Cork can be very technical! Fortunately for fine wines and us, local cork processor M.A. Silva Company (MAS) has the

techniques and product to produce the world's ultimate bottle sealers for the best vintners on earth.

Founded in 1971, the Portuguese founding family now owns the world's second largest wine cork manufacturing company. MAS engaged an ongoing research effort in the 1970's to enhance quality cork harvest and production. This year their operation in Santa Rosa expanded by a factor



three, from 35,000 to 110,000 square feet. Largely motivated by the need to eliminate TCA, a naturally occurring compound, trichloroanisole that imparts a musty, corkiness. Winemakers sought a cork which would protect the nuance and uniqueness of their hard earned vintage's reputation.

As if the technical processes involved in shaping cork from the raw bark material weren't sufficiently challenging, growing and harvesting the slow growing trees added significant hurdles to success: A cork tree takes 30-40 years to mature to harvest size, and then can only be peeled every 9 years. What is more, a cork tree harvester is the most highly paid skilled worker, responsible for keeping the tree healthy, far outliving the laborer, the trees have a 250 year lifespan, or nearly 20 seasons of harvest productivity.

Michael pointed out how diverse cork orchards/forests are. Second only to tropical rainforests, trees are replanted 10:1 when an old tree retires.

Quality is meticulous at MAS: Corks are traceable to their tree of origin. In order to eliminate or reduce detectability from bottles corked with a MAS cork, raw bark is boiled, dried, and treated with ozone. Depending on color preference, or printing needs, the cork may be lightened with hydrogen peroxide. TCA detection on the palate is generally above 4.0 parts per trillion. MAS has been able to establish a rate as low as .06 ppt in 2015.

What is the cost of such quality? Corks can range in cost from \$3.50 each to as little as .07. While customer listings are proprietary, Michael reports a base of 1,400 west coast clients.

In addition to their exceptionally high quality, low detection rate, MAS also contributes to an extremely green industry. The company has achieved a negative (excellent) carbon footprint record. Their plant is 100% solar powered, PGE SMART, and a Certified Green Business. They support the Redwood Empire Food Bank, Boys and Girls Club, Cal Poly San Luis Obispo's wineagriculture and Santa Rosa Junior College Shone Farm. These metrics look like a high 90's score for Sonoma County economy & environment. Cheers Michael and M.A. Silva!!





For the last 20 years, we have relentlessly beaten the drum of membership in Rotary. We set goals and launch campaigns, all focused on bringing in more and more members. And yet, our overall numbers remain the same.

The more Rotarians participate, the stronger, and more beneficial, the program will be.

Much more than another loyalty program, Rotary Global Rewards is a new way to benefit from being a Rotarian, and being part of the Rotary network. It is another way to combine business and service. And it is yet another way to add value to Rotary membership. We cannot forget that our potential members will be asking themselves, "What's in it for me?" We need to demonstrate the value of Rotary by showing that becoming a Rotarian will enrich their lives, as it has ours.

Rotary and its partners have developed an endgame for the final eradication of polio, and the plan is working successfully. No one can predict the last case of wild poliovirus, but if our progress is sustained, it may come before the end of this Rotary year. What a victory that will be for Rotary and its partners – and for the children of the world!

Rotary also has a plan to publicize and gain recognition for its vital role in the eradication of polio. Rotary started its first immunization campaign against polio in 1979, when there were still 500,000 cases of paralytic polio every year. Its success led Rotary to launch PolioPlus in 1985, with the goal of immunizing all the world's children against polio. It raised US\$247 million for that purpose in the first three years, and it then joined forces with the World Health Organization, U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and UNICEF in 1988 to eradicate polio. When the partnership was formed, a truly epic battle was joined, and Rotary was the catalyst.

Now we are in the final days of this heroic effort, and it is important for Rotary that the entire world is made aware of its contributions as a major partner in the eradication battle. Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation will do

everything they can to publicize Rotary's role, but that is only one piece of the puzzle. When Gabriela Vessani was 12 years old, her mother took her to stay with friends in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, USA, for the summer.

"I loved it, so when I heard about Rotary Youth Exchange, I knew that was something I wanted to do," says Vessani, who is an Interactor from São Paulo.

This year, Vessani participated in the program. Hosted by the Rotary Club of Waterdown, Ontario, Canada, she stayed with four families, one of which included adopted children from different parts of the world.

"They had seven children, and it was crazy for me. But I loved it," she says. "It was such a unique experience getting to know all of my host brothers and sisters, and learning about so many cultures." CHANGING LIVES

Vessani and 104 other Rotary Youth Exchange students visited Rotary World Headquarters in Evanston, Illinois, in July as part of a 31-day Discover America cross-country bus trip that was a finale to the exchange experience.

"This is the best program Rotary can be involved with, because Rotary is all about changing lives," says Vessani.

Rotary Youth Exchange has been providing intercultural exchange opportunities for secondary school students ages 15-19 since the 1920s. Students become cultural ambassadors for up to a full academic year, and the host families can help build peace and international understanding, serving one of Rotary's six areas of focus.

### **CLUB BENEFITS**

Mike Lubelfeld, an elementary school superintendent and member of the Rotary Club of Deerfield, Illinois, spent weeks making arrangements for his club to host its first exchange student in more than two decades. In August, Leo, a 17-year-old from Indonesia, was greeted at the airport by an enthusiastic welcome committee from the club.

"We have just started the process and, already, there is so much excitement," says Lubelfeld. "Working with youth of the world is one of the best ways to ensure a better future. And for our club to be able to take part in this cultural exchange is a huge opportunity that will not only benefit Leo but our members as well."

**BUILDING SELF-CONFIDENCE** 

Varda Shah's family was asked by a friend to host an exchange student two years ago in Mumbai. At first, family members were reluctant.

"We were like, he's a boy, he's German, I don't know how this is going to work," says Shah. "But we decided to take a chance, and I never would have thought I could grow so close to someone in three months. We still Skype and connect through social media constantly and are always in touch."

Shah decided she wanted her own exchange experience. She stayed with three host families in New York, learning about camping, tailgating at sports events, and ice hockey. But the biggest change was to her self-confidence.

"Before, I would never be able to make a conversation with a person I didn't know," she says. "Now, I can proudly say it isn't like that anymore. I can go up to people. I have become more open, more mature."

#### **ACCEPTING OTHERS**

Juliana Kinnl of Vienna decided to follow in her older sister's footsteps and take part in a Rotary Youth Exchange. She was hosted by two families from the Rotary Club of Newtown, Pennsylvania, and says she learned to be more accepting of other people and their differences.

"Meeting exchange students from all over the world, I have grown to accept people for who they are and not to judge them because they are different," says Kinnl. "I've also grown more confident in my own abilities and who I am."

#### **GROWING BOLDER**

Minerva Lopez Martinez of Marcia, Spain, spent her exchange in Canada, hosted by the Rotary Club of Simcoe, Ontario. She said some of her friends at home chose not to pursue an exchange because they felt they would be losing a year of schoolwork. But she has a different perspective on that.

"You have your whole life to go to school and learn. You only have one opportunity for a youth exchange," she says. "The reason I came on the exchange is that I can be shy, and I didn't want to be like that anymore. Now, I am trying new things, talking to people I don't know. It has changed me a lot."



Rotary – a 110 year-old international humanitarian service organization – was established in Chicago and moved its headquarters to Evanston in 1954. It has been at its current location, 1560 Sherman Avenue, since 1987. Members of Rotary clubs in more than 200 countries and regions passionately give their time and energy to carry out impactful and sustainable projects in the areas of peace and conflict resolution, disease prevention and treatment, water and sanitation, maternal and child health, basic education and literacy, and economic and community development.

Rotary's primary goal is the eradication of polio, an infectious but vaccine preventable disease that still threatens children in parts of the world today.

Since Rotary and its partners in the <u>Global Polio Eradication Initiative</u> launched the effort more than 30 years ago, the incidence of polio has plummeted by more than 99.9 percent, from about 350,000 cases a year to less than 400 confirmed in 2014. To date, Rotary has contributed more than \$1.4 billion and countless volunteer hours to fight polio.





David provided a crash course on recent Hong Kong political history; the 1997 transition from English colonial control to Chinese sovereignty brought hardline ideological pressures for representative government. Some constituents rejected a 90% coalition versus a demanded for 100% plan. The timeline for a 2020 target is currently stalled.

Hong Kong is viewed by many to have shot itself in the foot by discouraging tourism. Tourism largely supports the working class, and the current political priority of President Xi Jinping to purge corruption in business and government is hoped to stimulate investment. Amidst the current worldwide economic slowdown the worst since 1990, this strategy has skeptical international appeal. Chinese demand for goods has dropped, and a 5-6.8% expansion rate is forecast, vs double digits in recent years.

China's reduced growth has American soy bean farmers in North Dakota's attention: They had been exporting heavily until recently.

Currently the United States Federal Reserve has declined to raise interest rates. David believes this is a good decision. China's trend has been to manipulate their renminbi currency valuation with a fixed exchange rate rather than more universally accepted floating rates. By holding to this fixed, perceived undervalued rate, Chinese goods have an unfair competitive advantage over more expensive fluctuating currency economies.

With rising unemployment, declining retail sales and high housing costs, Hong Kong SAR (Special Administrative Area) has its

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

### removed from endemic list



The World Health Organization announced on 25 September that Nigeria is now polio-free.

The World Health Organization (WHO) announced on 25 September that Nigeria is now polio-free and has been officially removed from the list of countries where polio is endemic. It's been 14 months since any cases of polio caused by the wild virus have been detected there.

With Nigeria's historic achievement, polio remains endemic in only two countries: Afghanistan and Pakistan. That means transmission of the virus has never been stopped there.

Nigeria was the last country in Africa where polio was endemic. <u>The continent celebrated its own first full year without the disease on 11 August</u>. Once three years have passed without a case in WHO's entire African region, officials will certify polio eradicated there.

"Rotary congratulates Nigeria on its tremendous accomplishment in stopping polio," says RI President K.R. Ravindran. "On behalf of the entire Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI), we thank volunteers, health workers, and parents in communities across Nigeria for their tireless commitment to ensuring every last child is protected against this devastating disease. In the months ahead, their dedication will remain as important as ever, as we work to keep Nigeria polio-free and to eliminate polio from its final strongholds in Pakistan and Afghanistan."

Nigeria's success is the result of several sustained efforts, including domestic and international financing, the commitment of thousands of health workers, and new strategies that reached children who had not previously been immunized because of a lack of security in the country's northern states.

#### TYPE 2 POLIOVIRUS GONE FOR GOOD

In other encouraging news, an independent global health commission officially verified on 21 September that wild poliovirus type 2, one of three strains of the wild virus, has been eradicated worldwide.

President Nominee <u>Doug Shureen</u> Although the last type 2 case was detected back in 1999, the confirmation is an important milestone, as Rotary and its partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative <u>prepare to switch</u> from a form of the vaccine that targets all polio types to one that does not protect against type 2.

The announcement by the Global Commission for the Certification of Poliomyelitis Eradication confirms that only two strains of the wild poliovirus remain. Of those, type 3 wild poliovirus hasn't been detected in almost three years, and wild poliovirus type 1 is endemic only in Afghanistan and Pakistan.

### FUNDING INCREASE NEEDED TO REACH FINAL GOAL

On 25 September, the GPEI's Polio Oversight Board met to determine the next steps needed to eradicate polio. The group concluded that \$1.5 billion in new funding is needed to help Rotary and its partners end polio in the next few years. With Nigeria now polio-free, spending will focus on the most vulnerable children in Afghanistan and Pakistan, while continuing to shield millions of children already living in polio-free countries.

"With a fully funded program and global commitment to ending this disease, we have the opportunity to interrupt transmission of the wild poliovirus in Pakistan and Afghanistan in 2016, opening the door for certification of a global eradication in 2019," says Michael K. McGovern, chair of Rotary's International PolioPlus Committee. "With [Rotary members'] continued support, we will soon see our dream of a polio-free world realized."
