They are two students from Plano Senior High School's Science Research Science Fair Program. Monisha Veerapaneni is a senior this year and she is looking to go to University of Texas at Dallas. She started doing research in ninth grade, and although she knew nothing about biology or research. She had great mentors who told her that students should have the courage to question things in the world, and setup a plan to prove or disprove their ideas. It was in eleventh grade that everything kicked in for her. The mentor she was working with from UTD was doing research on zebra fish. What can you learn from zebra fish? All she knew was how to cut up fish and eat them for dinner, so she had no idea where this subject would take her. She found out that by examining the genes of these fish for genes that could cure, they found a gene that could cure 75 to 80 percent of all blood disorders and their research is proving trying to prove this to be a fact, so that the medical community can start using this therapy in a few years. They are also trying a new way to examine the

blood, which had cost over \$10,000 and by using this new method, the cost would drop to \$10 to \$15 each.

The other student was Ahneesh Mohanty, and he is a junior at Plano Senior High School.



He has been entering science fairs since he was in first grade, where his experiment was whether plants liked Gatorade. Today he is doing research on new therapies for cancer, to find new cures which are more effective. He is using a chemical that he could rattle off, but in my wildest dreams I could not dream of trying to spell it, to desensitize cancer cells so chemotherapy and radiation can effectively destroy them.

It was his original idea. When his uncle was being treated for cancer, he was reading some articles and he found an article describing how this chemical could produce hydrogen peroxide inside the cancer cells. He has just received NIH funding to test this idea on rats this summer, and he is very excited to see the results.
