing the public that it cares.

Outside of France, Rotaract clubs in Belgium, Canada, and Germany have inquired about duplicating the project.

"We receive, on average, four new applications from cities per week," says Mathieu, adding that the Versailles club is planning to create a separate Potalib website soon.

The Versailles Rotaractors started Potalib in 2012, around the time they were forming their club, which was chartered in 2013. The project has not only benefited an increasing number of communities, it's also helped to expand the club's membership, which has mushroomed from 16 members to 60.

Mathieu credits the project's success to the Rotaract club's sponsors, the Rotary Club of Versailles. "They have always given us good counseling. Without 'our' Rotarians, we would not be here today," says Mathieu.

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

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"I've been working on the railroad, all the live-long day." Jake Park could actually sing this song. He works on a railroad the runs freight cars from Lombard to Novato, and will someday travel all the way to Willits, using restored tracks that are owned and shared by SMART -- Sonoma Marin Area Rail Transit. Mitch Stogner, executive director of the NCRA -- North Coast Railroad Authority -- the company that employs Park and five other staff members, reports that the while federal tax dollars helped repair their tracks, the company now uses no tax dollars to run trains that will eventually carry both freight and passengers through Marin, Sonoma and Mendocino counties.

Park reports that rail transit is beneficial for energy, the environment and the economy. Although the train uses trucks to load and unload cargo, each loaded freight car takes up to four long haul trucks off our highways. Two engineers travel aboard each train, pulling up to 20 cars and traveling at 25 to 45 miles per hour. One bridge operator chases trains that cross bridges, including Haystack Bridge in Petaluma. Eight current customers include Laganitas Brewing Company, using refrigerated cars to transport beer. The company looks forward to serving the wine industry, with insulated as well as refrigerated cars, as well as many other companies and passengers in the near future.

Motivational speaker and performer Amanda Wirtz, charter president of the United Services Rotary Club on Facebook, discusses why Rotary fulfills her desire to build a hope and a future for others, and how it is a gold mine of opportunity for those desiring to change the world.

When a life-threatening illness stripped away many of her professional ambitions, Amanda Wirtz, a former U.S. Navy code breaker and professional violinist, turned to humanitarian service and Facebook to give her life new purpose.

Wirtz was in her twenties and pursuing a career as a fitness trainer when a sharp pain in her abdomen sent her to the emergency room. Expecting something manageable like appendicitis, she instead found herself facing a rare tumor disorder that required her to undergo 30 surgeries over the next several years.

Forced to rethink her life plans, Wirtz began focusing on how to help others, a quest that led her to Rotary.

"I met an older man with a Rotary pin," Wirtz recalls, "and I said, 'I love Rotary.' Ten years earlier as a Rotary Youth Exchange student, Rotary had helped build a hope and a future for me. Now, I found that through Rotary I could build hope and a future for others. And doing that, I found that I actually received it myself."

Wirtz launched the world's first Facebook-based Rotary club last year, United Services Rotary, after being approached by Rotary leaders who were seeking ways to make membership more convenient for U.S. military personnel. Their need to travel and relocate frequently can make it difficult for members of the military to commit to the weekly attendance that most Rotary clubs require. The leaders came to Wirtz because of her passion for service and her military background.

The club differs from a traditional Rotary club in that members log in to Facebook at any time during the week to view a high-definition video that reproduces many of the elements of a typical meeting: The Four-Way Test, sharing of Rotary moments, announcements, and a presentation by a main speaker. If there hasn't been time to record an original program, the weekly presentation may be a TED talk or other video on a Rotary-related topic that's available online. Members keep in touch through Facebook updates and by posting on each other's timelines.

Wirtz admits that meeting online comes with some drawbacks.

"There is nothing like being in the same room with another person. I don't think anything can replace one-on-one interaction," she concedes. "So it's, 'How can I get a sense of you truly to have the feeling of real fellowship in a remote location?' And honestly, that's something we are continuing to work on."

But she feels social media is too big a phenomenon for Rotary not to embrace it.

"I see a lot of missed opportunities, and my pain reminds me that time is short," Wirtz says. "Social media is a powerful tool. But it is more about embracing whatever strategy brings innovation, opportunity, and change. If we are to do anything about the mounting problems in the world, and the problems within Rotary regarding keeping members, we need to do whatever it takes to fully engage our evolution."

How Wirtz brought the idea to life

Wirtz used focus groups on military bases to discover what people would want in an online meeting. They didn't want to read a lot of text, they wanted to communicate very quickly, and they didn't want to go to a lot of places to do that.

On all counts, a Facebook platform seemed to fit the bill. It was convenient: Members can sign in to Facebook from anywhere in the world and stay connected without having to attend an in-person meeting in a set location every week. It cost nothing to set up. And because there's no meal, the club can keep expenses down.

Wirtz said she expanded the membership target beyond the U.S. military because she wanted to have as big an impact as possible and promote peace among military personnel everywhere. Through the focus groups and by promoting the idea heavily on social media, she assembled a core of members in and around San Diego, California, USA. Members in other countries, including Afghanistan, Germany, and Japan, signed up as they learned about it. Though military personnel were the initial focus, she notes that membership is open to anyone who shares the club's vision of building hope through peace.

Service its own reward

Wirtz's quest to help others has meant learning new skills. After working with an exercise physiologist to manage her pain, she enrolled at the University of Illinois to earn a degree in health education and graduated with top honors. She followed that

with an advanced degree at the University of California, Santa Barbara. A motivational speaker, Wirtz now shares her story with audiences around the U.S., combining her new life philosophy with her other passion, playing the violin.

Before forming the Facebook club, Wirtz had already taken part in a trip to South America to help orphans find homes. She also participated in projects to rehabilitate a homeless shelter and distribute backpacks to low-income families.

"When I hear our motto Service Above Self, I am reminded of the words of Mahatma Gandhi, who said, 'the best way to find yourself is to lose yourself in the service of others.' I feel passionately that by serving we answer the most important question -- and that is, Who do we want to be?"

In its first year, United Services Rotary received a grant to build a memorial wall at U.S. Marine Corps Base Camp Pendleton for those killed in combat. It has renovated elementary schools in San Diego and provided tsunami relief in Japan. It is also organizing a larger project that would gather Rotary members from all over southern California for an annual day of international service in Baja California, Mexico.

For other projects, members assist each other remotely.

"We have a member in Germany. If he wants to do a project for schools in Germany, I can find some way to facilitate that. Maybe some kind of exchange, maybe we get students talking to each other," Wirtz says. "It's a creative world. There are no restrictions to it."

"We are bringing social media and Rotary together in a way that has never been done before. Paul Harris said, 'This is a changing world; we must be prepared to change with it. The story of Rotary will have to be written again and again.' I think Paul Harris would have liked social media."

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

He is currently visiting clubs in Napa and Sonoma counties and is scheduled for Toronto and Siri Lanka. His mission is to inspire clubs to recruit 100,000 new members. He approaches this task as a Rotary CEO, responsible for growing his business. And, Mitra has found that everyone agrees to meet with him to discuss the universally appealing Rotary subject of community.

When Dr. Mitra took office, his club had 43 members. By publishing club meetings in the newspaper, inviting community leaders to coffee, bringing guests to meetings and personally following up with each contact, he nearly tripled the size of his club. Mitra advises carrying a membership form with you when you meet a prospect and including a stamped, return addressed envelope with each invitation. These methods are proven successful when delivered with the warm, captivating energy that Dr. Mitra demonstrates.

The 55 mile route traveled through private ranches, & back isolated country roads with spectacular scenery. Many riders carried bear spray but no sightings were reported other than one Bull Moose. No spray for me as I felt my odds with 250 riders were good!

The day was motivating, inspiring and very satisfying knowing that I raised the most amount of money ever raised by an individual rider (\$15,300) in honor of my good friend, Rotarian & fishing partner. Without the support of our club board and Rusty's friends in our club this never would have been so successful. Four months of training & asking for financial support was well worth it. ## ROTARY PEACE CENTERS SHAPE HUNDREDS OF CAREERS IN PEACE AND CONFLICT RESOLUTION



With bloody conflicts raging in the Middle East, Eastern Europe, and parts of Central Africa, the message of nonviolence and reconciliation that nations worldwide will observe on 21 September demands more urgent and collective attention.

In 2001 the United Nations designated the September date as an annual International Day of World Peace "to be observed as a day of global ceasefire and nonviolence" according to a General Assembly resolution.

The day's devotion to peace connects closely with what Rotary members have been fostering since The Rotary Foundation's mission to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace, was proclaimed in 1917.

Rotary's goal of worldwide peace and tolerance has been an unwavering pursuit: conducting global forums, hosting international peace symposiums, advancing peace through its 60-year collaboration with the UN, as well as grassroots initiatives such as the Rotarian Action Group for Peace.

But Rotary's most significant effort to wage peace is the Rotary Peace Centers program, established in 2002. Each year, the program trains some of the world's most dedicated and brightest professionals, preparing them to promote national and international cooperation and to resolve conflict. They include graduates of a two-year master's degree program and a three-month professional certificate program at Rotary's partner universities.

Today, more than 900 peace fellows are applying their expertise in various fields. They're settling border conflicts in West Africa, developing aid programs at the World Bank, drafting legislation to protect exploited children in Brazil, providing security for U.S. diplomats, and many other career paths devoted to peace.

To commemorate the International Day of World Peace, Rotary Peace Fellowships alumni share how the program has shaped their lives:
