## Olin's Backup

They were all multiple-threat individuals, starting with Coach Kelly Stallings, who has not only been preparing for this victory for a decade, but also teaches Social Studies and AP U.S. History! Senior Emma Halverson doubles her length whenever she reaches her arms above her head, so she plays close to the basket where she blocks, rebounds, and assists. Katie Ferrell is an All-Court player who leads the team. And diminutive 5'5" **Sophie Fleites** is the stealth player who tosses disconcerting 3pointers from the outside. They've all been varsity team player since their freshman year; since they're now seniors, they've accumulated a massive depth of expertise. No wonder they're State Champions!

Their games are wildly popular on campus, with PSHS' softball team dedicating a game to the Women's Basketball team! And through all of this, they are maintaining their studies while putting out "sustained effort" on the court.

Janis Allman, no slouch in the altitude department herself, photobombed the students because she too was a Plano High basketball player around the middle of the last century. (No pejorative intended.)



Roy referred to **Howard Matson's** "attractive guest," **Heather Corton**, Executive Director of Harbor Chase, an Assisted Living Facility. Her application for membership was recently voted up by the Plano Rotary Board. Attorney Reeves was carted off to Human Resources for reeducation.

But the Club wasn't letting Sarah off so lightly; we wanted to know the college choices of the players (thus which teams to vote up during subsequent March Madness brackets). But only Emma had made a choice (*UTA*); the other two were still whittling down their options.

Frince Rick mentioned the upcoming (now past) 3/31 Four-Way Test Speech Contest at the North Texas Performing Arts facilities at IIIIOI IIII. John Caldwell told us we've been at this for 26 years and recently won district twice! He wanted to borrow the big Plano Rotary Club banner, but if he means the Four-Way Test banner, won't that be a tad intimidating? Rick thanked the many volunteers, especially John and Sara Akers.

Rick also invited us to help do our part to rid the ocean of plastic contamination by fishing it out of Spring

Creek on 4/14 from 9-11 am. Helping with the *Great American Cleanup* is our service project for April (that justified the NO MEETING ON 4/5). The City expects 1,800 participants, and Rick wants ~20 of them to be Plano Rotarians. There'll be a (no such thing as a) Free Lunch at 11:30 that day in the parking lot of the Chase Oaks Church.



He also reminded us of the 4/21 Interact Spring Fling at Shawnee Trail Complex in Frisco (sorry, Bruce). And he bade us attend the Club meeting on 4/26 to hear the State of the Club and Foundation chat. At that time, the membership will be queried on the directions they'd like to see the Club go under Carrolyn's leadership. (*Up*, perhaps?)

Finally, for the über-dedicated, he offered the 5/31-6/2 District Conference to be held in conjunction with Rotary's Peace Symposium at RI HQ in Evanston, IL.

Then, eschewing his standard "here she is, you know her, you love her" line, he introduced the force behind the **Plano Balloon Festival**, the Premier balloon event in Texas and 2<sup>nd</sup> in the nation behind Albuquerque. **Jo Via** complained she'd taught them everything they know.

She strode gleefully forward saying, "I have no notes. I don't NEED notes" to introduce her nemesis, **Olin Jaye**. She chortled that today's program would be "a blessing." (Perhaps of an opportunity to give as good as she's gotten.)

She offered us three options:

- 1. She could talk about the **Balloon Festival**.
- 2. We could all leave **NOW**.
- 3. We could sit through a program featuring Olin's expertise: eating donuts.

Jo warned us that Olin is feeling out-of-sorts, having consumed four chocolate donuts for breakfast. She was only glad it wasn't liquor. She's debating tattling to **Mimi** unless she's paid handsomely. But she did offer to sedate him before the presentation to bring him down off his "sugar high." And she warned us that, if we pulled a **Howard Shapiro**, and left early, Olin was likely to take names.



As thrilled as we were by the options, Jo's questions were rhetorical; we were condemned to **Death by Jaye**.

When Olin dragged his notebook to the podium, we feared the worst. When he explained that he DID need notes <u>and</u> his notes were full of numbers, we despaired. But then he didn't open it. Instead, he explained a short conversation he had with Rick. He didn't really need an introduction, he thought, but Rick said that Jo "jumped at the chance," and Olin thought, "Oh, .....!"

He was condemned to a Via introduction because he had "failed as a Program Chair," and had no backup plan to a speaker-less program. So Olin became Olin's backup. And here he was, preparing to speak to us on "Politics, Passion, and your Pocketbook."

"I'm not an expert on State or local politics," he lied, "I'm just a political junkie." He explained that "we DO need good local officials" if only because "Bruce needs the supervision!" But "it's hard to be in governance" because

of the piled on volunteer politicians. He promised not to deal in parties (so as not to offend the lone Democrat in the room) but rather in issues. And, "because of my Chamber connections," he will "talk about business."

Even though this is an off-cycle election year, there's "more noise in Politics" than ever, "a lot of emotion." "Primaries are just over" and "runoffs are 5/22. There are a lot of campaigns, a lot of vacant seats and [vacant?] candidates," and a "number of school board seats open."



It's true that "more Democrats turned out (to vote) in South Texas," but it's not yet "significant statewide." Those that did turn out, do not outnumber Republican voters, and some who "identify as Democrat, but vote Repub-

lican," confuse the issue. But it is undeniable that the State demographics indicate increases in Hispanics who traditionally vote Democratic. (So did all of Texas once; ask **John Connally**.) Still there are ~36K voting Democrats compared to ~67K voting Republicans.

And there's the anti-Trump rhetoric, some of it coming from Republicans. Olin, on the other hand, "dislike(s) everybody equally." Then there's the confusion of a Democrat, **Sam Johnson**, running for the seat of the retiring Republican, **Sam Johnson**, against **Lorie Burch**.

This has been the most expensive off-cycle election in Texas history, and there are runoffs (5/22) in <u>both</u> parties.

It's been "a long time since we've had serious Democratic candidates for Governor."
But Olin expects that neither Lupe Valdez (Dallas Sheriff) nor Andrew White (Mark White's son), will prevail against Greg Abbott.

(Thus far, Olin had talked <u>only</u> party politics and <u>not</u> issues, but that was about to change.)

The #1 issue is the **Pocketbook**. 60% of Texans think property taxes are too high, according to Olin. #2 is **Local Control**, and #3 is **School Finance**, which conflates with #2. #4 is **Transportation** in the face of "an antitolling mentality."

This fired up **Ric Kasmiskie** who asked about foreign countries owning our toll roads. *Cintra*, HQ'd in Madrid, is partnering on the LBJ. The (now dead) Texas Corridor was also a *Cintra* project.

"Most states can't afford big projects," so public-private investments attract conglomerates like *Cintra*. And they're only going to get larger with 1,000 new residents coming to Texas daily. "Bruce will have the largest downtown in Legacy West." Ric asked Olin to comment upon historical development issues like I-35, I-20, and I-10, but Olin demurred citing, "before my time." However he did comment upon the preponderance of Texas water lying EAST of I-35, and the political hassles that will engender.

**Larry FLASH** Flannery asked about whether **Beto** <u>O'Rourke</u> (vs. **Ted Cruz**) was Mexican. Olin said he grew up in El Paso and *Beto* is an old Spanish name.

Carrolyn commented that PISD taxes are a "complicated animal" due to Robin Hood. Solutions to Robin Hood turn out to be lies.

In contrast to Olin's "disliking" everyone, "Realtors©<sup>TM</sup> love everybody. 58% own homes," and have issues with property taxes. Realtors©<sup>TM</sup> ally with cities for "truth in taxation." Olin read an article "last week" stating that with the current growth, we will be "as big as the Chicago Metropolitan Area" soon.

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
