### Element 119

is the logo for **nonPareil**, the nonprofit organization that tutors autistic adults and children

who've aged out of special ed classes, giving them marketable skills. Actually, it should read **11911P**, but there already is a 119th element, the seventh alkali metal (after 87Fr,



named for France). 119Uue hasn't a common name yet, so *IUPAC* uses the Greek, *UnUnEnnium*, which simple means "119." It would be the most reactive alkali metal if you could capture more than a single atom of it, but you can't; it's highly radioactive, decaying in a few microseconds. A chemist, understandably, finds this fascinating. ©

caused him infinite grief in elementary school. An only child, he hated leaving his father and friends when, in the 5<sup>th</sup> grade, his parents divorced. But he conceded that the West Coast gave him "a fresh start." He



started basketball in Wash. State, playing

UCLA where he "<u>let</u> Kareem Abdul-Jabbar block my shot so he could tell his grandchildren about it." He bounced back and forth between the States and Europe, applying to the Police Academy in Oakland, CA. But an unplanned pregnancy for his wife produced a **D.J.** "who came out bouncing" a basketball. The family now moved to Dallas to play for the Texas Titans. After a PSHS Championship, D.J. went on to A&M and is now "the #17 on the NBA draft pick for 2017."

Finally, he said he's "running for your GoTo Real Estate Agent", and you can find his ad on the back page. Oh, wait; no, it's not there. Well, he's not alone; there's a lot of "not there" going on two pages hence. But Jason's \$2 fine wasn't for a Weekly Reader no show; it was for the huckster-

MR. SPIRITWARE introduced the day's speaker.

Gary W. Moore is Co-Founder and President of nonPareil Institute. He has a Bachelor of Science degree (with Honors) from the *University of North Texas* in Computer Science. After a successful tenure at *Texas Instruments* as a programmer and technical trainer, Gary began a career as an IT consultant and educator, and has taught over 2,000 IT professionals. He then transitioned into professional services, focusing primarily on staffing IT professionals at many of the Fortune 500 companies. He has held positions in recruiting, marketing, sales and executive-level management. He has a twenty-year-old son, Andrew, who has autism. At nonPareil, Gary focuses on public relations, community engagement, education, fundraising, and admissions as well as general operations of the day-to-day business of their growing nonprofit, with operations in both Plano and Houston. Gary has overseen student growth from 8 to a current 200 students and brings a strong passion for providing long-term solutions for adults with autism.

Alan mentioned **\$10K** raised by *Plano Rotary Club* to support **nonPareil**, but Gary amended that to **\$20K** over two years.

He said that he was a proud father of a child on the autistic spectrum, and he asked how many in the room knew an autistic individual, concluding "a lot of people." It's not surprising that it's the "fastest growing condition."

**nonPareil** helps educate autistic individuals in ways that they can fathom. The name means "no parallel," appropriate for these "Special Kids." 90% can either not get nor keep jobs and end up in minimum wage positions in grocery stores. There are 10 million individuals worldwide



on the autistic spectrum. (Well, logically, 7½ billion, if the spectrum runs from zero.) And most are doing non-productive things like playing video games in their rooms. (Sainted Cottor's not about to give up his beloved 5kyrim.) But nonPareil is bringing them out of the bedroom and

into the workplace, "doing revolutionary stuff."

They opened in Plano in November of 2010 and expanded to Houston last fall. But more satisfying are the 55 cities that have requested **nonPareil** sites. It has the potential to expand globally (as diagnoses accelerate). So if it were an IPO, you'd jump on it.

The problem is the autistic "don't look different; they talk like you or me. Their deficits aren't apparent" at first glance, so job markets don't understand them. But they're not good with people; instead they relate to technology, so nonPareil plays to their strength and "teaches programming." Indeed, they've published sci-fi novels and children's fantasy books. He circulated some. So non-Pareil's job is to "find out what they're really good at," and parley that into careers.

Gary's met over 3,000 families, and many of them have "high-functioning" kids, but still 93% couldn't get a college degree. But they're crackers at apps; Gary showed us **Fast & Furriest**, an animal game app referencing the Fast & Furious franchise. The design, animation, and sound were all done by nonPareil students.

A filmmaker planning a documentary on autism interviewed **nonPareil** and decided to devote the entire project to it. He played us the film's trailer. It had comments like:

"I know I'm a little bit slow on things."

"How he thinks is not how the world is."

"The times I'm [most] proud of you are not when you're creating amazing tech, but when you are taking care of one another."

Gary pointed out that the \$2.3 billion in annual sales for the mindless Candy Crush were enough to convince buyers to shell out \$6 billion for the company! If nonPareil can create an app that addictive, and find that generous a buyer for it, then their project feeds itself.

Q&A started with an inquiry into autism's cause. Gary said it's probably not just one factor. Guesses include diet, vaccines, and genetics, what-have-you.

Someone asked if the students come with tech training. While most like computers, they haven't any programming skills in the main.



**Charles Milby** asked whether they can live on their own. Gary told him, no, but **nonPareil** is seeking long-term solutions finding housing.

John Caldwell asked how **nonPareil** was funded. He learned that tuition for students is \$10K per year! (Surely that's rich for a non-

profit. Charge the beneficiary sounds wrong.) But Gary insists that only sustains the operation. "If we create an Angry Birds, we won't need tuition." He said that nonPareil is


seeking companies to partner with them. David suggested creating an app that prevents Friends from inviting you to play Candy Crush!!

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
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
