Treasurer, brought Brian Nixon to the podium, and explained that Brian was the first recipient of Plano Rotary Club's Nursing Scholarship. Eventually our contribution will rise to an endowment of \$60,000. He wanted Brian to tell us something about himself and the Scholarship.

Brian thanked Rotary for the Scholarship and told us, "it has made my life much easier!" It permits him to send his 17-year-old son to a Cordon Bleu Academy even though Brian lost his computerprogramming job in January of '09. While he first sought a medical degree, he soon realized that his age dictated against finishing in a timely manner. So he opted for Collin College's nursing degree with an emphasis in anesthesiology instead.

John said that it was "nice to know that our money is being used for good people."



Alan Feigenbaum, fresh from his beatification, rose to inform us that the Golf Tournament netted \$50K for the Hendrick Foundation. He commended everyone for "stepping up," and said that we should be proud

of these results "in a down economy." John added his congratulations to the Club.

The misfortune came in the form of persistent heckling from LE THE BADIANT. One wonders what particular beef he had as he responded to her announcement that "spouses would cost \$25" with "I'll take one!" After cautioning us to remember to bring a new adult coat, she retired from the fray, eliciting sympathy from the speaker to follow.

Prince John mumbled something about **Jessica** creating a memorable invitation (to the Holiday Party, one supposes), and then called upon **Chuck Morgan** to introduce the speaker as follows:

Christopher Bianez began his law enforcement career with the Plano Police Department in April 1997. Over the past fourteen years, he spent about half his time on the streets as a patrol officer. He also spent three years as a Drug Abuse



Resistance Education officer, educating and inspiring youth to avoid the negative and destructive consequences of drugs and violence. The past four years he's worked in the Crime Prevention Unit.

Christopher's full-time job is safety education, helping individuals increase the safety for their families, property, neighborhoods, and workplaces. Today, Officer Bianez will share three important strategies you can use to increase your property safety.

If you want to get in touch with **Officer Bianez** (pronounced like "be honest," a refreshing motto for a cop), his phone number is 972-941-2437 and his email is simply christopherb@plano.gov. Alternately, you can navigate to www.planopolice.org that will redirect you to the PPD home page. The Crime Prevention Unit is 8<sup>th</sup> link on the left.

Officer Bianez started off with police brutality, taking out his ticket pad and asking **Mark Lewis** what kind of car he drove. Having apparently been pulled over enough times by Christopher, Mark replied, "You know exactly what kind of car I drive!" to which Officer Bianez agreed, "Yes, I do."



Frivolity accomplished, Officer Bianez asked us the rhetorical question,

"Who is responsible for your home safety?" This being Texas and members knowing a trick question when they hear it, we all responded that WE were responsible for securing our property. And he agreed that it wasn't the obligation of the Plano Police Department (noting Chief Glasscock's grin), because they will be there only when called not when a break-in is in progress. The reason cops won't be around for a break-in is not that they're off "at the donut shop," but rather the bad guys seek to ensure that before committing their crimes. They look for the familiar black and white and feign innocence in its presence.

He asked **Jamie Schell** what he would do were he in the act of stealing mail from a curbside box and spotted a cop car turning the corner. Seasoned crook that he must be, Jamie asked, "*How far away*?" Officer Bianez gave up on the interrogation and said that you'd wave at the officer and, perhaps, stroll leisurely toward the front door, focused on "your" mail. Unless he's a neighborhood watch cop, he won't know that isn't your house and cruise on in his handsome new fleet vehicle for which Christopher thanked a (beaming) City Manager.

Officer Bianez had a remedy for all this insecurity. In fact, he had three:

- 1. Neighborhood Watch
- 2. Hardened Targets, and
- 3. Operation ID

Under NW, we are to get to **know our neighbors**; that enables us to ID interlopers with certainty. And we are to **report suspicious activity**.

Although **Forbes** Magazine chose Plano as **AMERICA'S SAFEST** UTT, we still have crime. And ameliorating that, Plano Police Department has incorporated "partnership with the community" into its Mission Statement. Hence today's talk.

Christopher cautioned us to **report** suspicious activity, <u>not</u> "investigate or apprehend." Simply **dial 911**, and he promises no one at the other end will say, "Gee, a home invasion sounds scary,"

and hang up. After all, prowling neighborhoods isn't illegal. Walking between homes isn't illegal. Knocking on the doors of empty houses isn't illegal. So observers of those activities aren't entitled to make citizen arrests. But they are suspicious and symptomatic of casing the joint. So let officers question potential perps.



Under "hardening the target," Officer Bianez told us to examine our door hardware. If we find

strike plates with a couple of ½ inch screws, Christopher has a 14-year-old son who could kick your door in for you. While that might be useful if you're locked out, it means you aren't frustrating thieves. What you need are **nine 4" screws** that penetrate the 2x4s holding the doorframe.

Then the weak point becomes your bolt. Make sure it extends all the way into its bolthole. If it doesn't, dig the hole out until it does.

Then the weak point becomes the doorframe. That can be backed up with a **doorstopper** that is 2.5x stronger than a bolt. Its screws go into the 2x4 not just the frame. Stoppers cost at most \$25. Narcotics officers asked Christopher's colleague, **Mark Dawson**, to stop proselytizing for doorstoppers; they were making entry into methamphetamine laboratories slow and cumbersome!

Indeed, the narcs (and burglars) can still get in but you have made their jobs

- 1. Difficult
- 2. Time-consuming, and
- 3. Noisier.

Narcs persist; burglars may not.

Doors laced with glass and windows can also be hardened with Security Window Film from 3M.

And pay attention to all exterior doors! Those include doors leading to the garage. According to Officer Bianez, few people even choose to lock those. (Ask **Maribelle** about that sometime.) But since access to the garage is so easy (garage doors are to keep out weather, not bad guys), that unlocked or unhardened garage door is an open invitation.



Christopher invited us to **Google** the **You** video "Breaking into a garage door in 6 seconds." It shows someone grasping the emergency door release with a coat hanger wire, yanking on it, and lifting the door. Then **Google** "How to prevent this," and see how ZIP ties can be used to make the cord unhookable yet releasable in an actual emergency.

Finding **Chief Esparza** in the audience, he touted having a fire plan, but that was just a segue into having a break-in plan. Short of a panic room, one can fortify the bedroom door with all the aforementioned tools and techniques, but they will avail you naught, because such doors are hollow core. Instead, one must purchase a solid wood bedroom door and trick it out as above.

Even all that will merely slow intruders down, but that may be all you need to call 911 and let the intruder know that you've done so. (Chances are, if you're not in the trade yourself, the intruder isn't trying to kill you but rather trying to prevent you for reporting the break-in, giving him more time to steal. So he's unlikely to have disabled the land line, but, if so, keeping your cell phone handy in the bedroom gets around that.)

Officer Bianez said that any Plano household can request a free Home Security Assessment wherein officers from Crime Prevention will give a 2-hour seminar to all family members on the subject. After all, an ounce of prevention, etc. You can find more about the service by navigating to www.planopolice.org and choosing the 6<sup>th</sup> link on the left SERVICES AVAILABLE to navigate to **Home Security Assessment**. Also there is a **Commercial Security Assessment** where officers will come to your establishment.

Finally, Officer Bianez emphasized recovery of stolen goods by Operation ID. The PPD will loan you an engraver to scratch "**TX#**" followed by your driver's license number and "**DL**" to identify your belongings. But if not, you can make an involuntary contribution to the annual auction of recovered stolen goods. Christopher cited that

as a good place to look for bicycles.

**FLASH** asked where on the item we should place the ID, and Christopher told him that the cops who look for same will look all over. The DL is to distinguish the mark from model or serial numbers that may festoon the item.

Sany Bol thanked Officer Bianez for his service to the community and asked, "How many meth houses are there in Collin County?" Christopher told him that since they don't report their existence, there's no way to know. However, drugs are of considerable concern, so much so that Chief Glasscock instituted the **D.A.R.E.** program to educate youngsters about avoiding drugs.

**Patti Schwartz** asked about how to secure double French doors, and Officer Bianez drew another prop from his inexhaustible supply. It was a Taylor plate secured to the floor behind the doors into which a doorblock slides, preventing opening.

Turning briefly to home alarm systems, he said that they must include glass break sensors or motion sensors or your windows become easy access for criminals.

He closed with the final step of the presentation trilogy (tell 'em what you're gonna tell 'em, tell 'em, then **tell 'em what you've told 'em**):

- 1. Crime Watch
- 2. Harden Targets
- 3. Operation ID



Prince John told Christopher that a donation will be made in his name to the Shoes for Orphan Souls, and he presented the officer with a Four-Way Test coin "which will protect you" that Officer Bianez

fumbled, leaving us to wonder if it was the passer or the receiver at fault.

City Manager Clean suggested that John test the medallion's protection before making such claims.

John mentioned that the hardware would be available at *Elliot's* but that we shouldn't seek **Kyle Walters** there as he has moved on. Someone suggested asking for "*Walt*" instead. (Would that be "Walt Kylers?")

Even though John said that his call for announcements was "rhetorical" (not requiring response), Rick Maucieri


